

Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*
The Humes House is a sprawling, multi-addition building which has been used as a military school in the past. Today it appears to be either abandoned or unused. It is beginning to lose its integrity of materials, and its setting, feeling and association as a wealthy farmer's dwelling within an agricultural context has been lost. As a result, it is SHA's determination that the Humes House is not eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C.

Description:

This building is a multi-part frame structure which consists of a two-story dwelling facing west, with a long two-story wing extending to the south, and a two-and-one-half-story ballroom wing extending at an angle to the northeast. The nucleus of the building is the original nineteenth century dwelling, a two-story ca. 40-foot-square hip-roofed building with five-bay (main) west facade. Entrance is in the central bay through a door with transom and sidelights. The doorway leads into a central stairhall which is flanked by double parlors. The siding is German on the first story, and lapped shingle on the second. The cornice is bracketed, and the metal roof has been replaced by synthetic shingle; a one-story porch with square shingled posts wraps around the north and west facades, and above it on the west facade are two enclosed pedimented porches.

Two hip-roofed wings have been built onto the original dwelling: a 70-foot eight bay kitchen wing to the south, and a five-bay ballroom wing attached at an angle to the northeast. The ballroom features two interior rows of Tuscan columns, and a large stone mantel in the end wall. Like the central block, both wings are covered with German siding on the first story and lapped shingled on the second.

Significance:

The Humes House/Briarley Military Academy is a unique multi-part structure which has served as a residence, resort and military academy. It is located on a rise just east of the old Washington-Baltimore Turnpike between Vansville and Muirkirk, and is a prominent and unusual landmark. The original dwelling was built by George Humes in the early 1860's, on the farm which he called Locust Hill, and remained in his family until 1900. It was purchased by Benjamin Bradford, who, in 1911, constructed the two wings with the intention of establishing a resort for vacationers from the District of Columbia. Although Bradford lost the property through default in mortgage, the building was operated as such by subsequent owners until the beginning of the Great Depression. From 1933-1949 the property was leased by Captain Sydney Lodge, and operated as Briarley Military Academy. It has been virtually unused since the school closed. Although the original dwelling house is almost unrecognizable surrounded by the 1911 additions, the building is a unique visual landmark with a varied history.

The building at 11777 Old Baltimore Pike is a multi-part frame structure which consists of a two-story dwelling house facing west, with a long two-story wing extending to the south, and a two-and-one-half story ball-room wing extending at an angle to the northeast.

The nucleus of the building is the original nineteenth century dwelling, a two-story ca. 40 foot square hip-roofed frame building with a five-bay main west facade. Entrance is in the central bay through a door with transom and sidelights. The doorway leads into a central stairhall; there are double parlors in each side of the central hall. There is a fireplace in the dividing wall between the two south parlors, and a communicating door on each side of the fireplace. The two north parlors are connected by a double door; there is another fireplace on the north wall of the stairhall which also serves the northwest parlor. The stair, which curves to the second story from the rear (east) of the stairhall, has heavy turned newel and applied jig-sawn decorations at the stair-ends. Door and window surrounds in this original section are of heavy multi-band molding without corner blocks. The siding is German on the first story, and wooden shingle on the second story. The metal roof has recently been replaced by synthetic shingle; the cornice is bracketed. The foundations are brick and enclose a full basement. A one-story porch with square shingled posts wraps around the north and west facades of this section. Above this porch on the west facade are two enclosed pedimented projecting porches.

Two hip-roofed wings have been built onto the original dwelling house. Extending ca. 70 feet to the south is a two-story eight-bay wing which includes kitchen and other functional spaces; there is a crawlspace under part of this wing. To the northeast of the original dwelling is the ball-room addition, attached at an angle to the original dwelling by small rooms over an open passageway. The ballroom was approximately 16 x 36 feet (and has been extended to the east to ca. 40 x 36 feet). It features two rows of Tuscan columns running the length of the room. Each row includes five freestanding columns with one pilaster at each end. Another set of columns and pilasters frames the large stone mantel in the end (northeast) wall. This extended ballroom space is presently divided into smaller living spaces by temporary partitions. There is a one-story one-bay addition on the (northeast) end of this wing. As in the case of the central (original) block, both wings are covered with German siding on the first story, and wooden shingles on the second. Windows are presently boarded up or shuttered.

West of the building, outside of the kitchen section, is an underground cistern which receives water from the downspouts. Behind and just east of the building is a mobile home.

The building at 11777 Old Baltimore Pike is a multi-part structure which has served as a residence, resort and military academy. It is located on a rise of ground immediately east of the Old Washington-Baltimore turnpike between Vansville and Muirkirk and is a prominent and unusual landmark.

The dwelling house which is the nucleus of the present large structure was probably built by George Humes shortly before his death in 1863. It was located in his 200-acre farm, Locust Hill, which was part of the tract known as Wintersell's Range in the Vansville District.¹ The farm passed after Humes' death to his two minor sons, with the dwelling going to the elder son, George Calhoun Humes. George C. Humes died in 1880 leaving all of his property to his widow Marian T. Humes; she subsequently married Charles Emack, and the Humes dwelling remained the home of the Emacks until 1900. In this year Marion Humes Emack sold the dwelling and 40 acres, which then included the dwelling house, a barn, tenant house, and other outbuildings.² The property changed hands again in 1906 when it was purchased by Benjamin B. Bradford of Washington, D.C.; in 1911 Bradford undertook a major building project, adding a large wing on each side of the dwelling house, with the intention of opening a resort for vacationers from the District of Columbia. In the next two years Bradford took out two mortgages on the property which he was subsequently unable to pay off; in 1916 mortgage was foreclosed, and the property was advertised for sale. At this time it was described as having eleven bedrooms, five baths, four small bedrooms for help, a large dining room, double parlors, ballroom, pantry, kitchen, large porch areas in both first and second stories, as well as numerous separate farm buildings, gardens, an orchard and a nine-room overseer's house. It was purchased by James Place and used subsequently as a summer home and resort.³ In 1929, it was purchased by the Montague family and in 1933 was leased to Captain Sydney Lodge, who established there the Briarley Military Academy, successor to his former Briarley Hall Military Academy in Poolesville, Montgomery County. The Lodge family resided in the building during the years the school operated (1933-1949). The rest of the building (plus the overseer's house) housed sometimes as many as 80 students during these years; the ballroom was converted into a large study hall. Since the closing of the Academy in 1949,

the building has been unoccupied, although members of the Montague family have lived on the property. The building and 29 acres were sold in 1978 to the current owner, who has made substantial repairs to the roof, and is exploring the possibility of establishing a restaurant in the building.

Although the original dwelling house is almost unrecognizable surrounded by the major additions of 1911, the building is a unique visual landmark with a varied history.


