Probably the oldest house in Darnestown, this 1 1/2-story log and frame house was an integral part of the town since 1820, when it was built by the town's first wheelwright, Samuel Leeke. It has also served as a tavern, twice as a general store, as the town's post office, and as a polling place. The house remained little changed until the ownership of Ace Esworthy, who removed the porch and log storehouse about 1932 and replaced them with a frame bedroom addition. Besides his auto repair business, Ace also served as a Montgomery County commissioner in the mid-1940s. The house was demolished in April of 1987.

There is also a town cemetery located on this lot. It was about 40 feet wide and occupied most of the side and rear part of the lot. There were about 15 to 30 headstones. Although there is no above-ground evidence of it today, some remnants of the Darne family and a number of other early residents are believed to be buried there. It is well-known to the long-time residents of Darnestown. The cemetery probably dates from the 1860s--the last burial being about 1916. Discussions with long-term residents have brought to light the fact that headstones formerly in place in the cemetery are now used as a walkway for a neighboring house. These headstones can be seen today.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Griffith house is a 1½ story log and frame house. The main part, which is the oldest, is entirely of log construction. It contains two rooms downstairs and two bedrooms upstairs. There is a large chimney block on the west side of the house which serves the fireplace in the liv.rm. and also the fireplace in the bedroom directly above. There are two dormers projecting from the gable roof at the front, and a portico has been built over the centrally-located front door. The house has one over one light windows with the exception of the dormers which are six over six lights. There is also a din. rm. and kitchen downstairs, and a bath. There is a more recent frame addition at the east side of the house which contains two bedrooms. In the rear, a single story shed addition slopes off the back of the main house. There is also an enclosed porch across the back.

The house remained little changed from the enclosed picture taken in the late 1800s, until the ownership of Ace Esworthy. The porch across the front and the log storehouse on the east side (where Fisher, and later, Griffith, had their businesses) are still remaining in the enclosed picture taken about 1932. Shortly after this, Esworthy removed the porch and the log storehouse and replaced them with the portico and the frame bedroom addition. He also enlarged the porch across the back and enclosed it. The weatherboard siding of both earlier photos was replaced by a wide white siding, shown in today's picture.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

This house, listed on the 1865 map as Sam Fisher's store and Post Office, and on the 1879 map as the house and store of Julian Griffith, is probably the oldest house in Darnestown. It seems to have been an integral part of the life of the town since its beginnings - as the home and shop of the town's first wheelwright, then as the town's general store, and most recently as the home of Ace Esworthy, whose auto garage beside it was a gathering place of many of the town's residents.

In January 1820, Samuel Leeke purchased this land, a triangular-shaped lot of .435 acres, from William Darne. Leeke was the first wheelwright in the community and built his house and shop here. In November of 1823, Leeke sold the property for \$800 - "...the lot and house where Leeke now resides....as sold to Leeke by William Darne Jan. 12, 1820."<sup>1</sup>

In 1831, the property was involved in an equity case and was advertised for sale - - "formerly occupied by Samuel Leeke and others as a tavern...."<sup>2</sup> and sold at that time for \$514. By 1865, after changing hands several times, the property came to Samuel Fisher, a merchant, who had his general store here. He was in partnership with his brother-in-law, trading as Fisher and Benton. Fisher was also postmaster of Darnestown. Fisher died about 1868, and the property was sold for \$2250 to Ulysses Griffith and James Windsor who had been previously renting it. This was the same lot which "contains the store house and dwelling formerly occupied by Samuel M. Fisher and now by Ulysses Griffith and James S. Windsor."<sup>3</sup> Ulysses had purchased a share to set up his son, Julian, in business. Griffith (Julian) and Windsor became the merchants of the town.

After about 10 years, Griffith and Windsor dissolved the partnership and Windsor left to open his own store. This property stayed in the Griffith family until 1917 when it was sold to Ernest Ricketts. "...same land upon which storehouse and dwelling occupied by Julian Griffith"<sup>4</sup>

Ricketts sold to Ray Davis in 1924, who in turn sold to George "Ace" Esworthy

in 1929. Esworthy had operated a car repair service here since 1926 in a garage building next to the house. The garage was built of concrete block by Esworthy and his brother-in-law Joe Torreyson. Esworthy also served as a member of Montgomery County Council during the late 1940s. After Esworthy died in 1979, the house was sold to Floyd Eaton, the present owner. The house is now mostly unoccupied and opened only occasionally as a beauty shop.


There was also a small cemetery at the rear (the point of the triangular lot) of the property, which is well-known to the old families of Darnestown. However, this cemetery is never mentioned in any of the land records as the property has changed hands over the years. A daughter of the Ricketts, who lived there from 1917 to 1924, says she remembers there were four to six stones, but some were unmarked.<sup>1</sup> The stones were very old and weathered at that time. At least one body was removed during the '20s or '30s. It has been supposed that some of the Darne family were buried here, but it is highly unlikely, for many reasons. It is more probable that some of the very early residents of that part of the town were the ones buried there. There is no above-ground evidence of the cemetery today, although I understand the tombstones are probably still around the property.
