9. Description: This four bay by four bay, one and a half story frame community meeting house faces southeast. The town hall has clapboarded and shingled exterior walls. It is an irregularly massed structure; two gable ends are visible on the southeast elevation. Both are boxed and the east is pedimented. A bell tower surmounts the building. It has a pyramidal roof and its walls are shingled. A one story northwest addition expands the Town Hall's meeting facilities.

10. Significance: This Chapel has been a focal point of Garrett Park since this "ideal suburb" was planned by Henry Copp, to be easily accessible by the Metropolitan Branch, to downtown Washington, D.C. (Garrett Park, was, in fact, named after the president of the B&O Railroad).
 The Protestant Episcopal Church Committee of Garrett Park purchased a lot in 1896, planning to name it St. James Protestant Episcopal Church, but a number of residents petitioned for a nondemoninational chapel. The petition resulted in the formation of the Garrett Park Chapel with a Board of Managers formed by articles of agreement between the P.E. Church Committee and representatives of the organizers of the proposed Union Chapel.

Over the years, the Chapel has been improved for use as a church, Sunday School, and general meeting hall. In 1925 the Garrett Park Citizens Association was formed at the Chapel.

In 1953 the Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Washington authorized the sale of the Chapel to the Vestry of Christ Church Parish of Kensington. It was bought by the Town of Garrett Park in 1968 for use as a town hall.

 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This four bay by four bay, one and a half story frame community house faces southeast on Kenilworth Avenue.

Built on fieldstone and cinderblock foundations, the Town Hall has white clapboards and shingles. The building is irregularly massed and has been added to on the northwest elevation. The southeast (front) door is recessed and is contained within a pedimented gable end. Two fieldstone steps lead up to the wide wooden paneled door. Southwest of the front door is a projecting gabled section. It has a triple window which contrasts with the blank clapboarded wall northeast of the front door. Above the door is a bell tower. Set on a square base, the shingled tower has an opening which is surmounted by a pyramidal roof with black asbestos shingles and a decorative spindle at the peak.

There are six over six double hung windows throughout this building. On the southeast elevation three windows are grouped to form a single composition. At the peak of the southeast gable there is a round window. This design is repeated in the peak of the northeast gable.

The southeast gable roof and the northwest flat roof have black asbestos shingles. There is one interior smokestack. There are many oak trees on the southeast section of the lot.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Henry Copp, a Washington attorney, planned his "ideal suburb" along the Metropolitan Branch of the B&O Railroad in the mid-1880's. He formed the Metropolitan Investment and Building Company in 1886 to buy land and promote the growth of a community so easily accessible by railroad to Washington, D.C.¹ (The twelve mile ride to the B&O station on New Jersey Avenue took 30 minutes and cost 50¢ round trip.)² This company bought a 157 acre tract of land, part of the land called "Dan", from Henry L. Cranford in 1886.³ In 1891 the land was divided and William D. Castle bought lot 4 of section 50 of the subdivision of Garrett Park⁴ (named after Robert W. Garrett,⁵ President of the B&O Railroad), the lot where the Garrett Park Chapel would be built.

The P.E. Church Committee of Garrett Park purchased lot 4 of section 50 in 1896, planning to name it St. James Protestant Episcopal Church⁶. A number of residents of Garrett Park petitioned "for a nondenominational chapel as too few families of any one denomination lived in Garrett Park to support a church."⁷ This petition was answered in 1897 by formation of a Board of Managers of the Garrett Park Chapel according to Articles of Agreement between the P.E. Church Committee and the "representatives of the organizers of the proposed Union Chapel."⁸ Three trustees were selected, one from each group subscribing to the Articles of Agreement and a third to be chosen by the former two, to hold the deed in trust for the use of the Board of Managers.

Over the years the Chapel has been improved for use as a church, Sunday school, and general meeting hall. In 1915 electricity was installed; in 1922 an extension was added to provide a kitchen and storage area.¹⁰ In 1925, the Garrett Park Citizens Association was formed at the chapel.

The Bishop of the P.E. Diocese of Washington held the authority for extending the agreement "under the terms of which the Chapel is being held and maintained as a community center." He extended this agreement until 1952 when new trustees were appointed, as all the previous trustees had died.¹¹ In 1953 the Bishop authorized the sale of the Chapel to the Vestry of Christ Church Parish of Kensington,¹² who immediately sold it to the Potomac Conference Corporation of Seventh Day Adventists.¹³ The Town of Garrett Park purchased the Chapel in 1968 for use as a town hall.¹⁴




