9. Description: The James Brooke Beall house is a three story L-shaped structure facing north across a side yard, surrounded by old maple trees. It consists of a three bay by one bay (22' x 30') section on the west and a three bay by one bay section (38' x 18') with a two story bay on the north end, on the east. The wood post and beam house is set on a stone foundation (no basement). The walls are finished with 8" reveal wood siding except for the portion by the north porch, which is done in half-timbered plywood. The paneled wood doors have glass in their upper halves, and plain wood frames. There is a glass transom above each door. The windows in the east section are two-over-two double-hung wood, with the exception of those in the bay, which are one-over-one double-hung. The west section has six-over-six windows. The black metal gable roof has a tile-like design. The ridge of the east section runs north-south, meeting that of the west section, which runs east-west.
10. Significance: For over 75 years the family and descendants of James Brooke Beall lived in this house. He had purchased several hundred acres from the estate of Samuel Clagett in 1832 and at his death his widow Lavinia remained in the house, surrounded by her four sons and two daughters who lived on nearby farms. Her daughter Cecelia and her husband Charles Vinson together built the "Beall-Dawson" house. Another daughter Lavinia married Charles DuFief of the neighboring milling family. The house was modernized and enlarged sometime in the later Victorian years. After Lavinia's death in 1890, her grandson William Brooke Vincent inherited 112 acres and lived in the house until 1917. Sold out of the family in 1917, it had one owner until 1953. It changed hands several times in the next ten years; the land was subdivided in 1964; however, the developer preserved a setting of old trees for this attractive house.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Rudolph Beall house is an attractively restored farmhouse.

The three story L shaped structure faces north, across a side yard. It consists of a three bay by one bay (22' x 30') section on the west and a three bay by one bay section (38' x 18') with a two story bay on the north end, on the east. The wood post and beam house is set on a stone foundation (no basement). The walls are finished with 8" reveal wood siding except for the portion by the north porch, which is done in half-timbered plywood.

There are two porches. The north porch (8' x 22') has a flat roof supported by four columns with brick bases and square wood posts. The concrete porch floor is 6" above grade. There is an XXX design railing around the porch. The south porch (8' x 20') has a metal shed roof supported by three square wood posts which are finished with corner beading.

The three interior brick chimneys are painted black -- one off-center at the east, and two near the ridge at the west end.

The paneled wood doors have glass in their upper halves, and plain wood frames. There is a glass transom above each door. The windows in the east section are two-over-two double-hung wood, with the exception of those in the bay, which are one-over-one double-hung. The west section has six-over-six windows.

The black metal gable roof has a tile-like design. The ridge of the east section runs north-south, meeting that of the west section, which runs east-west. The box cornice overhangs the east section of the house by 8", and returns 2' around the gable ends on the north and south. There is a plain cornice at the top of the bay, and a similar section of trim dividing the first and second floors of the bay.

The front (north) facade shows the two story bay on the east, with six windows, one on each face of the bay, on both first and second floors. One window is centered above the bay, at the third floor level. There are five windows (two down and three up) and the main door and porch on the west section. The east elevation, which faces Norman Drive, has six windows (three down and three up) with louvered shutters. On the south side there are three windows (one on each floor) in the east section and four windows (one down and three up) and two doors and porch in the west section. On the west there is one window in the third floor gable.

The house sits, surrounded by old maple trees, on an attractive site, facing north toward a circular drive in the side yard. There is a swimming pool and cabana-storage building in a fenced yard in the south-west corner of the property.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

For over 75 years the family and descendants of James Brooke Beall lived in this house. Although it appeared on the Hopkins Atlas of 1879 under the name of Rudolph Beall, it was his father James Brooke Beall and his mother who lived there from 1841 until her death in 1890.

James B. Beall had purchased several hundred acres of "Treble Trouble" and "Richland" from the Estate of Samuel Clagett in 1832, recorded in 1841.¹ After his death the land was partitioned among the heirs, and his widow Lavinia chose Lot #1 called "The Dower Lot" which contained, "...253 acres... on public road from Darnestown to DuFief Mill, wooded and in a state of cultivation...improvements are a comfortable dwelling house..."²

For the next 30 years the widow Beall lived in this house, surrounded by her sons and daughters who lived on farms nearby. Her daughter Cecelia with her husband Charles Vinson (Vincent) built a Federal style house about ½ mile east on Route 28, which is now known as the Beall-Vinson House. Another daughter, Lavinia, became the bride of Charles DuFief of the neighboring milling family. Her sons Zebedee and James J. Beall owned parts of "Mount Pleasant" and "Hartley Hall" directly north across present Route 28, and her son Dr. Reverdy Brooke Beall owned extensive acreage to the west and in nearby Darnestown. The only son who did not live in the immediate area was her eldest son, William Rudolph Beall, who made his home just south of the Frederick County line near Dickerson. He is buried in Beallsville, while James, Lavinia and their other three sons and daughters are all buried in the Darnestown Presbyterian Church Cemetery.

The family home was modernized and enlarged sometime during the later Victorian years. A two-story addition with bay windows and covered verandah was added to the pre-1859 house.

After Lavinia's death in 1890, her grandson William Brooke Vincent and her son Reverdy divided the 253 acres. William purchased "The Dower Lot" of 112 acres³ and lived there until 1917. From 1917 until 1953 it was the property of Mamie and William Miles.⁴ During the 1950s and early 1960s it changed hands several times as speculation increased in the area. In 1964 the plat for a development called "Mountain View Estates" was filed. The James Brooke Beall House is Lot 2 in Block C,⁵ and was purchased by the present owner in 1966.

The builders of this 20th century development recognized that this sturdy and comfortable house, as well as its stately trees could be blended

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into the landscape to utilize and preserve them both, and the 19th century house fits snugly into its new surroundings.


