DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This abandoned two story log house stands at the end of a long lane that has since overgrown, on the east side of Old Bucklodge Lane. The house itself is in deteriorating condition and trees and vines have grown up around it. Little remains of its historical setting.

The house faces west. Its facade contains the typical three bays, and the house is one bay in depth. To the back of the house has been added a one story frame kitchen. The front length and each gable end has been sheathed with German siding, disguising the log walls. Along the back length the logs were exposed. They were of hewn pine and were V-notched at the corners.

In plan the house contained two rooms down and two rooms up. The log walls were not sheathed inside but were left exposed and were whitewashed. A box stairway led to the upstairs, as shown in the attached floor plan. Through the middle of the house ascended a brick stove flue, with openings on each side for stove pipes.

All of the framing materials in the roof truss and joists were of commercially made lumber and were attached by wire nails. There was no use of pegs to fasten any of the door or window jambs in to the logs. Instead they were fastened with wire nails.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to the deed, 248/71, David E. Turner inherited this tract from his mother and her heirs in 1914. It was a part of the land that his mother, Nancy Turner, had purchased in 1908 from Jane E. Jamison. The house was probably built around the time of purchase by his mother or of his inheritance. This is one of the few log houses that has been investigated that was constructed in the 20th century. It shows the combination of some features of traditional log construction and of modern framing techniques. It was probably constructed of logs felled on the property and was therefore less expensive to build than a frame house.

According to Mary Turner who lives in Turnertown, the two rooms in the main block downstairs were used as living room and dining room, and there were two bedrooms upstairs. Below the house was a cellar, which still remains. The old meat house behind the house also remains.

As part of this survey, family photographs of David Turner and his wife, Susie, were copied. David Turner was a musician who played at local dances in lodge halls and other places in the vicinity. His wife, Susie, was the granddaughter of Wallace Hamilton of Jerusalem and was raised there. She was interviewed at the Rose Hill Nursing Home in Silver Spring where she now lives, but due to her advanced age her recollections could not be articulated clearly. She did, however, recognize the copies of the photographs of her husband and herself during their youth, and she was touched by the memory of those days.
