Description:

The Crandell-Cook house is a three-part frame gable-roofed building, located at the east end of Crandall Road on high ground above the Bald Hill Branch. The largest section is the easternmost, a three bay by two bay, three-story structure. Entrance is in the central bay of the three-bay south facade, through a door with three-pane sidelights, single pane transom, and dentilled frieze. There is an interior chimney at the ridge at each end of the gable roof. The roof is steeply pitched and pierced on each plane by two tall dormer windows. There is a two story porch across the east gable end which wraps around the north facade; it rests on brick piers, and has plain posts and balusters. The siding of this main section is plain weatherboard painted red. The windows throughout are 2/2, with plain board surrounds and white louvered shutters. There are two smaller buildings attached to the main building and extending to the west. A two-story frame cross-gable building is attached to the main block at its northeast corner. Its roof extends to the west where it joins the westernmost section, another two-story gable-roofed building. Both the central and west sections rest on heavy stone foundations; the floor structure of the central section consists of heavy hewn joists joined with the hewn sill in mortise and tenon joints. Both of these smaller sections are covered with German siding painted red. The roof of the entire structure is green asphalt shingle. A short distance north of the house is a gable-roofed board-and-batten bank barn.

Significance:

The Crandell-Cook House is a complex of buildings, beginning as a simple early nineteenth century farmhouse, expanded in two stages over the next century into a three-part 23-room structure. The 120-acre Bald Hill farm, including a dwelling with an old stone foundation, was purchased in 1883 by George Crandell. In 1901 Crandell sold the farm to O.F. Cook, a botanist conducting plant research for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In the next year, Cook undertook construction of the large three-story structure which he built onto the southeast corner of the old dwelling. Within the next few years three more families of research scientists built homes in the immediate vicinity. The Cook residence thus became the nucleus of a unique suburban scientific community; Cook, Collins, Kempton, and Scofield became pre-eminent in their fields, particularly in plant introduction. The house is now an imposing and unusual complex of buildings, in a unique setting which is a rural oasis amidst fast-developing commercial/ industrial areas.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Crandell-Cook house is located at the east end of Crandall Road on high ground as it drops down to the east towards the Bald Hill Branch. It is composed of three frame gable-roofed buildings joined together. The largest section (A) is the easternmost, a three-bay by two bay, three story structure, ca. 36 by 24 feet. The principal facade is the three-bay south facade. Entrance is in the center bay, through a door with three-pane sidelights and single pane transom. Above the door is a dentilled frieze. On each side of the central door is a double 2/2 double hung sash window. There is an interior chimney at the ridge at each end of the gable roof. The roof is steeply pitched and pierced on each plane by two tall dormer windows. There is a two story porch across the east gable end which wraps around the north facade; it rests on brick piers, and has plain posts and balusters. The siding of this main section is plain weatherboard painted red. The windows throughout are 2/2, with plain board surrounds and white louvered shutters. The interior plan is central stairhall flanked by parlors.

There are two smaller buildings attached to the main building and extending to the west. A two-story frame cross-gable building is attached to the main building at its northwest corner. (Communication between the two structures is through the enclosed west end of the above-cited porch). This cross-gable section, (B) ca. 31' by 16', has a one-bay gable end on the south, and two-bay on the north; windows are 6/6 double hung sash. Its cross-gable roof extends to the west where it joins the westernmost section (C), another two-story gable-roofed building (ca. 26' by 14') offset slightly to the north from the line of the central section, and with its roof ridge running north and south. Double 2/2 windows with plain board surrounds fill the one-bay south gable end.

Both the central section (B) and west section (C) rest on heavy stone foundations, of local iron-bearing sandstone. From a dug-out basement under the central section it is possible to observe the floor structure of the central section. Heavy hewn joists are joined with the hewn sill in mortise and tenon joints. Both of these smaller sections are covered with German siding painted red. The roof of the entire structure is green asphalt shingle.

A short distance north of the house is a gable-roofed board-and-batten bank barn which rests on a coursed stone foundation of local iron-bearing sandstone. One enters the upper level through a sliding double door on the south; there is a central opening into the lower level on the north. Posts and joists appear to be machine sawn.

The Crandell-Cook House is a unique complex of buildings, beginning as a simple early nineteenth century farmhouse, expanded in two stages over the next century into a three-part 23-room structure. The ca. 250 acre Bald Hill Farm on which it stands belonged from the mid-nineteenth century to Camilla Cross.<sup>1</sup> About 120 acres of the farm, including a dwelling with an old stone foundation was purchased in 1883 by George Crandell, a government clerk from Pennsylvania who lived in the old house with his family until the beginning of the twentieth century. He is reported to have disassembled and transported from Pennsylvania the barn which now stands on heavy stone foundations a short distance north of the house.<sup>2</sup> In 1901 Crandell sold his 120-acre farm to O.F. Cook, a botanist who had, under the McKinley administration, begun plant research for the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In the next year, Cook undertook construction of the large three-story structure which he built onto the southeast corner of the old dwelling. Within the next few years three more families of research scientists followed Cook's example and built homes in the immediate vicinity, using the newly built (1906) Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis (electric) Railroad to commute into Washington to the U.S.D.A. laboratories. (Cherry Grove station was just over the hill from Cook's house.) The Cook residence thus became the nucleus of a unique suburban scientific community. The families kept livestock and did some limited experimental plantings on the land. The four scientists, Cook, Collins, Kempton, and Scofield became pre-eminent in their fields, particularly in plant introduction.<sup>3</sup>

In later years the Cooks constructed another addition on the west end of the house, placing it on a new stone foundation similar to that of the oldest section of the house. The house is now an imposing and unusual complex of buildings, in a unique setting which is a rural oasis amidst fast-developing commercial/industrial areas.
