Campbell House, a commodious frame dwelling, is located on an ample 6/10 acre lot at the northeast corner of Brookville Road and E. Thornapple Street, in the Village of Chevy Chase, Section 5. Built c1907, the residence is stylistically transitional exhibiting Queen Anne and Craftsman influence. The 2-1/2-story, four-bay structure is covered with artificial siding and protected by a asphalt shingled hipped roof with broad eaves and hipped dormers. The solid massing of the house is subdued by a double-story projecting window bay and a wrap-around porch with paired columns set on rusticated concrete block piers.

The west elevation, facing Brookville Road, is divided into unequal bays consisting on the first floor of the double-story projecting window bay and its windows, a central entry and a secondary door next to it. The second story includes the windows of the projecting bay and three, single windows. The double-story bay is polygonal and extends from ground level to the soffit of the roof eaves. It is defined by 3/1 windows on each plane wall on both the first and second stories. The central entry has a wide door opening with diamond-paned sidelights, while the secondary door, leading from the living room onto the porch, has narrow, wood double doors. The second story windows are all 3/1, as are the windows of the hipped dormers.

The house has a high level of integrity, despite the addition of artificial siding.

The Campbell House is a fine example of a spacious suburban residence representing a transitional historical period, between the Victorian and the early Modern era. The house exhibits the picturesque features and commodious massing of the former, with the horizontal lines and Craftsman details and materials of the latter. Located on Brookville Road, an important early thoroughfare, the Campbell House property was developed by heirs of the No Gain estate.

The house at 7201 Brookville Road was built by Sarah Louise Campbell and Emma L. Johns, who bought a 2.8 acre parcel of land in July 1905 from Isabella and William R. Griffith. The house was completed in 1907 when it was assessed at \$5,000. Household furnishings were valued at \$500. While Emma Johns died in 1909, Sarah Campbell, resided here for more than 20 years. A Pennsylvania native and employee of the Treasury Department, Campbell employed a servant to do general housework and supplemented her income by renting rooms to boarders.¹

The Campbell House is located on part of the No Gain estate. Isabella Griffith inherited from her sister Mary Griffith Anderson Woodward property including the No Gain farmhouse (7121 Brookville Road). where she and her husband/cousin William R. Griffith, lived in the, which Isabella had, subdivided three spacious lots on Brookville Road north of Thornapple Street, before selling the rest of their property to Harry Martin.²

Sarah Campbell continued to live at this residence into at least the late 1920s when she was in her 80s. In her later years, she was joined by Thomas T. and Florence Bradley and their family. In 1923 Sarah sold the northern part of the property fronting on Brookville Road, and the house at 7203 was built. The same year she legally conveyed her own house, now on 1.4 acres, to Florence Bradley whose family continued to lived here into the 1930s.³

Into the 1940s, the property continued to stretch along Thornapple Street to the head of Chestnut Street. By this time it was owned by Jennie R. Bogley. The back of the property was then subdivided. Now located on over half an acre of land, the Campbell House has been owned by James H. Johnson III and V. C. Johnson since 1977.⁴

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
