The William Read, Jr. house is a remodeled two story frame I-house on approximately a one quarter acre lot. The ground plan is a simple rectangle with the original block built in 1904 and a two-story wing setback to the southeast added in 1909. The structure was remodeled in 1972 in the Colonial Revival style. The house's architectural significance has been significantly diminished by this remodelling, which added the main facade's pedimented dormers, the rear facade's full length shed dormer, the sheathing with modern aluminum siding and the entry frontispiece. The present remodeled building has minimal local architectural significance as a representative example of the Colonial Revival style.

The William Read, Jr. house is a remodeled two story frame I-house (1904) on approximately a one quarter acre lot off Dennis Avenue in Silver Spring. The house was originally a side-gabled center hall I-house with clapboard walls (sided with aluminum in 1972) and now covered by a composition shingle roof. The ground plan is a simple rectangle with a two-story wing setback to the southeast added in 1909. The center hall single-pile core was built about 1904 and was extensively renovated in 1972 in the Colonial Revival style.

The principle elevation of the house faces west toward Dennis Avenue and has a symmetrical five-bay facade with a two-story wing addition. A one story enclosed sun porch infills the L. The main entry has a broken pedimented frontispiece with fluted pilasters and sidelights. The symmetrical ranks of first floor and second story windows of the main five-bay facade are rectangular and have double-hung sash with one-over-one or two-over-two lights and have louvered shutters. Three prominent gabled dormer windows with double hung one-over-one sash light the attic space.

The window design--a rectangular, double hung sash with one-over-one or two-over-two six lights--is repeated in a regular pattern throughout the remaining wall surfaces of the house. The elevation of the rear facade reveals the house's expansion in 1972 with a full length shed roof addition to the attic story and the construction of a one story shed roofed addition to the ell setback.

## Outbuilding

A one story, frame storage shed with a gable front and flanking shed roof extensions, probably built in the early twentieth century, is located behind the house on the site.

Summary: The William Read House was originally a central hall frame I-house built in 1904. The house's architectural significance has been significantly diminished by a recent Colonial Revival style renovation in 1972. This remodeling added the main facade's pedimented dormers, the rear facade's full length shed dormer, the sheathing with modern aluminum siding and the entry frontispiece. The present remodeled building does not represent a distinctive type, period or method of early twentieth century vernacular design or construction and has minimal local architectural significance as a representative example of the Colonial Revival style.

Chain of Title/Owner Information:

William Read, Jr. received twenty-eight acres of land from his mother Mary Eliza Read in April, 1903 and soon thereafter made substantial improvements to the property. In 1909 William and Margaret Read sold the property to Robert Allen who died a decade later leaving the house to his wife Marie Allen. Several years later she sold the house to Charles Clement, Sr., A federal civil servant who maintained a small farm on the then 12 3/4 acres of surrounding land. Charles and Virginia Clement owned the house from 1921 until their deaths in 1968-69. Their children Jeanne, Mary and Charles Clement, Jr. inherited the property and in 1971 the two daughters conveyed their interest in the property to their brother and his wife Runette who are house's present owners.

The William Read house is significant as an example of rural vernacular architecture typical of that constructed in Montgomery County from the mid-nineteenth through the early twentieth centuries. It is also representative of the early development of the Washington, D.C. suburbs which grew after 1880 as a result of the expansion of government and business in D.C. and the construction of the Metropolitan branch of the B&O Railroad which provided easy transport to and from the city. The house was probably built about 1903 by Oliver Hamilton for William Read, Jr.<sup>1</sup> William's house was built on 28 acres of land which he received in April of 1903 from his mother, Mary Eliza Read.<sup>2</sup> Mary had received 202 1/2 acres of "The Benjamin" in 1854 from her mother, Emily Beale.<sup>3</sup> Mary and her husband, William, a lawyer, built a house on the 202 1/2 acres where they lived with their seven children.<sup>4</sup> William died in May of 1884. In 1903, after all the children had reached the age of 21, Mary made partition of the land among them. It was then the William, Jr. received his parcel and built the house.<sup>5</sup>

In August of 1909, William and his wife, Margaret, sold the house to Robert Allen.<sup>6</sup> Robert added the two story wing located on the southwest rear elevation of the house.<sup>7</sup> He died in 1918 leaving his property to his wife, Marie Allen.<sup>8</sup> In April of 1921, Marie sold the house to Charles A. Clements, Jr. (the father of the present owner).<sup>9</sup> Charles worked for the government and ran a small family farm on his 12 3/4 acre tract.<sup>7</sup> Charles died in August of 1968, followed by his wife, Virginia, in June of 1969. The house was then passed on to their children Jeanne, Mary and Charles. In May of 1971, Jeanne and Mary conveyed their interest in the house to their brother Charles and his wife, Runette, the present owners.<sup>11</sup>
