Building Name: Tise-Hannon House

Location: 5220 42nd Place, Hyattsville, Maryland

Description:

The Tise-Hannon house is a two-and-one-half story, frame, gable-roofed dwelling house with Queen Anne decorative features. The main block is four bays by three, with horizontal board siding and an off-center pedimented cross gable in the east facade. The off-center main entrance has double paneled doors, and an elliptical fanlight with lead tracery and sidelights with similar tracery. The doorway is covered by a one-story, one-bay, gable-roofed porch supported by double Doric columns, and approached by a flight of steps. The pedimented gable above the entrance has a boxed cornice, within which there is a small 2/2 window and several rows of decorative fish-scale shingles above and below the window. Extending the full height of the house, and at a 45° angle from the southeast corner of the main block, is a rectangular projecting tower. A two-and-one-half story, gable-roofed, semi-hexagonal bay extends from the southwest corner of the main block of the house. A gable-roofed, two-story, one-bay wing extends from the rear (west) elevation, with a small, one-story shed-roofed porch at the southwest corner. The third bay of the north gable end is slightly recessed, providing a deeper cornice overhang. The roof is asphalt shingle; the house rests on a high brick foundation. Exposed rafter ends punctuate the overhanging eaves, and windows are 2/2 double-hung sash, generally arranged in pairs.

Significance:

The Tise-Hannon house is a fine example of an urban transitional Queen Anne style dwelling. It incorporates many lively Queen Anne elements, e.g., projecting tower and bay, and fishscale-shingled pediments, while at the same time featuring Classical Revival elements in the entrance porch and the interior. The house was built by George and Rachel Tise, circa 1892, on lots which they had purchased in 1890 in Wine and Johnson's Second Addition to Hyattsville. The Tises, who ran a retail grocery in Hyattsville, sold their house in 1905; it was later the home of the Kessler family for more than twenty years. The Kesslers sold the house in 1931 to the Rogers family, who undertook several alterations. A Victorian porch which spanned the east facade was removed, and the present Classical Revival porch was built at the entrance. The house is a noticeable landmark; it is one of many Victorian houses still standing in good condition in historic Hyattsville, but is unique in its plan, and a good example of its period and style.

The Tise-Hannon house is a two-and-one-half story, frame, gable-roofed Victorian dwelling house with Queen Anne decorative features. It stands on a wooded lot in a residential community. The main block is four bays by three, with horizontal board siding, and has an off-center pedimented cross gable in the main (east) facade.

The off-center main entrance has double paneled doors, and an elliptical fanlight with lead tracery and sidelights with similar tracery. The doorway is covered by a one-story, one-bay, gable-roofed porch supported by double Doric columns, and approached by a flight of steps. A one-story wing with a balustrade extends from each side of the entrance porch across a portion of the front facade. The pedimented gable above the entrance has a boxed cornice, within which there is a small 2/2 window and several rows of decorative fish-scale shingles above and below the window.

Extending the full height of the house, and at a 45° angle from the southeast corner of the main block, is a rectangular projecting tower. A single, small 2/2 window occupies the space beneath its gable roof, while both the first and second stories of the tower have double 2/2 windows.

A two-and-one-half story, gable-roofed, semi-hexagonal bay extends from the southwest corner of the main block of the house. A single, small, 2/2 window occupies the space beneath the gable peak and there are larger 2/2 double windows in the first and second stories of the bay.

Between the projecting bays at the southeast and southwest corners of the south elevation is a one-story, shed-roofed screened porch with fluted Doric columns at each corner. There is a small gabled dormer on the south roof elevation.

A gable-roofed, two-story, one-bay wing extends from the rear (west) elevation, with a small, one-story shed-roofed porch at the southwest corner. There is a one story, shed-roofed, one bay addition at the north-west corner with a small porch and an entrance. The third bay of the north elevation is slightly recessed, providing a deeper cornice overhang for an entrance at that corner.

The Tise-Hannon house is a fine example of an urban transitional Queen Anne style dwelling. It incorporates many lively Queen Anne elements, e.g., projecting tower and bay, and fishscale-shingled pediments, while at the same time featuring Classical Revival elements in the entrance porch and the interior.

The house was built by George and Rachel Tise, circa 1892, on lots which they had purchased in 1890 in Wine and Johnson's Second Addition to Hyattsville.¹ Their house lots fronted on Avon Avenue (now 42nd Place), just west of the Ravenswood estate, which was one of the oldest homes in the area (it was demolished in the 1950's). This section of Hyattsville had been platted in 1883², and extended the boundaries of this still-new suburban town which was becoming a desirable place of residence for commuters to the Capital city. (An 1878 account describes the new town as follows: "Hyattsville, on the Washington Branch of the Baltimore Ohio Railroad, is a beautiful village, tasteful houses in the modern style of architecture, ornamented with gardens and lawns, is largely indebted, for its prosperity, to Christopher C. Hyatt,it has gradually increased in beauty and prosperity until it stands as one of the foremost villages between Baltimore and Washington."³)

The Tises, who ran a retail grocery in Hyattsville,⁴ sold their house in 1905; it was later the home of the Kessler family for more than twenty years.⁵ The Kesslers sold the house in 1931 to the Rogers family, who undertook several alterations. A Victorian porch which spanned the east facade was removed, and the present Classical Revival porch was built at the entrance; the leaded fanlight and sidelights were also added at this time.⁶ Since 1964, this house has been the home of the Hannon family.⁷ It is a noticeable landmark in the town of Hyattsville: one of many Victorian houses still standing in good condition in this historic town, but unique in its individual plan, and a good example of its period and style.

There are two interior corbelled brick chimneys at the ridge, one at the north gable end, and another to the south behind the cross gable. The roof is asphalt shingle and the main block of the house rests on a high brick foundation. Exposed rafter ends punctuate the overhanging eaves, and windows are 2/2 double-hung sash, generally arranged in pairs.

The interior of the house consists of central stairhall with two connecting parlors on the south, and one large parlor on the north. The staircase rises at the rear (west) of the hall; it has a heavy turned newel of arts-and-crafts style, and has turned balusters. The rear (west) of the house consists of a kitchen. The two south parlors were once connected by sliding doors. Each of these parlors had a diagonal fireplace in its center north corner. The fireplace in the west parlor is now covered over. The east (front) parlor has a handsome Classical Revival mantel (wooden and painted white) with applied raised molding in rinceaux pattern; the shelf is supported by acanthus-covered console brackets, and has a dentilled frieze.

The north parlor has a fireplace centered on its north (exterior) wall; it is similar in style to that in the east parlor, but not identical. It has raised moldings of rosettes, urns and swags, and has a dentilled frieze. Glass double doors have replaced the sliding doors at the entrance of this north parlor. The parlors have plaster ceiling medallions with floral ornament.


