### **Description:**

The residential subdivision of North Hills of Sligo Park is located in the Four Corners vicinity of Montgomery County. North Hills of Sligo Park was developed by E. Brooke Lee, president of the North Washington Realty Company, in 1931. The development continued the grid pattern of streets established by the 1926 plat of Argyle Park, located to the north and west of the North Hills of Sligo Park. The street pattern becomes increasingly curvilinear as the community extends south. Along these streets were platted over 200 building lots in three sections between 1931 and the early 1940s. The community was developed on land purchased from Victor Brunett in 1930. The land first passed into the Brunett family in the early 1860s and a large Gothic Revival house was constructed by Louis Brunett between 1860 and 1863. E. Brooke Lee used the house as the centerpiece of his new development and used its image in advertising campaign. The house also served as offices for the real estate company. The subdivision was platted with lot sizes of between 5000 and 9800 square feet. The streets were paved, though no curbing or streetlights were provided. Curbs were later added to some streets. North Hills of Sligo Park also lacked parkland or other public amenities. The large lots and expensive houses constructed by the North Washington Realty Company were difficult to sell during the Depression years with many lots remaining unsold. Eventually the bank had to foreclose on the North Hills of Sligo Creek properties. By 1941, only 90 houses had been constructed, and only three-quarters of the development had been completed by 1948.

### **Significance:**

The community was developed by E. Brooke Lee, through the North Washington Realty Company. E. Brooke Lee was a Silver Spring native whose family owned a substantial amount of land in southern Montgomery County. Lee introduced the legislation establishing the Maryland-National Capital Park & Planning Commission, helped draft the Capper-Cramton legislation, and worked with the State Roads Commissions to develop new thoroughfares in the county. The North Washington Realty Company was Lee's real estate and building firm, however, he formed and built under a number of corporations to protect each subdivision from the failure of another. These included: the North City Land Company, Sligo Park Development Company, the Silver Spring Investment Company, and the Fairway Land Company. Lee was involved in the subdivision of land and home construction in more than half of the subdivisions platted in Silver Spring throughout the 1920s and early 1930s. He did not build all of the houses in the subdivisions he platted, though the North Washington Realty Company had established fifteen house designs that could be built in a number of subdivisions (Secrist 57-61).

Although the North Washington Realty Company is responsible for the design and construction of some houses within the North Hills of Sligo Park, the architects for most of the houses are not known. The models are variations on basic house designs constructed around many cities in the early to mid-twentieth century. The houses closely resemble the residences in the nearby developments of Argyle Park, Argyle Club Forest, Fairway, Sligo Park Knolls, Woodside Park, and Greenacres, among many others located elsewhere in the Washington, D.C. suburbs. The houses represent Colonial Revival designs modified for modest house designs. The residences possess the building form and some features of the Colonial Revival style, but on a smaller scale and with inexpensive modern materials, such as molded door surrounds and metal casement windows. The community is identical to hundreds of other developments constructed on the periphery of cities during the early to mid-twentieth century. The construction of this specific development does not represent a historic trend that made a significant contribution to the development of the nation, state, or community. The development does not possess distinctive design features or innovative concepts that would distinguish this development from others. The community does not include significant elements of architecture, landscape architecture, engineering, or artwork. It is a simple and prevalent community of modest structures with Colonial Revival and modern influences. The modest structures have a reserved use of architectural detail, therefore integrity of the individual resources is critical. Many of the houses in the community have replacement windows and additions. The community lacks comprehensive design features such as public space, ceremonial entrances, pathways, or original streetlights.

The residential subdivision of North Hills of Sligo Park is located in the Four Corners vicinity of Montgomery County. North Hills of Sligo Park is one of several residential subdivisions platted along Forest Glen Road in the Four Corners vicinity between the late 1920s and the early 1950s. Developers and home buyers were attracted to this area because of the easy access into the District of Columbia and the numerous recreation amenities, including the Silver Spring Branch of the Boy's and Girl's Club, Sligo Creek Parkway, the Argyle Country Club, and the Indian Springs Country Club.

A number of subdivisions were constructed by various developers on the north side of Forest Glen Road in the late 1940s and early 1950s. It was not unusual for streets within a subdivision to end abruptly, since developers anticipated the streets being continued by the next subdivision or during the next phase of house construction. As such, it is common for roads to extend through several subdivisions even though there is no relationship between the developers. North Hills of Sligo Park was developed by E. Brooke Lee, president of the North Washington Realty Company, in 1931. The development continued the grid pattern of streets established by the 1926 plat of Argyle Park, located to the north and west of the North Hills of Sligo Park. The street pattern becomes increasingly curvilinear as the community extends south. Along these streets were platted over 200 building lots in three sections between 1931 and the early 1940s. The community was developed on land purchased from Victor Brunett in 1930. The land first passed into the Brunett family in the early 1860s and a large Gothic Revival house was constructed by Louis Brunett between 1860 and 1863. E. Brooke Lee used the house as the centerpiece of his new development and used its image in advertising campaign. The house also served as offices for the real estate company.

The subdivision was platted with lot sizes of between 5000 and 9800 square feet. The streets were paved, though no curbing or streetlights were provided. Curbs were later added to some streets. North Hills of Sligo Park also lacked parkland or other public amenities. The large lots and expensive houses constructed by the North Washington Realty Company were difficult to sell during the Depression years with many lots remaining unsold. Eventually the bank had to foreclose on the North Hills of Sligo Creek properties. By 1941, only 90 houses had been constructed, and only three-quarters of the development had been completed by 1948.

Dwelling Types: North Hills of Sligo Creek contains a variety of suburban building styles. The most common styles are Colonial Revival with both 2-story and 1-story versions.

Colonial Revival, 2-story: Most of the residences were constructed in the Colonial Revival style. A typical example of the prevalent 2-story Colonial Revival-style model has 3-bays with a central entrance and a brick exterior. One of the gable ends has a semi-exterior brick chimney. The entrance has a Colonial Revival door surround consisting of fluted pilasters often topped by a triangular or broken pediment with dentil molding. The original windows are wood 6/6 double-hung, though many have been replaced by vinyl units. A feature common to all of these residences is a small casement or double-hung window centered on the second story above the entrance. Though side porches were not standard on this model, many have been added. Some sub-types of this model include examples with small entry porches, full-height porticos, and Tudor Revival detailing. Examples: 9619 Brunett Avenue, owner: Todd and Dawn Harris (See Photo 24 of 27), and 9602 Sutherland Road, owner Douglas and S.W. Taylor (See Photo 25 of 27).

Colonial Revival, 1-story: The 1-story model constructed within North Hills of Sligo Park is a mid-twentieth century suburban building form with Revival-style details. The buildings form is created by the intersection of a principal low-pitched side-gable roof with a projecting front-gable section. The houses are typically constructed of brick and may have a front porch. The windows are double-hung with picture and bay windows common. Examples: 9518 Bruce Drive, owner: H.F. and E.G. Stegman (See Photo 26 of 27), and 9404 Thornhill Road, owner: Bruce Drake (See Photo 27 of 27).

The community of North Hills of Sligo Park is located in the vicinity of Four Corners, Montgomery County. Four Corners began as a 19<sup>th</sup>-century agricultural community located at the crossroads of Bladensburg and Colesville Roads. The community remained rural until the post-World War I building boom in suburban Montgomery County. Beginning in the late 1930s, Four Corners saw the development of Northwood Park, Woodmoor, Indian Spring Village, Indian Spring Terrace, North Hills of Sligo Park, and Fairway, among others. These subdivisions expanded between 1945 and 1955 even as new ones, such as Northwood and Franklin Knolls, were constructed. The single-family house subdivisions that soon surrounded Four Corners had winding streets that formed an irregular grid in between major roads. Commercial establishments lined Bladensburg Road (now University Boulevard) and Colesville Road. The Woodmoor Shopping Center, established in 1946, is one landmark of the community. Four Corners was largely developed by the late 1950s.

North Hills of Sligo Park was developed by the North Washington Development Company in three sections beginning in 1931. The sale of large lots and expensive homes for affluent buyers proved to be too great a challenge for the realty company during the depression years. Most lots were unsold by 1935 and the bank was forced to foreclose on the undeveloped lots within the community. Despite this, the community continued to slowly develop throughout the 1930s and 1940s. By 1948, three-quarters of the lots had been improved by houses.

The community was developed by E. Brooke Lee, through the North Washington Realty Company. E. Brooke Lee was a Silver Spring native whose family owned a substantial amount of land in southern Montgomery County. Like his father, he entered politics and influenced the development of the county through policy and administration. Lee introduced the legislation establishing the Maryland-National Capital Park & Planning Commission, helped draft the Capper-Cramton legislation, and worked with the State Roads Commissions to develop new thoroughfares in the county (Secrist, 57-58).

The North Washington Realty Company was Lee's own real estate and building firm, however, he formed and built under a number of corporations to protect each subdivision from the failure of another. These included: the North City Land Company, Sligo Park Development Company, the Silver Spring Investment Company, and the Fairway Land Company. Lee was involved in the subdivision of land and home construction in more than half of the subdivisions platted in Silver Spring throughout the 1920s and early 1930s. National Register Evaluation:

Character-defining elements for Planned Suburban Developments, as defined in the I-495/I-95 Capital Beltway Corridor Transportation Improvement Study, include 1) concentration of historically or aesthetically-cohesive buildings; 2) community design with planned landscape and public amenities; 3) single period of construction; 4) architecturally-significant suburban building types. To be considered eligible for the National Register of Historic Places, Planned Suburban Developments must possess excellent integrity of all character-defining elements. North Hills of Sligo Park does not contain public amenities or a planned landscape design and does not possess architecturally-significant suburban building types.

Constructed between 1931 and the early 1950s, North Hills of Sligo Park is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible for the National Register do to the ubiquitous nature of the resource. The community is identical to hundreds of other developments constructed on the periphery of cities during the early to mid-twentieth century. The construction of this specific development does not represent a historic trend that made a significant contribution to the development of the nation, state, or community. The development does not possess distinctive design features or innovative concepts that would distinguish this development from others, and therefore is not eligible under Criterion A. Historic research indicates that the community has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. It is not eligible under Criterion C, as the community does not include significant elements of architecture, landscape architecture, engineering, or artwork. It is a simple and prevalent community of modest structures with Colonial Revival and modern influences. The modest structures have a reserved use of architectural detail, therefore integrity of the individual resources is critical. Many of the houses in the community have replacement windows and additions. The community lacks comprehensive design features such as public space, ceremonial entrances, pathways, or original streetlights. Finally, investigations have not been conducted to determine whether the property has the potential to yield information important in history or pre-history, therefore, National Register Criterion D can not be assessed at this time.
