The Soper House was constructed c. 1910 at 5600 Auth Road in Suitland, Maryland when the area was primarily rural and undeveloped. Erected during the ownership tenure of Margaret Virginia Soper, the dwelling and its associated property were likely rented to area farmers while the Soper family was residing in Washington, DC. Following the death of Margaret Virginia Soper in 1928, the property was inherited by her son, Ernest W. Soper. Later that year, after 41 years of Soper ownership, he conveyed the property to Mary Shipley Ryon. In January 1929, the property was conveyed to farmer Thomas E. Wood and his wife, Linda V. Wood (nee Soper). The Woods came from a locally-prominent family in the Suitland and Camp Springs area and Linda V. Wood is also associated with the Thornton-Wood Farmstead (PG: 76A-024). In 1937, the Woods conveyed 57.5 acres of the tract to Salvatore Marescalco, an Italian immigrant. In the years that followed, Marescalco parceled off the land to various members of his family, including Nicholas Marescalco who constructed the Art Moderne Marescalco House at 5516 Auth Road (PG: 76A-021). By 1954, the property had been reduced to 10,764-square feet and was later conveyed to Carmello Intelisano. Since 1962 the property has changed hands several times, but has been owned by Alda Irene Douglas since 1982. The property represents the mid-twentieth-century transformation of Suitland from a vast, rural expanse to a suburban landscape.

This two-story, four-bay single-family dwelling (now twin dwelling) is two-bays deep. Set on a solid foundation and constructed of brick; both laid in six-course, American-bond, this building is veneered with stone on the façade (south elevation). Standing-seam metal covers the front-gable roof, which is accented with raking wood boards. Two single-leaf openings mark the façade (south elevation) and each holds a flush wood door with a single-light. Paired 4/4 wood-sash are located in the easternmost bay of the façade and paired 1/1 vinyl-sash are in the westernmost bay. Each first story opening is complemented by a Permastone sill. Three openings pierce the second story of the façade, with the central opening being the smallest, and each holds a 6/6 wood-sash window. A small 6/6 wood-sash window also fenestrates the upper gable end. The second story openings and upper gable end opening have Permastone sill and keyed Permastone lintels.

The Soper House is located at 5600 Auth Road in Suitland, Maryland. The property is flanked by Auth Road to the southwest and by Gloria Road to the northwest. The property includes a single-family dwelling (now twin dwelling), which is oriented to face south. The property slopes to the northeast and features mature trees and shrubs. A concrete walkway connects the front porch of the dwelling to Auth Road. Gravel parking pads enter the property from Auth Road and are located southwest and southeast of the dwelling. A metal chain-link fence follows Gloria Road before heading southeast to enclose the backyard of the property. A wood fence partially lines the southeastern boundary. In addition to the primary dwelling, this property includes a prefabricated shed.

DWELLING

Constructed c. 1910, this two-story, four-bay single-family dwelling (now twin dwelling) is two-bays deep. Set on a solid foundation and constructed of brick; both laid in six-course, American-bond, this building is veneered with stone on the façade (south elevation). Standing-seam metal covers the front-gable roof, which is accented with raking wood boards.

Two single-leaf openings mark the façade (south elevation) and each holds a flush wood door with a single-light. Paired 4/4 wood-sash are located in the easternmost bay of the façade and paired 1/1 vinyl-sash are in the westernmost bay. Each first story opening is complemented by a Permastone sill. Three openings pierce the second story of the façade, with the central opening being the smallest, and each holds a 6/6 wood-sash window. A small 6/6 wood-sash window also fenestrates the upper gable end. The second story openings and upper gable end opening have Permastone sill and keyed Permastone lintels.

A one-story, full-width screened porch extends from the façade and is set on a solid brick foundation. The shed roof is covered with asphalt shingles and is finished with overhanging eaves and raking wood boards. Brick posts support the roof. The solid balustrade is covered with plywood.

Two three-light wood windows with rowlock brick sills fenestrate the west and east (side) elevations. The southernmost bay of the first story holds a 1/1 vinyl-sash and the northernmost opening holds a 6/6 wood-sash. The end bays of the second story hold 6/6 wood-sash windows and the central bay holds a 4/4 wood-sash window. Each opening has a rowlock brick sill.

The foundation of the rear (north) elevation holds a single-leaf, paneled wood door with lights and is flanked by three-light wood awning windows, each with a rowlock brick sill. Three openings pierce the first and second stories and each holds a 6/6 wood-sash window with a rowlock brick sill. The central bay of the second story was once a single-leaf opening but has been altered. A single 4/4 wood-sash window marks the upper gable end and has a rowlock brick sill.

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PREFABRICATED SHED

A one-story, three-bay prefabricated shed, constructed c. 1990, is located in the eastern corner of the property. An elevated solid poured concrete slab serves as the foundation and was likely used by an earlier building. The wood-frame shed is clad with T1-11 siding and is accented by wood corner boards. Asphalt shingles cover the side-gable roof. The façade (southwest elevation) is marked by double-leaf T1-11 doors and are flanked by four-light fixed metal windows.

INTEGRITY

The Soper House, constructed c. 1910, at 5600 Auth Road presents a moderate level of integrity of materials, workmanship, and design. This building retains its original rectangular plan, however, the integrity of materials and workmanship has been affected but not compromised by the use of non-historic PermaStone veneer as cladding material, the enclosure of the front porch, and replacement vinyl-sash windows. This is a common, and reversible, mid-twentieth-century alteration. Integrity of design has been affected because the dwelling has been rehabilitated as a twin dwelling. Sited on a 0.247-acre parcel in Suitland, Maryland, this dwelling presents a moderate level of integrity of setting, feeling, and association because the rural landscape was heavily suburbanized in the 1950s and 1960s. Although Gloria Drive was created between 1965 and 1980, the dwelling retains integrity of location.

Due to its recent construction date, the c. 1990 prefabricated shed is a non-contributing resource.

Overall, the Soper House and its associated resource, maintains a moderate level of integrity.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

HISTORIC CONTEXT

The Soper House is located in Suitland, Maryland. Suitland gained its name from Colonel Samuel Taylor Suit, who was a nineteenth century businessman and entrepreneur. His farmstead "Suitland" was originally located near the present intersection of Suitland and Silver Hill Roads. By the turn of the twentieth century, the village of Suitland had grown to include a general store, post office, churches, and several houses, but remained primarily rural.¹ The Woods family, along with the Sopers, owned some agricultural land in the

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Camp Springs and Suitland areas prior to its development in the mid-twentieth century. In fact, the Woods family operated a seasonal fruit stand at the intersection of MD 5 and Auth Road, for which the area was named "Woods Corner." Auth Road was originally known to locals as "Epiphany Lane" until the 1940s when it was paved and redesignated William Soper Road.² Development rapidly increased during the mid-twentieth-century with the construction of the Suitland Federal Center and Andrew's Air Force Base and once rural expanses quickly gave over to domestic and commercial development.

The Soper House rests on a 0.247-acre parcel on Auth Road that was once part of a 165-acre tract owned by Margaret R. Soper. The daughter of Joseph, a planter, and his wife Priscilla, Margaret was born in 1828 in Maryland. The 1880 U.S. Federal Census indicates that Soper was unmarried and was residing with her parents and two African-American farm hands.³ Upon her death in 1887, she willed her 165-acre tract to Margaret Virginia Soper.⁴ Margaret Virginia Soper was born c. 1856 and married her husband, George P. Soper, in 1881. Following their marriage, the Sopers moved to Washington, DC. Here, the 1900 U.S. Federal Census notes that George was working for the railroad and their sixteen-year-old son, Ernest W. Soper, was a plumbing apprentice.⁵ The Soper family continued to reside in Washington, DC and by 1920 George was still working as a motorman with the railroad, Margaret was employed as a fitter at a dress store, and Ernest was a clerk at a grocery store.⁶ It is likely that the Sopers leased their tract of land in Prince George's County to other area farmers.

Following his mother's death in 1928, Ernest inherited the 165-acre tract of land. By December, he had conveyed the property to Mary Shipley Ryon of Washington, DC.⁷ Ryon (nee Shipley) was born c. 1885 and was a California native. In 1930, she was residing in Washington, DC with her husband, real estate dealer Norman Eugene Ryon, and their children, Thomas S., David O., and Mary E. Ryon.⁸ She held the property only for one month before conveying it to Thomas E. Wood and Linda V. Wood.⁹

Thomas E. Wood was born in Prince George's County in 1878. He married Linda V. Soper, also a Maryland native, in 1920. By 1930, the couple were working their farm and residing with their seven

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children, Mary E., Thomas E., Jr., Viola E., John F., Alice P., Richard A., and William C. Wood. Linda V. Wood is also associated with the Thornton-Wood Farmstead (PG: 76A-024), which is located at 4801 Auth Road in Suitland, Maryland.

In 1937, Thomas and Linda Wood conveyed a 57.5-acre parcel of the tract known as "Golden Rod" to Salvatore Marescalco.¹⁰ Marescalco was born November 25, 1873 in San Mauro, Italy and emigrated to the United States in December 1912 from Naples, Italy aboard the *Konig Albert*.¹¹ After being processed at Ellis Island, Marescalco resided in both Frostburg, Maryland and Washington, DC and was employed as a janitor and laborer. Marescalco registered for the World War I (1914-1918) draft in Washington, DC and later became a naturalized citizen in September 1921.¹² Marescalco returned to Italy in May 1922 and came back to Washington, DC in November of that year aboard the S.S. *American* with his new wife, Mary (variously known as Maria and Marie) and her two children, Giovanni (John) and Rosa (Rose) Greco, ages 8 and 6 respectively.¹³ In 1924, he purchased 18 H Street, N.E., for business and residential purposes.¹⁴ In 1930, Marescalco, now employed at a confectionary store, still resided on H Street, N.E., with his wife, Mary, and their children, John (Giovanni), Rose, Nickey, Rose Ann, and Domenick.¹⁵

Nicholas Marescalco is associated with the Marescalco House (PG: 76A-021) which is located at 5516 Auth Road in Camp Springs. He likely purchased the roughly two-acre parcel from his father, Salvatore, and between 1946 and 1950, he erected his Art Moderne residence with the help of his brother-in-law, Paris Rizzo.¹⁶

Following the death of Salvatore (date unknown), the Soper House property was willed to his wife, Mary Marescalco. A fellow immigrant from Italy, Mary was born in 1896 and came to the United States in 1922. She died in 1954 at her residence at 5300 Auth Road. In her Last Will and Testament, she bequeathed the Soper House property to her children, John Greco, Rose Greco Procopio, Nicholas Marescalco, Rose Ann

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Marescalco Rizzo, and Domenick Marescalco.¹⁷ They held the now 10,764-square foot property for seven years before conveying it to Carmello Intelisano.¹⁸ No information regarding Carmello Intelisano could be located.

In January 1962, Intelisano conveyed the property to Cecil J. Sisk and his wife, Virginia B. Sisk.¹⁹ No information regarding the Sisks could be located. The couple deeded the property to Alco Investment Corporation in June 1962.²⁰ By October, the Alco Investment Corporation had conveyed the property to Donald K. Jackson.²¹

In 1966, Keith Investments, Inc., appointed Robert Lee Gauldin and Amanda Pauline Gauldin trustees of the property.²² Keith Investments, Inc., was indebted unto Donald K. Jackson for \$6,500. In November of 1968, John G. Epaminonda and John F. Oddenino, Jr. were appointed substitute trustees following default by the Gauldins on their loan.²³ Epaminonda was a lawyer from Virginia, who in 1961 served as chairman of the nominating committee of the Falls Church Bar Association.²⁴ Epaminonda was active in Arlington County politics throughout the 1960s. He died on February 22, 1969. Information related to Oddenino was not located.

In January 1970, the property was sold at public auction to A. R. Tuttle for \$500 over the mortgage amount.²⁵ In 1971, Tuttle conveyed the property to Clifford Irwin Franks and his wife, Deanna Driggs Franks.²⁶ Information pertaining to the Franks could not be located. The current owner, Alda Irene Douglas, was deeded the property from the Franks in 1982.²⁷ Information pertaining to the Alda Irene Douglas could not be located.

The Soper House is located on a 0.247-acre parcel. Auth Road forms the southwestern boundary of the property. The northwestern boundary follows Gloria Road. The northeastern boundary is lined by a metal chain-link fence and the southeastern boundary is edged by a metal chain-link fence and a wood fence. The Soper House has been associated with Parcel 174 as noted on Tax Map 89 since its construction c. 1910.


