DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

A small rectangular building, approximately 28 x 40 feet (excluding recent lean to addition on the north side), built of brick laid in Flemish bond with occasional glazed headers on a stone foundation and a three course brick water table. The church is two bays by four bays; the south side has four windows with splayed brick lintels (flat arches), whereas two of the opposite north side windows have been obscured by the new addition. The north side windows, however, have segmental brick arches as do the two entrance doors on the east side. The two windows on the west side (behind the altar) have been bricked up. All glazed windows have recent iron grates. The gable roof (running east to west) has been sharply heightened (the old roof pitch is visible in the brick work) and a decorative tie beam has been added on the east eave end. There is a circular vent over the entrance doors and a similar round window filled with stained glass is over the west end.

The church is set within a wooden cemetery of approximately 4-5 acres.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

St. Matthew's is an example of a simple Anglican church of the Colonial period — the simple rectangular plan sharing the meeting house tradition with other Protestant denominations and reflective of early Church of England settlers in this country (e.g. St. George's, Valley Lee, St. Mary's County and Durham Church, near Ironsides, Charles County) as opposed to the archeological and very English churches of the Gothic Revival a century later. Only somewhat altered, St. Matthew's is situated in a large graveyard containing some early stones, notably that of Benjamin Stoddert, (died 1813 or 1815), First Secretary of the Navy (D.A.R. plaque).

The pitch of the "A" roof has been increased in height since the chapel was constructed, leaving the ends of the rafters exposed. On the east gable are two doors having stone sills and transoms. Segmental arches are above the doors and windows on the north and east sides. A circular vent is in the gable above the two doors of the east side and the overhanging eave has a decorative exposed tie-beam. Flat arches support the window opening on the south and west sides of the chapel which have twelve over twelve sash covered with iron bars, of recent vintage. There is a stepped water table on each side of the building. The original windows have been bricked up on the west gable. A brick lean to laid in common bond has been attached in the northwest corner of the building, covering two windows on the north side.</p>

HISTORY OF ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH, ADDISON PARISH, SEAT PLEASANT, MD.

1696 Land given by Col. John Addison

1696 Log structure, then within Piscataway Parish, Charles County, erected by the private subscription of local residents for their own convenience. (page 119, "P. A. Inventory of the Diocese of Washington, Vol. 1, 1940)

1724/ Original structure repaired (Dr. Ethan Allan, sometime Historiographer of the Diocese of Maryland and Rector of St. Matthew's in 1819

1726 and annually repaired at public expense from Piscataway  
1744 "Chapel of Ease" to King George's Parish (p. 243 W.P.A. Inv. D. of W.)

1744 mentioned in Acts of the Assembly of Md. (p. 244 W.P.A. Inv. D. of W.)  
May-June

1746 Brick structure under Rectorship of Henry Addison, Mrs. Henry Addison being the chief contributor and the parish taking its name as a tribute to her. (Rt. Rev. Thomas John Claggett, First Bishop of Maryland and first bishop consecrated in America, 1792. See Bp. Claggett's "Notitiae" Journal 1810, page 12)

1760 Canon R. J. Ripley mentions "erection of a frame Building" and is apparently quoted by W.P.A. Inv. of D. of W. on pg. 244, but his authority cannot be found and neither Bp. Claggett nor Dr. Allen mention it.

1809 Present brick structure. Bp. Claggett's Journal 1810, page 12

1811 SAINT MATTHEW'S PARISH DIVIDED FROM KING GEORGE'S PARISH

1815 "First Minister of its own", the Rev. Walter Dulaney Addison, first candidate for the Priesthood ordained by Bp. Claggett on May 26, 1793

1833 Present building consecrated by the Rt. Rev. Wm. Murray Stone, 3rd Bp. Md. (Journal 1833, page 11) "On Wednesday, May 8, I consecrated the Church commonly called Addison Chapel to the Service of Almighty God by the name of Saint Matthew's Church."

1811- "The present St. Matthew's Church was the first parish church of  
1890 St. Matthew's Parish, created in 1811, and so remained, at least technically, until about 1890, when it was placed under the jurisdiction of Epiphany Parish, Prince George's County." W.P.A. Inv. D. of W. page 245

Bp. Claggett's "Notitiae" Journal 1810, said the  
frame structure was replaced by a brick church

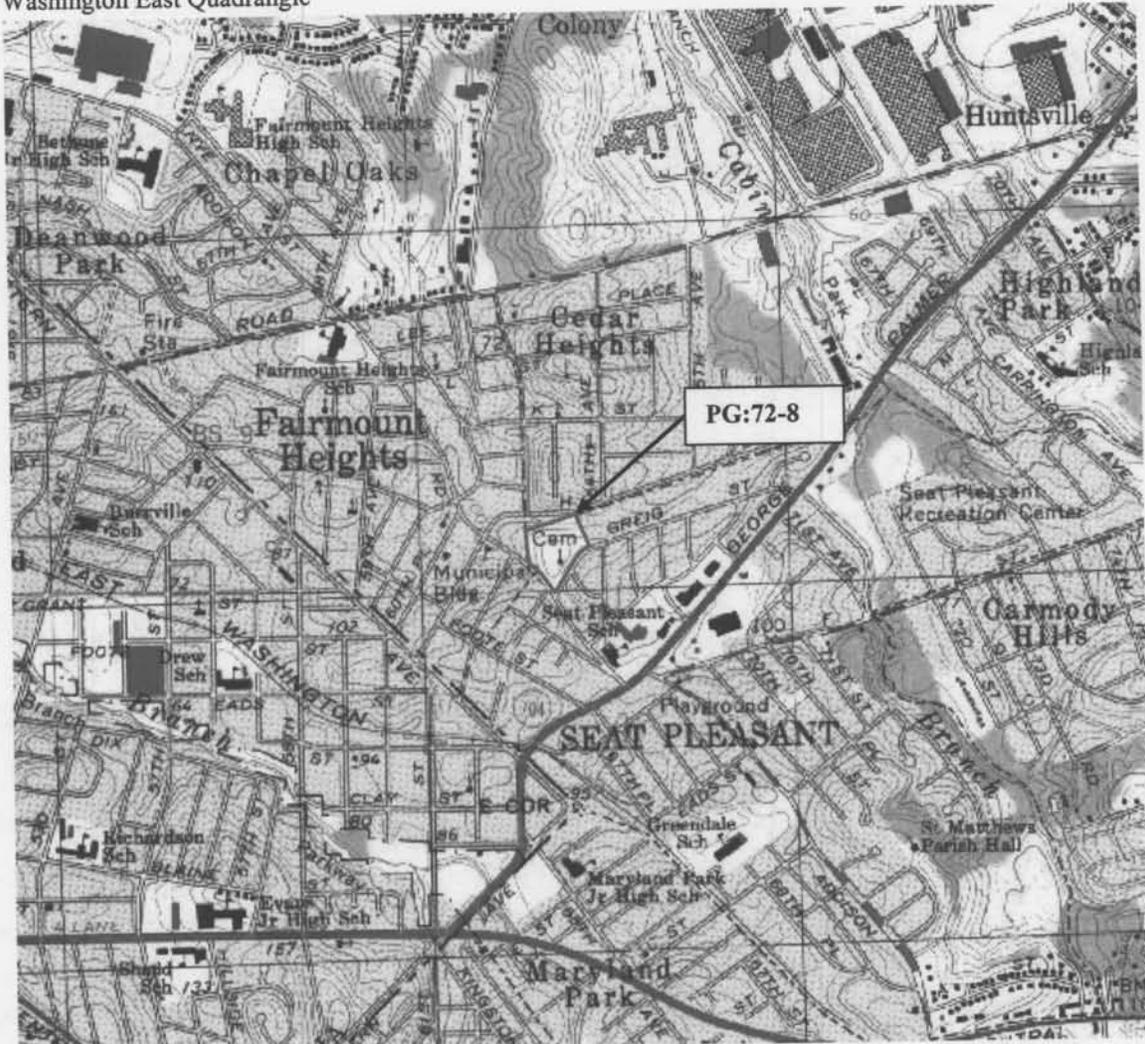
1836 Dr. Pinkney referred to the church as a  
"substantial brick building".

If the building had been rebuilt in 1809 with  
it's foot wide walls, would have been classified  
as a solid brick and probably in excellent  
sound condition.)
