The Lakeland High School is a one-story hip-roofed brick structure with entrance through the central bay of the (main) east facade. The entrance is a double-door set in a round-arched pavillion. There is a three-part window on each side of the door; outside of the pavillion, on each side, is a five-part window. A newer wing extends northward from this original school building, and then turns eastward forming an ell; this northeast addition has recently been converted into a chapel.

In 1926, the P.G. Board of Education decided to establish a high school for Black students to serve the populations of Bladensburg, Brentwood, North Brentwood, Lakeland, Ammendale, Muirkirk and Laurel; Lakeland was chosen as the site because of its central location. The Board advanced the funds for the purchase of the land, and Rosenwald funds paid for the construction of the school building. The school opened in 1928, one of the first high schools for Blacks in Prince George's County, and therefore very significant in the history of local Black education.

In August 1926, the Board of Education entertained the first request, by a Lakeland delegation, for the construction of a high school for Blacks in Lakeland. The Board agreed, with the understanding that the delegation should select the site. This was to be a community effort, i.e., the high school was to serve the communities of Bladensburg, Brentwood, North Brentwood, Lakeland, Ammendale, Muirkirk and Laurel. Lakeland had been chosen as the location because of its central location. The Board of Education was to advance the funds for the purchase of the land, and members of the communities were to repay the advance gradually over a period of years. Money from the Rosenwald fund would pay for the construction of the building.

Accordingly, early in 1928, the Board advanced the money for several lots in Block 14 (just west of the B & O railroad tracks) and a committee of representatives of the communities (chaired by J.W.C. Mack of Lakeland) was appointed to oversee the project until the building was completed and occupied.


The Lakeland High School opened in the fall of 1928, with two teachers and 45 students in grades 8 and 9. In July of 1929, W.J. Conway, Chairman of the Lakeland High School PTA, presented to the Board of Education the balance of the obligation of \$1600 which the communities had agreed to raise. On the 29th of July 1929, the Board instructed that "the community be assured of the Board's appreciation of this evidence of splendid cooperation."

Lakeland was one of the first high schools established for Blacks in Prince George's County, and is therefore very significant in the history of Black education. Over the years, the building served also as a junior high (after larger high schools had been opened), as a local elementary school, as a Special Education Center, and most recently (1983) has been converted into a Korean Catholic Mission.
