The Duvall Family Cemetery, also known as the "Wigwam Cemetery," is located on the eastern side of MD 193, Glenn Dale Boulevard, South of 11900 Glenn Dale Blvd., Glenn Dale, Prince George's County, MD. It is the only surviving remnant of the Wigwam Farm, part of the holdings of the Duvall family. Since the early 19th century, the site was used as the Duvall Family's private burial ground. In 1986 the Society of Maren Duvall descendants obtained a permit to remove the remains of family members and reinter them at Marietta. All existing above-ground head stones were removed from the cemetery and reset at Marietta. There are an unknown number of graves remaining in the cemetery but no visible grave markers.

Prior to 1986, the site had the potential to yield information about past history and thus be eligible under Criterion D. However, because of the removal of many of the remains to Marietta and the uncertainty of how many additional graves might remain, the site is unlikely to provide significant information about the past and thus is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion D. Nor does it provide resources which would meet Criteria A, B or C and thus was not considered under any of those criteria.

The Duvall Family Cemetery, also known as the "Wigwam Cemetery," is located on the eastern side of Md 193, Glenn Dale Boulevard, between the new Glenn Dale Fire Station to the north and the path of the WB&A Rail road right-of-way (ROW) to the south. The cemetery is 200 feet northwest of the existing WB&A ROW, and approximately 30 feet in elevation above the ROW. The cemetery is not visible from Glenn Dale Boulevard or the WB&A ROW. There are no visible tombstones at the cemetery; all stones were moved to the grounds of Marietta in the 1980s. The cemetery is now hidden and overgrown within a wooded area. There is no existing fence or wall delineating the cemetery.

Significance

The Duvall Family Cemetery is the only surviving remnant of the Wigwam Farm, part of the holdings of the Duvall family. Until circa 1982 a nineteenth-century farmhouse stood close to the cemetery; it was demolished before the construction of Glenn Dale Boulevard (Md 93). The graveyard has, from early in the nineteenth century, been the private burial ground of members of the Duvall family. In 1986, the Society of Maren Duvall Descendants obtained a permit from Prince George's County's State's Attorney, Arthur Marshall, to remove the remains of Duvall family members from the cemetery and re-inter them at Marietta (PG 70-20) home of Judge Gabriel Duvall. The Duvall Family Cemetery is the only surviving remnant of the Wigwam Farm, part of the holdings of the Duvall family. Until circa 1982 a nineteenth-century farmhouse stood close to the cemetery; it was demolished before the construction of Glenn Dale Boulevard (Md 93). The graveyard has, from early in the nineteenth century, been the private burial ground of members of the Duvall family.

In 1986, the Society of Mareen Duvall Descendants obtained a permit from Prince George's County's State's Attorney, Arthur Marshall, to remove the remains of Duvall family members from the cemetery and re-inter them at Marietta (PG 70-20) home of Judge Gabriel Duvall. Those individuals are: (1) Gabriel Duvall, (2) Col. Edmund B. Duvall (son of Gabriel), (3) Augusta Caroline Duvall (wife of Edmund), (4) Mary Frances Duvall and (5) infant Gabriel Duvall (children of Edmund and Augusta), (6) Jane Gibbon Duvall (wife of Gabriel Duvall), and her mother (7) Mary Gibbon. In February, 1986, Mr. Richard Muzzrole was hired by the Society of Mareen Duvall Descendants to excavate the remains of Judge Gabriel Duvall and wife Jane Duvall. In addition, all existing above ground grave markers were removed from the cemetery and re-set at Marietta. There is no existing fence or wall delineating the cemetery.

In September of 1994, the Society of Mareen Duvall Descendants requested that the M-NCPPC archaeology program finish the project. The remains from one grave (probably Mrs. Gibbon) were removed. However, for lack of logistical and financial support excavations were discontinued. There are an unknown number of graves remaining in the cemetery but no visible grave markers.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Marcus DuVal House is located ca. 1400' east of Bell Station Road and ca. 1500' south of Daisy Lane in Prince George's County, Maryland. The building consists of two major parts. The first is a 2½ story frame block with a brick foundation, a steeply pitched gable roof, a small brick chimney astride the ridge near its north end, and a central closed pediment with window on the west or principal facade. Below the pediment are a pair of 2/2 double hung sash windows and a door on the first floor, and two paired casement windows on the second. Adjoining the west facade is a single story porch, three bays wide and sheltered by a shed roof supported by four square columns. Adjoining the east facade is a similar projection, its left half enclosed and pierced by a pair of 6/6 double hung sash windows. A high brick chimney rises near the east wall. On the north facade is a gable window and on the lower right, a 4/4 double hung sash window.

The second major section is similar to the first and forms a "T" with it on the south. A small brick chimney rises south of the ridge below which is a central pediment similar to that on the west. For the most part windows are regularly disposed and are of the 2/2 double hung sash type. An expansive porch, adjoining that of the first section, encloses the second section on three sides. Unlike the former, its floor is raised on concrete piers and its roof supports consist of Tuscan Doric columns.

Both walls and roof are covered with shingles.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Marcus DuVal House is a good example of mid nineteenth century domestic vernacular architecture. Its addition with porch and Tuscan Doric columns may date to the late nineteenth or early twentieth century. The present structure replaced an earlier "mansion" house¹ which burned ca. 1860. NE of the house ca. 100 yards is a small family cemetery with several large tombstones. Marcus DuVal (1824-?) was a grandson of Gabriel DuVall, an associate justice of the United States Supreme Court from 1812 until 1835. Many Indian artifacts reportedly have been found on the property.




