DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In 1828 specifications for the dimensions and appearance of lockhouses to be erected along the C & O Canal were stipulated by the C & O Canal Company. Despite these specifications, each lockhouse had its own individuality.

Lockhouse number 8 is located on a roughly triangular piece of land, bounded on the south by the C & O Canal, and on the northeast and northwest by a channeled stream. It is one and a half stories of whitewashed uncoursed rubblestone, three bays across and one bay deep. The original "masonry" specifications required that the lockhouse measure 30' x 18', the cellar walls were to be 22" thick, "principal story" walls, 18" thick. All windows were closed by vertical board shutters. However, each window had stone lintels and sills. There are two shingled dormer windows with gable roofs set into the north-wall and extending up into the roof. The gable roof is covered by wooden shingles. There is a central stone chimney. On the north elevation there is a porch built on stone foundations with a pent roof supported by square wooden posts. There is a doorway to the north porch and another door on the south elevation. Six stone steps lead to the south (front) door.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Lock and Lockhouse:

Land for the lock and house was obtained through the condemnation process. In 1830 Mrs. Lucy White, widow, Joseph G. White (probably her son) and John Busey (who claimed a leasehold interest) were paid a total of \$1,755.01 for the stone, earth, and land needed by the C&O Canal Company. Mrs. White took the case to court, stating that the price paid to her was most unreasonable, but later she withdrew her caveat. Despite the difficulty in obtaining title to the land, the contract for Lock 8 was granted in October, 1828, and the lock completed in July, 1830, at a cost of \$9,043.14. Abram Knapp & Company was the construction firm.

Lock #8 and its lockhouse were included in Section #7 of the canal, built by the general contractors Clark and Clements, at a cost of \$13,001.28. This lock is very close to the Potomac, so Clark and Clements placed a stone wall from the river bank to the top of the canal embankment in order to protect this part of the canal from severe damage due to floods. Despite this precaution, the towpath here was flooded in 1836, April and September of 1843, and 1924. A disastrous flood in 1889 washed out the lockhouse and carried away the gate, nearly destroying the lock.

Thornhill and McKennie were granted the contract to build the house in 1829 for \$785.75. It was completed in May, 1830.

Not much information is available concerning the lockhouse residents. When first completed, the house was probably used by resident engineers of the Canal Company. In 1830 Solomon Drew was appointed first lock-keeper, at an annual salary of \$100 and use of the house.

Log Houses:

Roscoe L. Wood, AIA, bought parts of Lots 70 and 71 in Block 6, Section 4 of Cabin John Park in 1935 and '36. He designed a "completely modern House" as a scholarship project at Columbia University for the site but never constructed it because of "impossibly high bids". Wood purchased two old abandoned houses in Fredericksburg, Pa., one for \$16 and one for \$25. These structures had been put to use as gasoline stations. Mr. Wood numbered the logs, trucked them to Cabin John, and used them to build the larger house. Subsequently he bought the logs for the smaller building.

Wood built a private suspension bridge from the larger house to an island opposite his porch; it was high above both canal and towpath.

Statement of Significance

Wood sold a portion of his property to the US Government in 1941 and the part with the two houses on it to Clarence and Georgia Riner 6 months later. The Riners in turn sold the property to Charles Waters and Elizabeth Ann Thompson, November 6, 1953, subject to their life tenancy in the Gate House (smaller house); the Riners agreed to pay for repairs and improvements needed.

The log houses have no historical connection with Lock #8 or the C&O Canal.

APPENDIX A

"Specification of a Lock Keepers house the outlines of which are exhibited on the accompanying plan and positions of the respective houses noted on the line of the Canal. /C. December 1828/

'Masonry

"The building to be of Stone and to be 30 by 18 feet over the walls, with a cellar under the kitchen part 6 feet in the clear, with a floor of earth, the walls to be 22 inches thick, and have a projection on the outside of six inches all round, and at least one course of stone high the cellar door to have stone steps, and a locust frame with grooves to receive the doors, which are to have substantial strap hinges and be fastened in the usual way with a Padlock; there will be a window on each side consisting of a single sash each of 10x 12 glass & 3 lights in width, each to shut in a oaken frame, the sash, to have hinges, to open upwards.

"Principal Story

"The floor to be 2 feet above the surface of the ground; the walls to be 20 inches thick, and that part not over the cellar to have a footing of stone all around of 6 inches more, one course of stone high, the space between the ground and the bottom of floor to have 3 slits in each side, 9x4 inches, to be covered with perforated Iron or Copper plates, to exclude vermin, and admit air, under the end where there is no cellar; the height in the clear of the story to be 8 feet between floor & ceiling.

"Attic Story

"The walls to be 13 inches thick and three feet high from the top of floors to the square; the peak of the roof to be 6 feet above side walls: The Stone to be laid in Clay mortar excepting 3 inches on the outside of the walls above ground and the inside of the cellar which 3 inches to be good lime mortar and well pointed.

" Chimney Stalk /Stack?/"

"To be begun as near the surface of the ground as a good foundation can be obtained, one side to be supported by the cross wall of the cellar, the foundation to be of Stone 8x4 feet to top of arch of oven where it will be 6x4 feet the stalk may be of brick or stone; if built of Stone, the openings of the fireplaces, the insides of the flues /flues?/, & the Oven should be of brick; and the top above the roof should be hammered; or built of hard bricks, and good mortar: The Kitchen flue to be 13 x 12 and that of the parlour 12 x 12 inches after they are plastered - The outside doors to have Stone Sills, and Stone Steps the window sills should be of Stone, or Locust painted and sanded all the lintels of doors & windows to be of stone.

'Carpenter Work:

"Joists of first floor to be 3 x 9 inches: Of 2d floor 3x3 inches- Floors, to be of 1 1/2 heart heart pine planed and tongued and groved - Doors to be of 1 1/2 heart pine not to exceed 6 inches in width to be letted and fastened with wrought nails the outside doors, to have Jamb casings of 2 inch hart pine, let into the Sills and framed at the top the outside doors to have substantial strap hinges put on with screws, the front door to have a good Stock lock, and the kitchen door an inside bolt, the parlour door to be furnished with a good 7 inch nob lock, all the rest of the doors to have thumb latches-

'WINDOWS Those in the principal story to have 10x12 Glass, those in the upper story to have 6x10 Glass: The casings to be 1 1/2 inch yellow pine plank.

A Sash of 10x12 glass to be put over the front door to light the entry.

'Roof

"To have 10 pairs of Rafters, 4 inches deep at top and 6 inches at lower end three inches thick to be framed together at top and be secured by a brace at a point on the rafter that will afford a clear head way of 5 feet 4 inches in the attick story; the horizontal slope of foot of rafters to project 6 inches over the face of the wall and to have a planier or casing, spiked to them, to extend to face of wall, the shingles to project 4 inches over that, making in all 10 wall plate, and spiked to it; said wall plate to be 4 inches thick, and spiked to pieces of 3 x4 Scantling; built angling into top of wall, a rafter of 1 1/2 inch plank to be built in the centre of Cables to project like the others: Sheeting to be 3/4 boards, laid close, the Shingles to be cypress, of good quality 12 inches long, & to show 5 1/2 inches to the weather & not less than 4 inches wide /here a word is missing, due to torn ms., but it is probably/ and 5/8 thick.

'Carpenter work of inside

"The inside doors to have plain Jamb casings; the washboards and surface to be plain, only single beaded, the mantle pieces to have plain pilasters, and mouldings to support the shelf; The spaces to the right & left of front entry to have stud partitions, the space between chimney stalk & back wall to have a two inch plank partition, the space between the fireplace and door of stairway to be stud partition the stair to be plain with a nosing. The partition separating the rooms in attic story, to be 1 1/2 inch plank: the small closets to be finished in a plain manner.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The house is a two-part, log cabin that sits on a bluff above the C & O Canal. The main (west) section is slightly taller than the south wing although there are living-space lofts above each. The main part is a three-bay cabin with a central entrance, while the southern part looks as though it might have been a kitchen at one time. There are two "eyebrow" windows under the eaves in this section. Fireplaces are internal although there are some newer external chimneys on the south. The house was apparently remodeled in the early 1900's, but it is most unusual in that all the exterior log walls are still exposed. Most log building in the county have now been weather-boarded.

Behind the house is another log building that has been converted to a studio of some type.

Just east of this location along the C & O Canal is a small stone lock-keepers house (Lock #8.)


