Description:

The Philip and Ann Smith Property is a 1½-story, 2-bay residential building being used commercially on the west side of Baltimore Avenue in Beltsville, Prince George's County. Constructed circa 1915, the building is a massed-plan side-gable cottage that has been altered for commercial use. There have been modern storefronts added to the north and east sides of the building.

Significance:

The Philip and Ann Smith Property was built circa 1915 on Lots 5 and 6 of Block 20, Section 2 of Beltsville. The Smiths purchased lot 6 in 1911 and lot 5 in 1916 from the Beltsville Land Improvement Company. The Beltsville Land Improvement Company was incorporated in July 1891 by John Prescott, Frank Middleton, Charles E. Coffin, Cabb Magruder, Robert Vinton Hall, James Simms and John Rayburn. The company subdivided the area along Baltimore Avenue and Powder Mill Road into 11 blocks. The company placed restrictive covenants on the deeds, forbidding the use of the property for the manufacture or sale of alcohol, requiring the approval of all building plans, the use of cremation outhouses if sewers were not provided, and prohibiting the sale of any property to African-Americans. Ann Smith sold the property to Earle Hyde in 1936. He sold the property to Arthur Hyde in 1941. The Beltsville Building Corporation purchased the property in 1951. The property was sold in 1968 to Desilco, Incorporated. It was sold to the current owners in 1979.

The Philip and Ann Smith Property is a 1½-story, 2-bay residential building being used commercially on the west side of Baltimore Avenue in Beltsville, Prince George's County. Constructed circa 1915, the building is a massed-plan side-gable cottage that has been altered for commercial use. Modern storefronts have been added to the north and east sides of the building.

The structure has a side-gable roof with asphalt shingles and exposed rafter ends, a gabled chimney and a shed-dormer on the front elevation. It is of wood-frame construction with stucco, and it has a stuccoed foundation. The windows are double-hung wood-sash. The building has a 1-story shed-roof porch on the rear elevation.

The east, or front elevation has been highly altered with a large shed roof and modern plate-glass windows and door. The first story is 2-bays wide. The first bay has two plate-glass windows. The second bay has a glass door. The shed-roof dormer has three fixed-lights, and has exposed rafter ends. The first floor is extended to the north with 2 commercial spaces. The addition is 1-story with a shed-roof covered in standing seam metal. The addition has a service porch and a 2-light plate-glass window. There is a canted corner. The corner has a glass door.

The north elevation has been greatly altered with four modern commercial spaces. The addition is 1-story high, with a shed roof covered in standing-seam metal. There are four entrances with glass doors and six 3-light plate-glass windows. The second story of the house is partially visible above the addition. There is a small shed-roof addition and one light in the gable.

The west, or rear elevation is banked into the hillside at the rear of the property. The rear elevation is 1-story tall and 3-bays wide. The first bay has a door. The second and third bays have 1/1 double-hung windows. There is a shed-roof porch with stuccoed walls and posts.

The south elevation has a slightly raised foundation. The basement level has two window openings, the first is blocked and the second is filled with an air-conditioner. The first story has four 1/1 double-hung windows with segmental arches. There is also a small, square fixed-light window in the second bay. The gable has one fixed-light segmental arched window.

The Philip and Ann Smith Property is located on the northwest corner of the intersection of Baltimore Avenue and Powder Mill Road. It is surrounded by commercial property on the north and west. The current setting is commercial. The historic setting would have been a residential neighborhood in Beltsville.

District line to Beltsville. The suburban development continued after the introduction of the automobile. The state improved the roads, and Route 1 became the major north/south route along the east coast. Although the Beltsville Agricultural Research Center was established in 1910 and employment in the area increased, Beltsville was relatively far from Washington, and the more southern suburbs experienced greater growth. It was not until after the Second World War that intensive development came to the Beltsville area. The increase in Federal employment and the dramatic rise in personal automobile use led to the suburbanization of Beltsville. The area west of Route 1 was developed as a residential area, and the development increased in the 1960s as Interstate 95 made the area more accessible. Today, most of the farms are gone and Beltsville has become a densely populated suburb of the Nation's Capital.

The Philip and Ann Smith Property is an example of a side-gable vernacular cottage. Between 1870 and 1940 the vernacular cottage style was typically built for Americans of modest means. They are characterized by simple ornamentation and mass-produced components, such as door frames, moldings, sash and window units, and porch decoration. The development of post-Civil War machinery capable of producing large amounts of standardized housing elements, such as those found in cottages, contributed greatly to the development of the modern American housing industry. Designs for vernacular cottages were obtained from popular magazines, such as House Beautiful, or carpenter's and builder's journals, such as American Builder. A variety of front-gable, side-gable, cross-gable and hipped roof frame cottages were developed in the early to mid-twentieth century. Front-gable and hipped roof cottages are primarily 1 to 1½-stories tall, 3-bays wide and several rooms deep. Side-gable and cross-gable structures are usually 2 to 2½-stories tall, are typically 2 to 3-bays in width and vary from one to three rooms deep. They usually include a porch covered with a shed roof. Porches are supported by posts often containing machine-produced Victorian ornamentation. Some cottages feature ornamentation drawn from Craftsman style or Colonial Revival architecture (Gottfried and Jennings 1988, viii-xv).

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8. Significance (Continued)

National Register Evaluation:

Constructed circa 1915, the Philip and Ann Smith Property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state, or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. It is not eligible under Criterion C, as it is an example of a side-gable cottage which has been highly altered with the addition of modern commercial spaces on the east and west sides. The property no longer retains integrity of materials, workmanship, design, setting, or feeling. Finally, the structure has no known potential to yield important information, and therefore, is not eligible under Criterion D.




