

Based on the available information, the Ed Hill House, located at 411 Norwood Road in the Silver Spring vicinity, does not appear to meet the National Register Criteria for listing. Constructed c. 1875, the house must have been extensively renovated in the early 20th century for it exhibits Colonial Revival influences typical of the period. The 2 1/2 story frame I-house does not possess any particular architectural significance and is unlikely to be eligible under Criterion C. The Ed Hill House is a two and one-half story frame I-house located on an approximately two-acre site just off Norwood Road. The building has a simple L-plan with a two and one-half story rectangular core and a one and one-half story rear ell. It is side-gabled with clapboard walls (now covered with asbestos shingles) and has a composition shingle roof.

The building's principle elevation faces southeast toward Norwood Road and is symmetrical, three-bays in width and one-bay deep. The attached one-and-one-half story rear ell is two bays long and one-bay wide. The principal front entry has a simple transom and sidelights and is covered by a pedimented frame porch supported by slim posts. The flanking first floor and second story windows of the main three-bay facade are rectangular and have double-hung sash with six-over-six lights and louvered shutters.

The gable end and wing facades feature the same window type, but it is not repeated in a strict symmetrical pattern. Each side elevation has a small two-over-two window centered at the gable end that lights the attic story. There are no other windows on the north face of the main block and the ell on this side of the house has a simple entry and a small one-over-one rectangular window. The building's south side has six-over-six windows with louvered shutters on the first and second floors lighting the rear half of the main block. The facade of the rear ell on this side of the house has matching six-over-six windows with louvered shutters on the first floor and a pair of small transoms light the loft.

Summary: The Ed Hill house does not represent a distinctive type, period and method of design or construction and has minimal local architectural significance. The house reflects the growing popularity of the Colonial Revival style and its incorporation into traditional forms of domestic architecture in Montgomery county during its rapid transition from a predominantly rural to an urbanized community during the first half of the twentieth century.¹

Ed Hill probably built a house at this site sometime between 1869 when he purchased the land and 1878 when G. M. Hopkins recorded the residence on his well-known survey map of the county. The Colonial Revival detailing, width of the center stairhall, which is much narrower than is common in nineteenth century I-houses in the area, and twin brick stove flues flanking the hall indicate that the house has been rebuilt or extensively renovated in the early twentieth century.²

The Ed Hill house is an example of plain yet still architecturally attractive dwellings typical of those built by Quaker families of the general Sandy Spring area during the mid to late nineteenth century. The early part of the house included the present kitchen and one or two other rooms, the rest being added at a later date.¹ This early dwelling was probably built by Edward Hill about 1869.² The house 23 3/4 acres of a tract of land referred to as "Snowden's Manor Enlarged,"^{MS} purchased in August of 1868 from the Tyson family for \$356.25.³

Edward and his wife, Susan, owned the house until September of 1888 when they sold it to James F. Turner for \$2500.⁴ In April of 1906, James conveyed the house to Harry A. Turner.⁵ Harry and his wife, Maude, owned the house until January of 1915 when they sold it to Walter and Annie Harding.⁶ The Hardings sold the house in 1917 and it went through a succession of owners until it was purchased in 1961 by the present owners, Robert and Helen Nine.⁷ The Nines, who do not live in the house themselves, say that they know very little about the house.⁸


