The Jones-Beall House, built in 1909, is located on the west side of Brookville Road, south of Williams Lane, in the Village of Chevy Chase, Section 5. The 2-1/2-story frame structure has a two-bay principal block covered with a wide hipped roof, and a two-story side wing, covered with a half-hipped roof which joins the side elevation of the principal hipped roof. The house is clad with wood shingles and its roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Two corbelled brick chimneys project above the roofline. A wrap-around porch extends from the entry bay, designated by a pediment on the porch roof, to the south elevation of the house.

The west (front) elevation, facing Brookville Road, includes the two bays of the principal block and the side addition. The principal block includes a window and door on the first story, opening onto the porch, and pairs of 8/1 sash windows on the second story. Centered on the roof of the main block is a hipped dormer with pair of square windows. The side wing has a ribbon of three narrow 6/1 windows on the first story. The wrap-around porch has a half-hipped roof supported by thick wood columns set upon stone piers.

A secondary elevation faces north on Williams Lane. The wraparound porch shelters the eastern two bays of the four bay wide facade. On the second level are four 8/1 sash windows. A dormer identical to that on the front elevation is centered on the main roof.

Located at the southwest corner of the lot is a non-contributing garage built on the site of an earlier garage. The two bay one story garage has clapboard siding and a front gable roof covered with asphalt shingles.¹

The Jones-Beall House is noteworthy for its high level of architectural integrity. The side wing is original to the house, although the second level was built as an open porch with shingled piers. Dormer windows originally had diamond panes.

The Jones-Beall House is important for its association with Edward H. Jones, an early developer who worked closely with the Chevy Chase Land Company and who subdivided the Williams family land as an independent entrepreneur. The house exemplifies a period of expansion in the Chevy Chase area as independent developers profited from the success of communities established by the Chevy Chase Land Company. In addition, the dwelling is an outstanding example of early 20th century residential architecture, exhibiting architectural influences of the Craftsman and Prairie styles becoming popular at the time.

In 1909 Edward H. Jones and his wife Lollie Jones purchased 1.6 acres and built the house. The property was assessed that year for improvements valued at \$4,200 and household furnishings worth \$450. Edward H. Jones had established c1908 his own realty firm specializing in the Chevy Chase area. Previously Jones had worked for the Thomas J. Fisher Company, the real estate firm affiliated with the Chevy Chase Land Company from the beginning. The Jones-Beall House was featured in *Chevy Chase for Homes*, a 1916 booklet published by Thomas J. Fisher Company to promote the advantages of real estate in the Chevy Chase area.²

This 1.6 acre parcel was previously owned by Bettie Offutt who acquired it in 1905 as part of the settlement of her brother John H. Clayton Williams' estate. The 32-acre Williams farm had been established here in 1883, on land that had once been part of the No Gain estate. Bettie Offutt did not build a house on this site--she and her family lived at 4500 Leland Street, now the Town of Chevy Chase, from 1893 until well through at least the 1930s. Bettie Offutt sold the property in 1907 to James and Alfred Wilson, Bethesda merchants. The Wilsons sold it to the Jones' two years later.³

In 1910, Edward H. Jones acquired two other parcels of land from the Williams estate: Bettie Offutt's 8-acre tract north of Williams Lane, and her sister Laura Williams' 3.75-acre tract flanking Williams Lane. This land Jones subdivided in 1913 into 25 lots arranged along

Woodbine Street and Glendale Road. Edward H. Jones named the development *J. M. C. Williams Subdivision*, in honor of the farmer who had established the tract.⁴

This subdivision came near the beginning of the career of Edward H. Jones, a real estate agent and independent developer. In later years, he developed the Arcade Building on Connecticut Avenue, Chevy Chase, D.C. (1925) where his firm established its business. Jones organized the Chevy Chase Savings Bank (1923), later taken over by Riggs National Bank; and the Chevy Chase Savings and Loan (1929) of which he was president for five years. The Edward H. Jones real estate firm is still active in the Chevy Chase area today.⁵

Edward and Lollie Jones were not accustomed to living in one house for very long. Though the 1912 Directory lists them at this address, late in that year, they sold the property to Fielder M. M. and Anne L. M. Beall. The lot was now 1.5 acres, since 1/10 acre had been sold for a house at 3718 Williams Lane. The house was chosen for the T. J. Fisher Realty Company's promotional pamphlet "Chevy Chase for Homes" as a prime example of residential architecture.⁶

The Bealls continued to own this property and presumably live in the house into the 1930s. When they bought the house, Fielder was a 63 year old employee of the U.S. Army. He and his 37 year old wife Annie lived here alone with one female servant. The house at 7310 Brookville Road retained its substantial 1.5 acre lot until c1940. The lot stretched along Williams Lane, backing up to 3718 Williams Lane. By 1941, the land was subdivided and six houses were built. Nonetheless, the Jones-Beall House has a generous lot size of just under a half-acre.⁷
