Building Name: Harrison Store and Dwelling (Trolley Stop Shop)

Location: 4624 and 4622 College Avenue, College Park, Maryland

Description:

The Trolley Stop Shop complex stands in the town of College Park, bounded on two sides by a white picket fence. The two buildings form one large L-shaped structure, with its main elevation facing south on College Avenue. The westerly structure is a two-and-one-half-story side-gabled, frame residential structure, three bays by three bays, with three gable-roofed dormers on the south facade. The windows are 6/6, and there is a central entrance with a one-bay gable-roofed porch. This building houses three apartments. Attached to the east gable end of this westerly building is a two-story, front-gable commercial building, three bays by five bays, with a one-story shed-roofed addition across the north gable end. The south gable end has a central entrance and a one-story, hip-roofed porch, now enclosed to form show windows. Like the westerly building, this structure is sided with white asbestos shingle and has gray louvered shutters and an asphalt shingle roof. This building now houses an art supply shop.

Significance:

The Trolley Stop Shop complex consists of two attached buildings which have served a variety of purposes and have been much altered over the years. The westerly building, once a post office now serves as an apartment building; the easterly building, once a grocery store, is now an art supply shop. College Park was platted in 1889 by Johnson and Curriden, and homes were built on the new lots, for the most part by people associated with the Maryland Agricultural College. In 1908, Wirt Harrison purchased lot #8 (the easterly of the two subject lots) and built on it a front-gabled grocery store which he operated until the eve of World War II. In 1912 Harrison purchased the adjoining lot #7, and constructed on it a one-story building which he leased to the U.S. Government as a post office. The post office operated in this location until the mid 1930's, soon after which Harrison raised and enlarged the building and converted it into apartments for University students. Just before the Second World War, Harrison closed his grocery store; since that time, the easterly structure has been the location of a variety of businesses; its original front porch has been enclosed to serve as a show window. The two buildings are an attractive part of the College Park community, but are considerably altered and have the appearance of modern buildings.

The Trolley Stop Shop complex stands on two lots in the town of College Park, bounded on two sides by a white picket fence. These two buildings are attached, but numbered separately (4622 and 4624 College Avenue); they form one large L-shaped structure, with its main elevation facing south on College Avenue, in a residential neighborhood composed largely of University of Maryland rental buildings. The westerly structure is at 4622 College Avenue, a two-and-one-half-story side-gabled, frame residential structure, three bays by three bays, with three gable-roofed dormers on the south (main) facade. The windows are 6/6 with gray louvered shutters, and there is a central entrance with a one-bay gable-roofed porch, supported by wrought-iron posts. The building is covered with white asbestos shingle, and has an asphalt shingle roof. There is a one-story porch with parapetted balcony centered in the west gable end, from which there are entrances into the building on both the first and second stories. There is a one-story, four-bay, shed-roofed addition across the rear (north) of the building, with entrances into both the first and second stories. This building houses three apartments.

Attached to the east gable end of this westerly building is 4624 College Avenue, a two-story, front-gable commercial building, three bays by five bays, with a one-story shed-roofed addition across the rear (north) gable end. The south (principal) gable end has a one-story, hip-roofed porch, now enclosed to form show windows. There is a central entrance between the two large storefront windows. On the east facade, an exterior stairway leads to a second floor entrance in the second bay. Like the westerly building, this structure is sided with white asbestos shingle and has gray louvered shutters and an asphalt shingle roof.

This building now houses an art supply shop; there is an apartment on the second story.

The Trolley Stop Shop complex consists of two attached buildings which have served a variety of purposes and have been much altered over the years. The westerly building, once a post office and now completely rebuilt, now serves as an apartment building. The easterly building, once a grocery store, is now a print shop.

College Park was platted in 1889 by Johnson and Curriden<sup>1</sup>, and homes began to be built on the new lots, for the most part by people associated with the Maryland Agricultural College. At the turn of the century the trolley line was extended out of Washington along the right-of-way which is now Rhode Island Avenue, opening up new business opportunities in the College Park Community. In 1908, a businessman named Wirt Harrison purchased lot #8 (the easterly of the two subject lots) and built on it a front-gabled grocery store which he operated until the eve of World War II.<sup>2</sup> In 1912 Harrison purchased the adjoining lot #7, and constructed on it a small one-story building which he leased to the U.S. Government as a post office facility.<sup>3</sup> The post office operated in this location until the mid 1930's, soon after which Harrison raised and enlarged the building and converted it into apartments for University students. Just before the entrance of the United States into the Second World War, Harrison closed his grocery store in the adjoining building, and rented it to another group which continued the grocery business on the premises. Since that time, the easterly (commercial) structure has been the location of a variety of businesses. The original front porch has been enclosed to serve as a show window. The building now houses art and design supplies on the first story and an apartment above. The westerly building still houses three apartments.<sup>4</sup> The two buildings are an attractive part of the College Park community, but are altered considerably from their original plans, and have the appearance of modern buildings.


