DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

I copied (with slides) the photographs of Patrick Hebron and his wife Amelia Coates Hebron. They are the grandparents of Bessie Hebron Lee, wife of Tilghman Lee. Her parents were Robert and Selena Hebron.

According to Tilghman Lee, Patrick Hebron's dwelling was a frame house with two stories. Its plan was two rooms up and two down with an attic that was not tall enough to stand in. (It was used for storage only). There were two doors leading into the house with a door leading into each room. There was also a window for each room in the front length. In the upstairs there also were two windows, one for each room.

The stairway divided the two rooms downstairs. There were no fireplaces, the rooms being heated by wood stoves piped into a brick flue on each gable end. The rooms were plastered and were whitewashed on the interior, because paint was scarce in the time when Lee was young in 1890's.

Mrs. Bessie Hebron Lee was raised in this house. Both her parents and her grandparents lived together. She said that Patrick Hebron and his son (Robert) farmed together and rented fields from different farmers. They grew corn and wheat, and made some hay. They sold their goods to a dealer directly from the farm, and this dealer would in turn sell it to companies or warehouses in the county or send it directly down the canal to Washington.

Bessie and Tilghman Lee both recall details about the life with this house and the use of the rooms by the family. The two rooms downstairs were used as the kitchen and the living room, not as sleeping quarters. The upstairs had two bedrooms. Though memories are not clear, they think that the grandparents had one room, and Bessie's parents and the children shared the other. In large families in which parents and children shared the same room, the parents would sometimes suspend a blanket around their bed to create a measure of privacy. In this house the upstairs was heated by a wood stove.

The Lees remember the yard and outbuildings around the house. There were two hen houses, a meat house, two corn houses joined by an open shed between them where the wagon was kept, and a barn for the animals (horses and dairy cows). There was also an outside toilet, a spring house at the spring, and pig pens. There were this type of outbuildings around most houses at Sugarland.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house and the oral history associated with it reveals the way of life of Black landowning families in Sugarland and by implication in other communities as well near the turn of the 19th century in rural Maryland. Further interviews ought to be taped with the Lees to record to give more depth to this preliminary survey.

The U.S. Census for 1870 for Montgomery County lists a Patrick Hebron (age 48) with wife Eliza (age 40) and with children: Mary (age 20), Anna (age 9/12) and Rachel (age 13). Tilghman Lee does not recognize this Hebron family. In the U.S. Census for 1880, another Patrick Hebron (age 40) is listed with wife (name illegible to Research Assistant) and with children William (age 11), Robert (age 9), Tilghman (age 5) and Mary (age 1). Tilghman Lee recalls that the wife of his grandfather-in-law (Patrick Hebron) was named Amelia (not Eliza) and that three of the children were named, Robert, Tilghman, and Mary. On the basis of this, it is reasonably certain that the Hebron family of the 1880 census is the one at Sugarland. The occupation of Patrick Hebron was given as "Servant--works on farm for Frederick Dawson"; his wife was listed as "cook". Combining income from these two occupations probably enabled them to build this larger house with heating downstairs and upstairs. Lee's ability to differentiate between the two Hebron families in the census underscores the value of oral informants.

The deed EBP 9/455 shows that Patrick Hebron purchased 4 acres from A. Pleasants Webb and Catherine Webb in 1871. Two years later in 1873 he purchased more land from them (EBP 12/121). The deed does not specify the exact acreage, saying only that is "part of a tract of land called Sugarland Forest". Since he purchased his property in the early 1870's, Patrick Hebron was one of the first of the Black landowners in the Sugarland community.




