### DESCRIPTION SUMMARY:

The Butler House occupies a triangular plot of land wedged between Forest Heights on the north, the Capital Beltway on the southeast, and Oxon Hill Children's Farm on the southwest in Oxon Hill, Prince George's County, Maryland. Constructed in 1853, the Butler House is a 3-bay, 2½-story, wood-frame and log residence with a steeply-pitched side-gable roof and a large shed addition on its north. A small, ca. 1940s Cape Cod-style house also stands on the property. Both houses are in deteriorated condition.

### GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

The Butler House occupies a triangular plot of land wedged between the Town of Forest Heights on the north, the Capital Beltway on the southeast, and Oxon Hill Children's Farm on the southwest in Oxon Hill, Prince George's County, Maryland. Despite its proximity to a major interstate highway and a residential development, the Butler House remains relatively secluded. It stands in a wooded area next to a field and an abandoned road that once led from Washington, D.C., through Prince George's County. The area immediately around the house is cleared. None of the outbuildings associated with this once prosperous farm remains, although a ca. 1940s Cape Cod-style house stands south of the Butler House.

The Butler House is a 3-bay, 2½-story, 1 room deep, wood-frame and log residence.<sup>1</sup> It is currently covered in cast stone, though wood lap siding is visible on the gable ends. The steeply-pitched side-gable roof is covered in metal panels and wood shake. The main entry is located in the south bay of the west (front) elevation and has a mid-20<sup>th</sup> century half-glass door. The window openings contain mid-20<sup>th</sup> century metal sash. A large, 1½-story shed addition containing a kitchen extends from the north gable end. A parged brick chimney rises between the north gable end and the shed addition. A 1-story screen porch has been added to the east elevation.

The interior of the Butler House consists of one room on the first floor and two rooms on the second floor of the main block. A winder stair is located in the southeast corner of the main block. The kitchen addition has a large room on the first floor and a small room on the second. Most original interior finishes have been covered; however, there is a simple mantel and wood paneling on the first floor of the main block, and wide beadboard paneling and riven lath on the second floor of the main block.

The Butler House retains its integrity of location, setting, feeling and association. The house stands along an abandoned main road that once made it a prime location. It retains a quiet, rural setting and feeling in part because it is in a secluded, forested area and in part because it is adjacent to the Oxon Hill Children's Farm agricultural museum. The house has been continuously associated with the Butler family since 1853. Investigation of the physical fabric underneath the cast stone is likely to reveal that the building also retains its integrity of materials and workmanship.

## SUMMARY STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE:

The Butler House, constructed ca. 1853, is significant for its association with the themes "African American experience in Prince George's County prior to Emancipation, ca. 1660-1865" and "The Freedmen's Bureau and Prince George's County, 1865-1872." These themes are set forth in the Multiple Property Documentation for African American Historic Resources in Prince George's County. Henry Alexander Butler, a free African American man from Charles County, moved with his family to the property in 1853. Since then, the property has been continuously associated with the Butler family. The Butler House is a rare surviving example of a documented pre-Civil War house inhabited by a free African American family.

### RESOURCE HISTORY AND HISTORIC CONTEXT:

According to Butler family oral history, the Butler house was begun in 1851 as a post office.<sup>2</sup> Henry Alexander Butler, a free African American man from Charles County, moved with his family to the property in 1853 and completed construction of the house.<sup>3</sup> The Butler family possesses receipts for taxes paid on the property by Henry Butler in 1859 and 1860.<sup>4</sup> However, the property was not legally deeded to Butler until 1873.<sup>5</sup>

The Butlers turned their property into a small farm that included a chicken house, meat house, barns, and other agricultural buildings.<sup>6</sup> The Butler House faced the main road from Washington, D.C., through Prince George's County.<sup>7</sup> During the Civil War, Union officers are said to have stopped at the house when traveling through the area.<sup>8</sup>

Family photographs indicate that the Butlers lived a comfortable, middle class life. They also enjoyed high status in the African American community. Henry Butler became a Reconstruction-era community leader, serving as trustee of the Freedmen's Bureau school near Oxon Hill.<sup>9</sup> The Butlers associated with prominent African American Washingtonians including the first African American priest and a Mr. Lewis, master barber at the U.S. Capitol.<sup>10</sup> The Butler House is currently vacant but is still owned by the Butler family.



In prior coordination for the Woodrow Wilson Bridge project, MHT and SHA agreed that the Bulter House is eligible for the National Register (August 28, 1989). The two-story, three-bay wood-framed house is eligible under Criterion A as a rare example of an antebellum farm in Prince George's County owned by free-blacks. It represents the progress of a free-black family in the mid-nineteenth century. Henry Alexander Butler purchased the property in 1853 and it continues to be owned by his descendants.

Boundary Justification:

The National Register boundary for the Butler House at Mount Welby was drawn to encompass all the land still owned by the Butler family, descendants of the free African-American settlers who moved to the property around 1853. The boundary includes the circa 1850 Butler House as well as an adjacent circa 1940 brick house. Most of the land is now heavily wooded; only a small area remains clear around the buildings.

Verbal Description:

The boundary for the Butler House at Mount Welby is defined as the following tax parcels on Prince George's County Tax Map 95: 26, 27, and 32 through 37. The boundary encompasses approximately 27.5 acres. It is bounded on the north by the Forest Heights municipal boundary, on the east by adjacent tax parcels, and on the south and west by Mount Welby/Oxon Hill Children's Farm.



This substantial, two story frame house was once the nucleus of a farmstead owned and operated by a family of antebellum free Negroes. It is still in possession of that family. It consisted of a three bay, one room down, one room up main block with a one and a half story kitchen attached to the gable end. This is a plan common to homes of landowning families of the mid 19th century. Since that time, further additions have been made.

The Butler House is a tall two-story frame building, three bays wide, with entrance in the third bay of the west facade. There is an interior chimney at the north gable end. A one-story shed roofed kitchen wing has been added at this north gable end, and the entire structure (except the gable ends above second story level) has been covered with synthetic "permastone" siding.

This modest house is significant because it represents the progress of a free black family from the mid-nineteenth century. Henry Alexander Butler (Boteler) came from Charles County in 1853 and moved into this house, which stood on a ten acre portion of the Mt. Welby tract; the house was reportedly constructed in 1851 and intended to be a post office. Butler received a legal deed for the property in 1873; the house is still occupied by his descendants.

**DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE**

This substantial house was once the nucleus of a farmstead owned and operated by a family of antebellum free Negroes. It is still in the possession of the descendants of that family. The house faces west, toward an abandoned road that was once the main route to Washington, D.C. through Prince George's County in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Behind the house stood the chicken house, meat house, barns, and other buildings essential to farm life. None of these remain. The house itself is a two story, frame structure with a steep gable roof. Its principal facade consists of three bays with the front door located in the southernmost bay near the gable end. The main block is one bay deep. Attached to the northern gable end is a one and a half story shed kitchen. Between the kitchen and the main block ascends a tall brick chimney covered with cement. The house was originally sheathed with overlapping weatherboards, according to the present occupant and owner, William Butler, and is now protected by permastone siding.

The interior of the main block is composed of one large room. Any indication of a partitioned side hallway between the front and rear doors has been masked by modern improvements, as have most of the original features of the house. The second floor consists of two rooms in the main block and a small chamber above the kitchen.

A screen porch has been added to the rear (east) of the house, and a small shed to the kitchen.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

According to William Butler, this house was begun in 1851 and was intended to be a post office. In 1853 his grandfather, a free Negro from Charles County, purchased the building and land around it, moved his family here, and completed construction of the house. Among the papers cherished by Butler are the tax receipts of his grandfather showing the taxes that he paid on the property in the 1859, 1860, and in several other years in the 1860's. According to Butler, his grandfather was a friend of Federal officers who visited the house during their trips to and from Virginia during the Civil War. The family has passed down several interesting stories relating to these visits.

The daughters of Henry Butler, ~~Henry~~, Henry Butler himself, and their relatives and friends after the Civil War can be seen in the photographs of the last quarter of the 19th century that are kept in a photoalbum of that period. These photographs, still in the possession of the Butlers, reveal the culture, status, aspirations, and personalities of this family during the Victorian era in America. Some of them have been copied as part of this survey; *others were xeroxed.*

The history of this house, the oral informants associated with it, and its primary photographic and documentary resources make this site the only one of its kind known to still exist in southern Maryland.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This modest house is significant because it represents the progress of a free black family from the mid-nineteenth century. Henry Alexander Butler (Boteler) came from Charles County in 1853 and moved into this house, which stood on a ten acre portion of the Mt. Welby tract; the house was reportedly constructed in 1851 and intended to be a post office. Butler received a legal deed for the property in 1873; the house is still occupied by his descendants.
