Description

The Cottage at Warington is a three-part frame dwelling of the second quarter of the nineteenth century. It consists of a main block whose gable roof has been extended to form a saltbox or catslide profile, and a shed-roof hyphen which connects this main block to an originally freestanding kitchen. The main block of the house is one and one half stories, three bays by two, with entrance in the third bay of the main three-bay south facade. Siding of the main block is plain horizontal board of varying widths on the south facade, and German siding elsewhere, all painted white. The saltbox roof is covered with corrugated metal. Two freestanding chimneys, built of local iron-bearing stone, rise at the west gable end. Carved into one stone of the larger southerly chimney is the legend "N 1842", and there is a pent which may be original to the house. Two gable dormers, symmetrically placed, break through the south plane of the roof, and two more pierce the north plane of the roof. The building rests on a foundation of the local iron-bearing sand stone. A short distance northwest of the main block is a small frame one-story kitchen building, the ridge of its gable roof at right angles to that of the main block; it is now connected to the northwest section of the main block by a narrow shed-roof hyphen.

Significance

The Cottage at Warington is a unique example in Prince George's County of a small plantation dwelling with saltbox, or catslide, roof. It is also unusual in that the chimneys are built of local iron-bearing sandstone, a material regularly used for foundations, but not ordinarily used in the construction of chimneys. The Cottage at Warington was constructed, probably by Washington Hilleary, in 1842, the date carved into one of the chimney stones. The north addition, which gives the building its unusual profile, was added very soon after construction of the main block was begun. Before the Civil War, the property came into the possession of Marsham Waring, and served as one of the farms of his large estate. After his death in 1860, the property passed to two more generations of his family, and in 1937 was purchased by Newton H. White, and incorporated into his dairy farm, the Enterprise Estate. In 1971, Newton White's widow sold the property to the M-NCPPC, and it became part of the Enterprise Golf Course and Newton White Estate.

The Cottage at Warrington is a three-part frame dwelling of the second quarter of the nineteenth century. It consists of a main block whose gable roof has been extended to form a saltbox or catslide profile, and a shed-roof hyphen which connects this main block to an originally freestanding kitchen. It stands on a knoll overlooking the old road between Bladensburg and Queen Anne, framed by ancient white oaks.

The main block of the house is one and one half stories, three bays by two, with entrance in the third bay of the main three-bay south facade. Entrance is through a plain modern door, with a wide four-light transom (now boarded up). The entrance is sheltered by a modern one-story entry porch with pedimented gable roof; it is supported by plain wood posts, and rests on a concrete slab.

Siding of the main block is plain horizontal board of varying widths on the south facade, and German siding elsewhere. The boards of the south facade vary greatly in width, and the beaded corner blocks survive; the south cornice has a quarter-round crown molding, which may be original. All siding is painted white. Windows are generally 6/6 double hung sash, and long 4/4 in the gable ends, with plain board surrounds. There are no shutters, but remnants of shutter dogs indicate their earlier use.

The saltbox roof is covered with corrugated metal. Two freestanding chimneys, built of local iron-bearing stone, rise at the west gable end. The larger south chimney is at the ridge and has weatherings at loft level. Carved into one stone (at loft level) of this larger southerly chimney is the legend "N 1842". The northerly, smaller chimney rises along the long north slope of the roof; it has weatherings at the level of the roof, i.e., lower than on the south chimney. Both chimneys are built of local iron-bearing sandstone, and the outside stones are laid to simulate quoins.

There is a small room between the two chimneys, a pent which may be original to the house. It has a small square single-sash window and a plain modern door. From the pent room, a passage leads north into the kitchen.

Two gable dormers, symmetrically placed, break through the south plane of the roof, and light the second level rooms. Each encloses a small 6/6 double hung sash window, framed by plain pilasters and returned cornice. Two more dormers pierce the north plane of the roof, at a slightly lower level. The south dormers may be original, while those on the north are probably twentieth century additions.

The building rests on a foundation of the local iron-bearing sand stone, which has been partially replaced and reinforced by poured concrete. This foundation encloses a cellar, which was excavated after the house was constructed, and lined with concrete block. From this cellar can be observed the hewn and pitsawn sill beams, with mortise and tenon joints.

A short distance northwest of the main block is a small frame one-story kitchen building, the ridge of its gable roof at right angles to that of the main block. It is sheathed with German siding painted white, and has one small casement window in each of its east and west walls. A narrow stone stove chimney rises at the north gable end, and the foundation is of the same local iron-bearing stone, partially parged with concrete. The gable roof is covered with corrugated metal. This small kitchen building, originally freestanding, is now connected to the northwest section of the main block by a narrow shed-roof hyphen, with German siding, metal roof, and a modern entrance on the west.

Interior of the main block is side stairhall and parlor, extended early to add two more narrower rooms to the north. The open-string staircase rises along the east wall of the stairhall; it has a slim molded rail and a plain square newel, and plain rectangular balusters. Doors and windows have two-step architrave moldings with cavetto backband. The mantel in the main (south) parlor has pilasters, and a frieze with end and center blocks. The mantel in the north parlor is simpler, with plain end and center blocks. Modern wood flooring covers the original floor boards; there is a high molded baseboard.

There are two outbuildings west of the house, a modern garage building, and a shed-roof chicken house. All the buildings stand on a knoll framed by ancient oaks with fields on both sides. The land is now part of a park and golf course.

The Cottage at Warrington is a unique example in Prince George's County of a small plantation dwelling with saltbox, or catslide, roof. It is also unusual in that the chimneys are built of local iron-bearing sandstone, a material regularly used for foundations in this north central section of the County, but not ordinarily used in the construction of chimneys.

The Cottage at Warrington was constructed, probably by Washington Hilleary, in 1842, the date carved into one of the chimney stones. The land on which it stands was part of the Hilleary family holdings, "Three Sisters" and "St. Andrews", which Hilleary had received out of his father's estate.¹ It is not known whether this small dwelling was built to serve as his own residence: it is very modest in size, but the interior trim and some exterior detail suggest that it was more than a tenant dwelling. The north addition, which gives the building its unusual profile, was added very soon after construction of the main block was begun.

Washington Hilleary mortgaged the 150 acres on which this house stood, and, within a few years, lost it through default in payment. At that time, 1849, it was described as "the land on which Washington Hilleary resided."² Before the Civil War, the property came into the possession of Marsham Waring, and served as one of the farms of his large estate, by then known as Warrington.

Marsham Waring operated a large farm with various agricultural pursuits, but his principal crop was tobacco. A surviving tobacco barn on the adjoining farm at Warrington (#73-6) serves as a reminder of this ante-bellum plantation era. Waring died in 1860, leaving his considerable real estate to his wife and three children. All of Warrington remained in the possession of his eldest surviving daughter, Mary Virginia Mackubin, into the twentieth century. Before her death, Mrs. Mackubin conveyed her property to her niece, Amelia Bowie Belt.⁴

In 1935, nearly 1,100 acres, including the Cottage, were devised by Amelia Belt, granddaughter of Marsham Waring, to the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Baltimore. This land was purchased by Newton H. White, Commanding Officer of the U.S.S. Enterprise, and became part of White's model dairy farm. Newton White died in 1958, leaving the Enterprise Farm to his widow.⁶ The model dairy farm had been a financial success, and the accounting of its worth after White's death came to more than \$6,000,000.⁷ In 1971, Newton White's widow sold the property to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission,⁸ and it became part of the Enterprise Golf Course and Newton White Estate. For several years the Cottage served as the headquarters of the Arts Division; it is presently a tenant dwelling.

The Cottage at Warington is a unique example in Prince George's County of a plantation house with saltbox (or catslide) roof; it is distinguished by its chimney built of sandstone, and the date of construction carved into one of those stones.

The Cottage is a one-and-one-half-story frame house, three bays wide, with the entrance in the third bay of the south facade. Two dormers pierce the slope of the roof to the front; the slope of the roof in the rear (north) is much longer: a "cat-slide" roof. There are two exterior stone chimneys on the west gable end and between them a frame pent, from which a passage leads north to a separate kitchen building. German siding covers the exterior walls of the Cottage, except for the south front which retains its original weatherboards of varying widths, and its beaded corner boards. The south cornice has echinus and other moldings indicative of the second quarter of the nineteenth century.

The Cottage was constructed by Washington Hilleary in 1842 (this date is carved into a stone high in one of the chimneys) on his portion of his father's estate, "Three Sisters" or "St. Andrews". Hilleary immediately mortgaged his 150 acres, and, within a few years, lost it through default in payment. By 1860, it had come into the possession of Marsham Waring, and served as one of the farms of his large estate, by then known as Warington. After Marsham Waring's death in 1860, The Cottage passed to members of his immediate family; finally in 1935, nearly 1100 acres including The Cottage were devised by his granddaughter to the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Baltimore. The Cottage subsequently became part of the Newton White estate, and was deeded in 1971 to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. It serves presently as one of the headquarters of the Arts Division.

 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cottage is a one-and-one-half-story frame house, three bays wide, with the entrance in the third bay of the south facade. Two dormers pierce the slope of the roof to the front; the slope of the roof in the rear (north) is much longer: a "cat-slide" roof. There are two exterior stone chimneys on the west gable end and between them a frame pent, from which a passage leads northward to a separate kitchen building. German siding covers the exterior walls of the Cottage, except for the south front which retains its original weatherboards of varying widths, and its beaded corner boards. The south cornice has echinus and other moldings indicative of second quarter of the nineteenth century.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cottage was constructed by Washington Hilleary in 1842 (this date is carved into a stone high in one of the chimneys) on his portion (150 acres) of his father's estate, "Three Sisters" or "St. Andrews". Hilleary immediately mortgaged his 150 acres and, within a few years, lost it through default in payment. By 1860, this land was in the possession of Marsham Waring, and served as one of the farms of his large estate, "Heart's Delight" and part of "St. Andrews", renamed "Warington".

After Marsham Waring's death in 1860, The Cottage passed to members of his immediately family; finally in 1935, nearly 1100 acres including The Cottage were devised by his granddaughter to the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Baltimore. The Cottage subsequently became part of the Newton White estate, and was deeded in 1971 to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission. It serves presently as one of the headquarters of the Arts Division.


