Description

Cedar Hill is a frame gable-roofed house prominently situated on a hill. It consists of a main block, with enclosed sunporch at one end, and kitchen wing and later addition at the other end. The main block is two-and-one-half stories high with entrance in the central bay of the five-bay south facade, through a door with classical architrave, frieze and crown molding, and with three-pane sidelights over wainscot panels. Siding is plain horizontal board painted white. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash with plain board surrounds and black louvered shutters. The roof is of red standing seam metal; its deeply overhanging eaves have a belled profile. The cornices have crown molding, and are returned at the gable ends. Three added gable-roof pedimented dormers pierce the south plane of the roof; an interior corbelled brick chimney rises at the ridge at each gable end. The main block rests on a heavy foundation of local iron-bearing sandstone. Attached at the northwest corner of the house is a one-and-one-half-story gable-roofed kitchen wing, contemporary with the main block. Siding, cornices and windows of the wing duplicate those of the main block, and the roof has the same belled profile. Attached to the northwest corner of the kitchen wing is a (1940's) one-and-one-half-story gable-roofed addition.

Significance

Cedar Hill is a handsome Colonial Revival style house, built on the site of the Weems/Bowie family homestead. In 1836 the farm was divided, the 330-acre westerly section going to Margaret French Bowie, whose husband came to be known as "Robert Bowie of Cedar Hill." Bowie lost the Cedar Hill farm after the Civil War, and the farm was purchased by the Cooke family of Baltimore; the old Cedar Hill dwelling was destroyed circa 1880. In 1915, 150 acres of the Cedar Hill farm, including the house site, were purchased by Robert Bowie's great-grandson, Joseph Addison, who hired Millard Shafter (a local carpenter to whom several other fine houses of that period are attributed) to build the present Colonial Revival dwelling on the site of his great-grandfather's old house. Cedar Hill remains the home of the Addison family today. The commanding site and grounds have been meticulously maintained, and the handsome house retains its historical and architectural integrity.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Cedar Hill is a two-and-one-half-story frame gable-roofed house prominently situated on a hill among many old poplar trees. The house consists of a five-bay-by-two-bay main block, with enclosed sunporch at one end, and a lower kitchen wing and later addition at the other end. It is a twentieth century building constructed to replace an earlier dwelling on the same site.

The main block of the house is two-and-one-half stories high with entrance in the central bay of the five-bay south (main) facade. Entrance is through a door with classical architrave, frieze and crown molding, and has three-pane sidelights over wainscot panels. There is a corresponding door centered in the north facade. Each door is approached by a small brick stoop; there is no entry porch. Siding is plain horizontal board painted white. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash with plain board surrounds and black louvered shutters. The roof is of red standing seam metal; its deeply overhanging eaves have a belled profile. The cornices have crown molding, and are returned at the gable ends. There are two tiny four-pane windows at third level in each gable end. Three (added) gable-roof dormers pierce the south plane of the roof; the dormers are pedimented with crown moldings. The dormers in the two outer positions are repeated on the north plane of the roof, but the center position is filled by a shallow shed dormer. (Below it, in the central bay between first and second story level, is a 6/6 double hung sash window which lights the stair landing.) An interior corbelled brick chimney rises at the ridge at each gable end. The main block rests on a heavy foundation of local iron-bearing sandstone.

Interior of the main block consists of a wide central stairhall with a large parlor on each side. The stairhall is highlighted by a wide entry arch leading to the two-run staircase which rises along its east wall. Each parlor is warmed by a fireplace centered on its exterior wall. Both mantels on the first story were acquired from (older) historic buildings in Prince George's County and incorporated into Cedar Hill when it was built in 1916. The handsome Federal style wooden mantel in the east parlor is said to have come from Mattaponi. It is framed by engaged columns, and has classical architrave, frieze and complex dentilled cornice. The wide frieze is embellished with raised ornament: shell motifs at the ends, and an oval figured medallion at the center.

Cedar Hill is a handsome Colonial Revival style house, built on the site of the Weems/Bowie family homestead. This farm, which included parts of tracts known as Darnall's Grove and Widow's Purchase, had been the home of James William Lock Weems during the late eighteenth century. (He and members of his family are buried in the small family burial ground one-quarter mile from the house.)¹ In 1836 the farm was divided between the families of Weems' two daughters, the 330-acre westerly section (which came to be known as Cedar Hill) going to Margaret French Bowie, whose husband used the sobriquet "Robert Bowie of Cedar Hill" to distinguish himself from his cousins of the same name.² Bowie lost the Cedar Hill farm after the Civil War through default in tax payments, and the farm was purchased by the Cooke family of Baltimore; the old Cedar Hill dwelling was destroyed during this time period, ca. 1880.³

The Cookes held the Cedar Hill property into the twentieth century, though it is doubtful that they ever lived there. In 1915, 150 acres of the Cedar Hill farm, including the house site, were purchased by Robert Bowie's great-grandson, Joseph Addison. Addison hired a local carpenter to build the present Colonial Revival dwelling on the site of his great-grandfather's old house. Millard Shafer, a well-known carpenter in the Bowie vicinity, had in 1909 build the house at Spafield (P.G. #70-21) for cousins of the Addisons, and in 1916 was hired by Addison to build a new house at Cedar Hill. Having access to several historic houses in deteriorating condition, Shafer acquired decorative elements for use in his new houses. One of the mantels which was built into Cedar Hill in 1916 came from Mattaponi (P.G. #86A-15) and another from the Snowden Hill house at Thorpland (now destroyed). (Within a few years Shafer built another Colonial Revival house for Addison's brother, French Bowie Addison, on the neighboring and related farm known as Boxlee.⁴)

Attached at the northwest corner of the house (and enclosing half of the west gable end of the main block) is a one-and-one-half-story one-bay-wide gable-roofed kitchen wing, contemporary with the main block. Entry is through a door in the second bay of its west gable end. The roof of the kitchen wing has the same belled profile as the main block. Siding, cornices and windows of the wing duplicate those of the main block, and there is a single pedimented dormer in the south plane of its roof. The wing rests on a brick foundation.

Across the east gable end of the main block is a one-story hip-roofed porch, which has been glass-enclosed as a sun porch. This porch rests on deep stone foundations; beneath it at grade level, a central entrance leads into the basement under the main block.

Attached to the northwest corner of the kitchen wing is a new (1940's) one-and-one-half-story gable-roofed addition. Siding, windows and roof profile follow those of the main block and kitchen; this one-room addition rests on a brick foundation.

Cedar Hill stands on the highest point of land overlooking the Horsepen Branch. The house is approached by an unpaved deeply-cut lane from the south which curves to the west of the house and leads to a separate (modern) garage structure northwest of the house.

Many large old tulip poplars surround and shelter the house, and the lawn to the north of the house is planted with a boxwood alley.

#8 (Continued)

Cedar Hill remains the home of the Addison family today. The house has been altered by the addition of dormers, and of a small wing; over the years, most of the Cedar Hill property has been sold off, and a subdivision of new houses has been built around the remaining 3.89 acre house site. Its commanding site and grounds, complete with boxwood allee, have been meticulously maintained, and this handsome Colonial Revival style house retains its historical and architectural integrity.

This was an old plantation home called "Cedar Hill" that burned down years ago. The present, large frame house on the site was built ca. 1900. NW of the house is an overgrown cemetery at the edge of a hill. It contains gravestones for members of the Bowie and Weems families. Beyond this, at the bottom of the hill, is a ruinous, one-story frame building that was once a slavequarters. It has three bays on its main (south) facade. There is a large brick chimney on the exterior west wall. Roof is covered with old wooden shingles. Asphalt siding.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This has been the home of a number of old Prince George's families-including the Weems, Bowies and Addisons. Its best-known resident was Robert Bowie (born 1804-died 1881), who made this a prosperous farm. He was also active in the formation of the Md. Jockey Club, Agricultural College, and the Baltimore and Potomac RR. This was his wife's property, and her mother had been a Weems. Reportedly, a James Weems (born 1764-died 1811) is buried in the cemetery here. The slave quarters, although in ruins, is one of the few surviving in the County.

The property is being subdivided into the Prospect Knolls Subdivision.


