The well-kept two story frame house began its history as a typical "I" house with two rooms down and two up and its roof line accented by a cross-gable pediment. It has since been doubled in size. The property has been owned by the black family that built the house for almost a century. The history of this family, the Duffins, has been traced at least to the 1790's, making them one of the oldest documented black families in the state of Maryland.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This well kept, two story house stands on the east side of White Grounds Road. The entire property is bordered by a low cyclone fence painted green. There are several shade trees around the house which give it a lovely appearance in the spring and summer. Today, the house is occupied by Mrs. Edna Duffin and her sister Lorraine Duffin. They recall the earlier appearance of this house since they were raised here. Mrs. Edna Duffin was born in this house in 1891. She remembers that during the lifetime of her parents the grounds around the house resembled a small farmstead. To the north of the house was the lot for the horses, cows and hogs. There was a stable for the horses and milk cows as well as a hog lot further from the house. Behind the house was a hen house, and they had ducks as well. Directly behind the house was the meathouse. To the south was the vegetable garden. In the fall, the produce was harvested, canned by the family and stored in the cellar below the house.

Mrs. Johnson recalls that the house originally consisted of the north block, which had two rooms down and two up and a two story ell attached to the rear length. In the 1930's another two story block was added to the south gable end of the original block. It consisted of two stories, one room down and one room up. The downstairs became the new parlor.

The frame of the house is covered with weatherboards which have been painted white. The facade consists of three bays, a door centrally located flanked on either side by a window containing a double hung sash with two over two lights. The entire front length of the house is sheltered by a shed porch supported by turned posts with brackets.

The roof line of the original block was accented by a cross gable pediment. The addition of the 1930's has its gabled end oriented towards the front of the house so its gabled end gives the appearance of two gable pediments along the front.

In the interior of the original block the room to the north was the parlor, the room to the south the dining room, and the downstairs room in the ell was the kitchen. The upstairs rooms were bedrooms. The rooms downstairs contain many lovely furnishings, including golden oak china cabinets, tables and chairs, and a wide variety of porcelains and crystal glasses that belonged to Addison and Celia Duffin, the owners of the house. They have been collected by the Duffin children over the years. These furnishings represent the sensitivity of the Duffin family for decorative things.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to Edna Duffin Johnson, she was born in this house in 1891. Though her accounts vary, it is likely that this house was built in the late 1880's or at least by 1891.

It stands on property adjacent to the land owned earlier by her parents and grandparents. The house may have been constructed with the assistance of her father, Addison Duffin.

Deed records of this site are as yet unclear. The current deed 4161/769 for one acre refers to the earlier deed JA 58/196 in which Addison Duffin acquires land from James A. and Sarah E. Boyd in 1896. However, the land is only 129 sq. perches and is therefore not equal to the full one acre parcel. Also, this house was built before 1896 and oral tradition maintains Duffin ownership at least to the early 1900's.

Addison Duffin was one of the largest landowners of the black families in the White Grounds community, or for that matter in any of the other black communities surveyed. The following deeds record his purchases (there may have been more which were not recorded): TD 14/59, 0.5 acres, \$150.00, 1917; 184/462, 2 acres, \$50.00, 1906; 270/97, 7 acres, 1917; and 7 acres, \$100.00, 1900.

See the slides of this site for copies of the photographs of Addison Duffin and his wife, Cecilia Duffin. Also the Duffin family history is related to other families' histories in the survey area. For example, Cecilia was the daughter of Henry Noland in the Jonesville community. She was raised there and during her youth worked as a laundress at the Chiswell's home on Cattail Road, which has recently been restored. The family tree of the Duffin family, which is being compiled now, will show the connections of the Duffin family to the Hacketts of Big Woods, the Hamiltons of Jerusalem.

Selections from the family Bibles of the Duffins and Noland in the possession of Edna Johnson have been recorded as part of this survey and are included with the survey report.

Because of the valuable historical resources of this family, it is one of the most important in the survey area.




WHITE GROUNDS COMMUNITY, c. 1900-1925

Addison and Cecelia Noland Duffin sit beside Susie Smallwood and her baby dolls. The Duffin family lived in a red, frame, tenant house on the


Benjamin Collinson Gott plantation near Boyds during the first years of their marriage. The Gott daughter, Daisy, taught the Duffin children

their ABCs.

When the railroad brought prosperity to Boyds, Duffin bought land for himself and built a spacious home. He installed a parlor stove with heat-resistant windows, possibly obtained from Gilmore's mica mine near Kensington.

He farmed his land and worked, too, at James Darby's mill and Wade's Store in Bucklodge. Duffin became ever more prosperous, and helped build Saint Mark's African Methodist-Episcopal Church across the street from his home in 1893. (It is now Saint Mark's United Methodist Church.)

When the four Duffin daughters grew older, they left to work in other people's homes, and Cecelia and Addison invited the pastor's daughter, Susie Smallwood, to live at their big house. From the collection of Lorraine Duffin; courtesy of the Boyds/Clarksburg/Germantown Historical Society


