The Nathan Allnutt Farmhouse is a two and a half story, three bay frame dwelling built c1907 with an earlier rear ell dating from 1903. The building form--three bays wide, eaves front orientation, asymmetrical fenestration--is common in the Darnestown area, yet most other known examples date from the mid-19th century. The farm was established by a prominent local family, and includes two noteworthy outbuildings: a large bank barn and an unusual stone barn. The house and bank barn have been altered in recent years.

Section 7: DESCRIPTION
Page 7.1

The Nathan Allnutt Farmhouse is a two and a half story, three bay, double pile frame dwelling built c1907 with an earlier rear ell dating from 1903. The composition shingled roof meets a brick external chimney on the north slope of the east gable. The walls are covered with drop (German) siding and punctuated by windows with two over two sash, molded architraves and sills. The one story full-width porch has a raised-seam metal shed roof and is supported by round columns connected by a railing with wire mesh. The houses central entrance contains a pair single pane French doors without transom.

A one story gable roof garage is attached to the east side with entrance bays for two cars on the east facade. A vented cupola with weathervane marks the roof east ridge end. A six over six sash window is located on the north (main) elevation.

At the northwest corner of the main block, the front porch is attached to an open deck which wraps around to the west facade where it is accessed by a flight of wood steps. Standing around the perimeter of the deck are round columns connected at the tops by horizontal wood members one of which is attached to the porch. At its northwest corner, the rectangular deck widens into a hexagon.

The two bay west end of the main block contains a segmentally arched gable window with two over two sash. Two sets of paired single pane French doors with transoms are located on first and second levels of the south-most bay. The remaining bays contain two over two sash windows. This gable end forms a continuous wall surface with the west facade of a rear two story, two bay ell. Windows are two over two sash except for the first level of the south bay where a projecting bay window is sheltered by a standing seam metal roof.

An exterior flue chimney is located near the north-most bay of the ell while an interior chimney is located at the south gable end. From the south elevation of this ell projects a one story greenhouse. The east facade of the rear ell contains a one story shed roof porch which has been enclosed. This facade appears to have been the original front facade of the c1900 house which preceded the main block. The porch roof is connected with the roof of another porch across the length of the east garage wing.

According to the present owner, the garage and chimney at the east end of the main block were built in the 1960s and the greenhouse was added in the 1970s. Significant changes made after the Trulands purchased the property in 1984 include replacement of north front porch, square porch columns with present porch, round columns and wrap-around deck, removal of steps on all three sides of porch, and replacement of doors and windows on north, west, and south elevations with single and paired French doors. During the same period, the rear ell was altered by replacement of a window with a projecting bay window, addition of a skylight on the east roof slope, and enclosure of east porch.

A large bank barn, located to the rear of the house, facing northwest, was built about the same time as the house. The composition-shingled gable roof is punctuated by three metal ventilators, which became popular after 1900. Walls are sheathed with drop (German) siding, most windows are louvered, and foundation is concrete. Two replacement overhead doors on the northwest elevation are accessed by an elevated ramp with side retaining walls.

Southwest of and perpendicular to the bank barn is a handsome one story side gable fieldstone barn with two arched wagon drive throughs on the east elevation and an eight light casement window with transom on the north. Judging by the style of the casement, the barn appears to date from the 1930s-40s.

Immediately west of the bank barn is a one story concrete block milk house built in two sections, at least part of which was built in the first half of the 20th century. Continuing to the west is a one story, four bay, Ranch style tenant house with drop (German) siding and six over six sash from the mid 20th century. The current owners renovated this structure and added a prefabricated building in a field to the south of the bank barn.

The Nathan Allnutt Farm, set well back from Darnestown Road amidst rolling hills and open fields, is accessed by a long, winding driveway. A picturesque farm pond is located to the west of the driveway, just before the house is reached. The rural setting is important to the character of the site.

Summary: The Nathan Allnutt Farm, established by a prominent local family, includes two noteworthy outbuildings: a large bank barn and unusual stone barn. The c1903 house is a late example of a traditional Darnestown area building form, with its eaves front orientation, three bay width, and asymmetrical fenestration. The house and bank barn have been substantially altered in recent years.

The house was built by Nathan S. Nace Allnutt (1862-1930) c1903 when he purchased the 179 1/4 acre property from the estate of his father Nathan W. Allnutt. An increase in property value in 1907 may indicate expansion of the house. It appears that the rear section was built first, facing east.1

Nathan and his wife, Myra Compton Allnutt, who were married in 1895, named their farm Edgewood. They had two daughters: Laura, who later married Roy Darby and lived in Gaithersburg, and Natalie who married Ashton Gouldin and lived near Fredericksburg, Va.2 Members of the Allnutt family were early regional settlers and were prolific in the Darnestown and Dawsonville area by the late 19th century.

Sometime after the Allnutts sold the farm in 1925 to William B. Allnutt (son of Robert W.), it was used for dairy farming. (See attached chain of title.) When the Elgins sold the property in 1952, the milking parlor equipment was still in place and crops were growing in the fields. After buying it in 1963, the Kramms rented the property out as a horse farm, offering boarding and riding lessons. More recently, the Palisades Construction Corporation bought the farm in 1984 (Alice O. Truland, Vice President), and Robert and Mary Truland in 1992.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a two-story, frame farmhouse of unusual styling. The house, probably built ca. 1900, features three bays on the main (north) facade. The center bay, containing the door and window above, is off-center, being located just west of the middle of the house. The door has a transom-light. The steep A-roof overhangs slightly, and is covered with patterned slate shingles. There are (newer) brick chimneys on both the west and east exterior walls. A raised, one-story, open porch with turned posts crosses the main (north) facade. The 2/2 windows have molded architraves and sills. Siding is German.

A lower, two-story ell extends to the SW rear, and a newer, low, one-story wing is attached to the east wall of the main house.

The Kramm farmhouse is a circa. 1900 rural vernacular dwelling. The house, nicely maintained and beautifully situated, is somewhat different in its architectural styling than most of the farm houses in the area (which seem to have more of a Victorian influence than the Kramm house). It has a single story modern wing at the east elevation of the main block. This newer wing however is in keeping with the architectural style of the original house.

The house was built about 1903 by Nathan S. Allnutt on 179 1/4 acres which he purchased in June of 1903 from his family as part of the estate of deceased father, Nathan W. Allnutt, who died in 1901.¹ Nathan S. added the two story rear wing to the house about 1907.² The farm remained in the Allnutt family until October of 1940 when it was sold to Thomas and Ellen Geoghegan.³ They sold the farm in 1952 and it went through a succession of owners until 1963 when it was purchased by the present owners, Dr. August and Joyce Kramm.⁴ The Kramms rent out the property which is now being used as a horse farm, offering boarding, riding lessons, etc.
