The Sycamores Tenant House is a 2-story, 3-bay I-house. Constructed in 1851, the building has two additions; a side addition to the west and a rear addition to the north.

The structure has a side-gable roof with asphalt shingles. It is of wood-frame construction with aluminum siding and it has a brick foundation. The remaining original windows in the structure are 6/6 wood sash, however, there are multiple modern windows in the structure. The house has a brick and concrete patio adjacent to the front, or south elevation.

The front, or south facade has a central entrance with a wood door. The fenestration pattern on the front facade is symmetrical, with a paired, replacement window and one, 6/6 double-hung wood window on the first story. The second story has three, 6/6 double-hung wood windows.

The west elevation of the original structure is partially concealed by an addition with two sections. The first section, which covers the entire first story of the structure, is a 1-story brick sunporch with jalousie windows. The second section is a 2-story, side-gable structure.

The structure also has a rear addition which projects to the north. The rear, or north elevation the original section of the house is entirely covered by this 2-story addition.

The east elevation includes the rear addition which extends to the north of the original section of the house, and a 1-story, shed roof enclosure which projects from the east elevation of the rear addition.

There are two ancillary structures associated with the tenant house. The first is a 1-story, wood-frame shed with a side-gable roof covered with asphalt shingles. The structure is located north of the tenant house.

The second structure is a modern brick barbecue. The barbecue is located northwest of the tenant house and west of the shed, and is within a fenced enclosure erected around a swimming pool.

The Sycamores Tenant House is located on the west side of Sycamore Lane, with residential properties to the north, south, east and west. The property's setting is suburban, and new residential development is now located between the main house at Sycamores, located on Sycamore Grove Court, and the tenant house.

The Sycamores Tenant House is an I-house constructed in 1851. It was constructed as a component of the estate known as "Sycamores", which included 106.4 hectares (263 acres) at the time of its development circa 1850. Sycamores was the property of Samuel D. Walker until 1867, when it was purchased by Adrian Rowe Wadsworth. Wadsworth retained ownership of the property until 1888, when the farm was sold to Mary Richardson Prescott. The first subdivision of the property occurred in 1948, when heirs of Prescott sold much of the land, retaining the main house on 6.47 hectare (16 acres). At that time, the tenant house and 1.01 hectare (2.5 acres) was subdivided from the main house. The current owner of the property purchased the structure in 1960, and a subdivision of the parcel in 1979 resulted in the current .48 hectare (1.19 acre) parcel which is associated with the house.

The Sycamores Tenant House is located near the nineteenth century community of Norbeck. The area was composed of two separate but related communities; Mount Pleasant, the African-American settlement established by freed slaves on Muncaster Mill Road, and a white commercial crossroads settlement at the intersection of Norbeck Road and Georgia Avenue. The community also extended along Norbeck and Bradford Roads, east of the crossroads. The African-American settlement was oriented around the community church and school, while the white settlement centered around the post office, general store, and blacksmith shop. While remnants of both communities still exist, the environment in which they developed has been greatly altered over time.

The community at the crossroads was established in the decade following the Civil War, when increased agricultural prosperity and an increased population created a greater demand in the area for goods and services. In addition to the growth of the local farm community, the area grew as a result of its location at the intersection of two of the oldest roads in the county, the Baltimore Road (Route 28/Norbeck Road) and the Washington-Brookeville Turnpike (Route 97/Georgia Avenue).

The standard I-house, such as the Sycamores Tenant House, is one room deep and two stories tall with three or five openings on each story. From the front, an I-house is often indistinguishable from a Georgian house. The gable view, however, reveals the greater depth of the Georgian house. Chimneys are located on the interior of the gable ends, however, external chimneys are characteristic in the Chesapeake region. Usually, an I-house has a one-story porch running the length or nearly the length of the long side. On the interior, a central hall separates the two rooms on the first floor; the second floor contains either two or four sleeping chambers. Due to the narrowness of the main core, many I-houses have kitchen wings to the rear. Initially,

stone masonry construction was used but by the mid-nineteenth century, as pre-cut lumber became increasingly available, frame construction became the norm. During the Victorian period, pre-cut detailing or a two-tiered porch was commonly grafted onto the traditional I-house. The I-form was popular into the early twentieth century, with examples appearing in catalogs of mass-produced suburban houses (Gowans 1992, 55-6).

NATIONAL REGISTER EVALUATION:

The Sycamores Tenant House, constructed in 1851, is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. The house is not eligible under Criterion C, as modern additions and alterations have compromised the architectural integrity of the property. The characteristic form of an I-house has been obscured on the Sycamores Tenant House through the construction of additions on the east, west and north elevations. Finally, the property does not meet Criterion D, as it has no known potential to yield important information.


