Description:

Belvidere is a two-part hip-and-gable-roof frame plantation house which stands on a large level lot in a developing residential area. The main block is of the side hall and double parlor plan. Entrance is in the first bay of the three-bay east facade through a door enframed by shallow classical pilasters and pediment. Siding is plain horizontal board painted white. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash. There is a narrow molded frieze course beneath the boxed cornice; two interior corbelled brick chimneys rise at the north elevation. Extending to the south from the main block is a gable-roof wing which predates the main block. A corbelled brick chimney defines the division between the two spaces in this wing. Siding, fenestration, and roof covering are similar to that of the main block. There is a one-story projecting semi-octagonal bay in the third bay of the main east facade. The stone foundation of the wing encloses a cellar space, in which can be seen the stone chimney with fire box opening into the southerly section.

Significance:

Belvidere is an unusual example of a hip-roof Greek Revival style plantation house distinguished by its hip roof and the fact that the main block was built onto an earlier vernacular dwelling. The property on which the house stands is part of a tract called Beall's Gift, which, late in the eighteenth century, belonged to Belt Brashears. At that time, Brashears lived in a small frame dwelling, which may be incorporated into the present kitchen wing of Belvidere. After Brashears' death in 1815, his approximately 130 acre farm passed to George W. Duvall of Prospect Hill, who devised it to his son of the same name. George W. Duvall II built the mainblock at the time of his marriage in 1856. The plan of the main block, and its interior trim are very similar to those of Buena Vista, the home built at the same time by a cousin, William T. Duvall. Although Duvall lost both Prospect Hill and Belvidere during the upheaval of the Civil War, Belvidere remained in his family until 1905. During the 1940's it was the home of Walter D. Addison, who later (1954-1966) became Prince George's County Register of Wills. Although Belvidere's plan and trim is similar to that of several other frame plantation houses of the period, it differs in that it has a hip roof and in that it incorporates an earlier structure. Most of its plain, Greek Revival trim survives intact. Belvidere is a good example of a mid-nineteenth century frame plantation house, with decorative details typical of the period.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Belvidere is a two-part hip-and-gable-roof frame plantation house which stands on a large level lot in a developing residential area. It is distinguished by its size and setting, and its Greek Revival style trim.

The mid-nineteenth century main block is two and one-half stories with hip roof, three bays wide and roughly square. Entrance is in the first bay of the principal east facade through a six-panel door with narrow four-pane transom and three pane-sidelights over wainscot panels. The door is enframed by shallow classical pilasters and pediment. The door is approached by a new brick stoop with metal railing.

Siding is plain horizontal board painted white. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash, taller on the first story; they have narrow molded surrounds, plain wood sills, and dark green louvered shutters. The window in the third bay of the west (rear) facade is downset to light the staircase landing. There is a narrow molded frieze course beneath the boxed cornice. The hip roof is covered with green asphalt shingle, and there are two interior corbelled brick chimneys at the north elevation. A one-story gable-roof porch has been built at the north end of the main block; it rests on a brick foundation, is accessible by a door in its west facade, and is now glass- and screen-enclosed.

Interior plan of the main block consists of side stairhall with double parlors adjoining on the north. The two-run open-string staircase rises along the south wall of the stairhall; it has a heavy turned newel and panelled spandrel. Door and window surrounds are of plain board with bullseye corner blocks. Between the two north parlors hang six-panel double doors, which fold open into the west (rear) parlor. The mantels in these parlors are wooden, Greek Revival in style; in each the firebox is framed by plain pilasters, and the wide frieze is highlighted by a shallow projecting ogee arch, similar to those of Buena Vista (P.G. #70-17). The high wooden baseboards have crown molding.

Extending to the south from the south facade of the main block is a two-and-one-half-story gable-roof wing which predates the hip-roof main block. This two-parlor wing is three bays by one bay, with a corbelled brick chimney defining the division between its two-bay southerly kitchen section, and its one-bay northerly parlor. The wing rests on a foundation of local iron-bearing stone. Siding, fenestration, and roof covering are similar to that of the main block. In the third bay of the main east facade, a one-story projecting semi-octagonal bay was added at the end of the nineteenth century. This bay is covered with German siding and rests on a brick foundation; it has 2/2 windows surmounted by molded horizontal panels, wide corner boards, and a wide overhanging boxed cornice. Interior trim in the wing is of plain board.

A narrow two-story shed addition along the west facade of the wing extends its width to make it flush with the main block. At the south end of the wing is a two-story shed-roof porch; it rests on concrete piers, is covered with German siding and is lighted by banks of awning type windows.

The stone foundation of the south wing encloses a shallow cellar space. A batten door in the south gable end leads into the cellar from under the shed porch. In this cellar space can be seen the hand-hewn sill beams with mortise and tenon joints. Visible between the two sections of the wing is the stone foundation of the central chimney. The firebox opens into the southerly section of the cellar; above it is a massive hand hewn lintel beam, suggesting that this southerly space served as the kitchen of the original house.

The grounds at Belvidere include several large maples in the east yard. An unpaved drive gives access to the house from the east. South of the drive is a small storage shed; there are no other outbuildings.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

Belvidere is an unusual example of a hip-roof Greek Revival style plantation house; although the plan and trim of the house is typical of the mid-nineteenth century, the hip roof makes it unusual in Prince George's County. It is distinguished also by the fact that the main block was built onto an earlier small vernacular dwelling.

The property on which the house stands is part of a tract called Beall's Gift, which, late in the eighteenth century, belonged to Belt Brashears. At that time, Brashears lived in a small frame dwelling, 24 by 20 feet; this dwelling, rebuilt in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, may be incorporated into the present kitchen wing of Belvidere.¹

After Brashears' death in 1815, his heirs sold his approximately 130 acre farm to Richard Duvall, who lived on property adjoining this to the north (the present site of Glenn Dale Hospital). On Richard Duvall's death, in 1834, the farm passed to his children, who sold it in 1842 to their cousin, George W. Duvall of Prospect Hill.² It is probable that the main block of the house was built by G. W. Duvall's son (of the same name) after he inherited the property from his father, and at the time of his marriage (1856) to his Ohio cousin, Maxcey Rankin. The plan of the main block, and its interior trim are very similar to those of Buena Vista, the home built in the early 1850's by another cousin, William T. Duvall.³ George W. Duvall II lived at Belvidere for only a short time; during the Civil War, he went into debt and judgments were brought against him in 1866. Belvidere was seized and sold by the County Sheriff in 1867; it was purchased by Duvall's mother-in-law, Eliza Rankin of Ohio, who held the land for nearly 30 years.⁴ Duvall had also lost the family homestead, Prospect Hill; he and his family lived during the post-war period at another Duvall family farm a short distance northeast of Belvidere. Belvidere was apparently leased to tenants for part of this period.⁵

George W. Duvall II died in 1892, and his mother-in-law died three years later. Mrs. Rankin's will devised Belvidere to her daughter, Maxcey Rankin Duvall, who resided at Belvidere with her sister-in-law, Elizabeth H. Duvall, until early in the twentieth century. Family tradition indicates that Mrs. Duvall opened a school at Belvidere, and educated the children of her Slingluff relatives at nearby Locust Grove. She sold Belvidere in 1905.⁶

During this century Belvidere has been the home of three families; in the 1940's it was the home of Walter D. Addison, who later (1954-1966) became Prince George's County Register of Wills. Since 1951 it has been the home of the Starkey family.

Belvidere is a good example of a mid-nineteenth century plantation house. Although its plan and trim is similar to that of several other frame plantation houses of the period, it differs in that it has a hip roof and also in that it incorporates an earlier structure. There are two other nearly contemporary hip-roof dwellings of this plan in Prince George's County: the Richard W. Bowie house at Groome's Lot (P.G. #78-5a) and Trumps Hill (P.G. #82A-12). In both of these cases, a wing has been built onto the pyramidal-roof main block, this changing the lines of the house. In the case of Belvidere, although the older (south) section of the house has been altered, the lines of the main block are still clear. Most of its plain, rather rustic Greek Revival trim survives intact. Belvidere is a good example of a mid-nineteenth century frame plantation house, with decorative details typical of the period.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Belvidere stands on a tract of land known as Beall's Gift, owned by Richard Duvall in the early nineteenth century. It is possible that the south section of the house was already constructed when he bequeathed the land to his daughter, Elizabeth, upon his death in 1834. In 1842, the land came into the hands of George Washington Duvall of Prospect Hill (Elizabeth's uncle), who bequeathed it to his son of the same name in 1856. It is probable that G.W. Duvall II built the larger north section of the house, and gave it the name "Belvidere". He lived there until 1867, when, as a result of a judgment against him, Belvidere had to be sold. He lost Prospect Hill also, two years later, and moved to a farm on land adjoining Belvidere. The Belvidere farm was kept in the family, however; in 1895 it was bequeathed to Duvall's widow, who ran a school there for her Slingluff relatives of nearby Locust Grove. A later resident was Walter D. Addison, who became Register of Wills 1954-1966.

Maps, atlases, local, state and family histories and geneological records, deeds, tax assessments, chancery records, etc., were examined in researching Belvedere. Officers in the Society of Duvall descendants¹, Maryland Historical Trust County Committee members and Prince George County Historical Society members were consulted.

As to maps, a structure corresponding to Belvedere owned by Washington Duvall was found in the 1861 Martenet map of Prince George's County. The structure was indicated, but not identified on the 1878 Hopkins Atlas of Prince George's County and a 1911 Geological Survey Map. The owner was George Washington Duvall, whose name was frequently abbreviated, and who was living at Belvedere according to a local history².

Belvedere could have been part of two land patents: Orphans Gift of John Smith³; or Beales Gift of James Greenfield⁴, both containing about 500 acres⁵. It is difficult to ascertain on what parcel of land owned by George Washington Duvall Belvedere was located. Among the possible parcels are (1) dwelling-plantation (unnamed) of 220 acres and land purchased of John Boyd which was willed by Charles Duvall⁶ (son of Benjamin Duvall) to his son, G.W. Duvall⁷, and (2) lands willed by George Washington Duvall to his son of the same name, purchased from Charles Duvall, Fielder Cross and Mrs. Merriken⁸. Belvedere is not mentioned by name in land records until a transaction deeding the property from Edna Addison to James Starkey, Junior⁹, which also referred to the property as Maxley Land.

With the assumption that Belvedere is located on the Orphans Gift parcel, a chain of title was completed as far back as 1842, when it was deeded from Charles Duvall to George W. Duvall¹⁰. It is not clear which Charles Duvall is the grantor, because no reference to a person of that name has been found that was married to a Maria (the name that appears on the 1840 tax assessment for the 1st election district). Unfortunately there remains a 140 year gap between this deed and the 1688 land patent due to the fact that no transaction concerning that tract and a Charles Duvall could be found in deed records from 1698-1840. The will of Richard Duvall cited in the deed did not turn up relevant information¹¹. The codicil to the will was not examined. The inventories and court administration records did not contain references to the land. Benedict Brashears deeded a portion of Beales Gift to Richard Duvall¹².

As to real property assessments, both Orphans Gift and Beales Gift were assessed in two different hundreds: either the Collington/Western Branch hundred; or Horsepen/Patuxent hundred. In Collington hundred assessments, portions of Orphans Gift was owned by Joseph Crop (or Crofts) and Basil Duckett in 1829 and 1810, joined by Elizabeth Wilson in 1796, and in Horsepen hundred Gabriel Duvall is owner listed in 1829 and 1819, to be joined by Joseph Crofts in 1796. As to Beales Gift, that portion in Collington was owned by Be~~it~~ (~~Benedict~~) Brashears in the 1829, 1810 and 1796 assessments; Beales gift portions in Horsepen were owned by Richard Duvall in 1829 and 1810, and by Alexander Duvall and James Wilson in the 1796 assessment. No improvements were listed for the properties in those assessment years.

By 1840, Charles and Maria Duvall, of the 1st election district, were the only owners listed for Orphans Gift (a 9 acre parcel) and Beales Gift (a 200 acre parcel).

The house is a two story, frame, clapboard sheathed structure, built in several sections. The larger (north) block is three bays with the entrance in the south bay of the main (east) facade. The doorway carries a low-pitched pediment that projects only slightly from the wall surface. A hall, with staircase at the west end, and double parlors opening off it, runs along the south end of this block. On the north end are two internal chimneys; the roof is hipped. This wing sits on a brick foundation.

The south wing, which sits on a separate stone foundation, is smaller and lower. It has a central chimney and gable roof.






