STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

John Wesley Dorsey purchased this small tract of 0.5 acres in 1922 from Cora L. Pollock, and other Pollock heirs (deed, 320/252). The Pollocks had received the land from the Shorb family in 1909 (deed, 218/166). Three years earlier, they had purchased the land from the DeLauder family, who owned considerable property in the White Grounds community (deed, 188/238). The DeLauders in turn had bought the land from the Grace B. Leapley and G Frank P. Leapley in 1887 (deed, IA 9/195). By this time, the holding had become 61 acres. Thus, the tracts in White Grounds had become increasingly smaller over time, as Black settlers moved into the area, buying up smaller parcels from the larger ones.

According to local tradition, Dorsey was a cobbler and made and mended shoes at the little house where he lived. Most of his work, they remember, consisted of mending shoes since by this time the families purchased their shoes from the larger stores or mail order stores rather than from the local cobbler.

The site illustrates the presence of artisans' shops in many small communities throughout Maryland before the growth of large retail stores, which have now replaced them.


