ST. IGNATIUS' ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH was built in the 1890's which is evident from the treatment of the wall surfaces following the contemporary Queen Anne and Shingle Styles, while there are still traces of the older Gothic Revival style seen in the round headed windows, central tower, and corner buttresses. This church represents a style of architecture of which it is the only surviving example in the Potomac area of Prince George's County. The second oldest Roman Catholic Church in the southwestern part of the county, St. Ignatius, was built in 1890-91 by Charles Beers of Anacostia, D. C. Two corner stones are incorporated in the foundation, one dated 1849, and the other 1890. The earlier date is the year the church was founded by Father Joseph M. Finotti, S. J., the first Catholic anthologist in the United States. A cemetery located in the church yard has stones bearing the names of many of the county's oldest families.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

St. Ignatius' Roman Catholic Church is located on the south side of Brinkley Road east of St. Barnabas Road and further east of Oxon Hill, Maryland. The frame church was built in the 1890's which is evident from the treatment of the interior and exterior wall surfaces following the contemporary Queen Anne and Shingle Styles. At the same time the round headed windows, centrally placed tower and corner buttresses refer to the then longer lived Gothic Revival.

The main exterior feature is the eighty foot tall tower rising at the center of the main (north) facade. The tower is divided into three stories, the first being the entrance porch into the nave. The second story is part of the rear gallery and the third houses the bell (cast by Henry McShane of Baltimore). The tower has a square two-pitched hipped roof with a cross surmounting it. The entrance is through a round arched entrance with double doors beneath a fan light. At the gallery level is a triple arched window. At the highest level a double-arched window within a single-arched decorative architrave exists on each of the four faces. Between the second and third levels, a heavy cornice projects around all sides of the tower at the level of the peak of the nave roof. At the corner of the tower are small buttresses reaching midway up through the second story which are echoed on the northeast and northwest corners of the church. The surface treatment is a combination of shingle bands alternating with tongue-and-groove siding.

The alternating bands of sheathing are continued from the tower to the church around the north, east and west facades. A vertical tongue-in-groove siding extends from the brick foundation to a wooden course running below the windows. From that point to the springing of the round arched windows horizontal siding is found. The remainder of the wall to the boxed cornice is fish scale shingles. The east and west facades have six round arched windows--one in each bay. The north facade contains a round arched window centrally placed on either side of the tower between it and the corner buttresses.

The south facade was constructed entirely in horizontal sheathing. A window composed of round headed units which is similar to the fenestration at the gallery level on the tower is located in the center of the wall. A door in a round headed frame (similar to the main door) provides entrance at the east end of the south facade.

On the interior St. Ignatius has a barrel vaulted nave supported by square piers. The ribs of the vault spring from the entablatures of the piers. The flat-roofed aisles are also ribbed with the ribs supported by the piers and by square brackets along the exterior aisle walls. The interior walls

are all covered with narrow boarding. On the vault, the boarding runs longitudinally; along the aisle walls, it runs vertically to the level of the chair rail, horizontally between the windows, and vertically from the level of the springing of the window arches to the cornice. Thus, the treatment of the interior aisle walls mirror the treatment of the exterior walls.

The choir, or gallery, runs across the full width of the church at the north end and projects across the entire north, or first, bay. It is supported by the piers that carry the barrel vault. Like the walls, it is covered with vertical boarding.

The sanctuary has been much altered with square wooden tiles on the walls replacing the narrow boarding. (The parish plans to return the walls to their original state). The altar rail, however, is original. It has turned ballusters supporting a heavily carved and decorated railing. The sanctuary is as wide as the nave with small rooms on either side opening directly into it.

A cemetery exists to the east of the church.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE			
<p>The significance of St. Ignatius' Church is that it represents a style of architecture of which it is the only surviving example in the Potomac area of Prince George's County and that it symbolizes an era in the typical development of a rural to suburban community.</p> <p>The structure was built in 1890-91, by Charles Beers, contractor, of Anacostia, D. C., at a cost of \$5,000. Although described at the time as of "Romanesque" design, it has many of the elements of the Shingle and Queen Anne styles. It is the second building at this location. Two corner stones are incorporated in the foundation, one dated 1849, and the other 1890. On October 21, 1891, the day the new building was consecrated by James Cardinal Gibbons, of the Baltimore archdiocese, it was conceded by the clergy to be the "prettiest little church in Southern Maryland."</p> <p>St. Ignatius' is the second oldest Roman Catholic Church in the southwestern part of the county. For many years, it served families living in an area bounded on the west by the Potomac River and to the east, as far as the present city of District Heights. Among its earliest members were representatives of two of Maryland's oldest Roman Catholic families, the Hills and the Brookes. The two main persons who solicited funds for the original building were ladies, Mrs. Christina Spaulding Kerby Edelen and Mrs. Mary Eugenia Surratt. A cemetery located in the churchyard has stones bearing the names of many of the county's oldest families.</p> <p>This church was founded in 1849 by Father Joseph M. Finotti, S.J., the first Catholic anthologist in the United States. An Upper Marlboro newspaper reporting the 1891 consecration of the building, stated that in 1849, "...it was then a mission under the charge of Pastors of St. Mary's Church, Alexandria (Va.). Among the distinguished Jesuits whose names are linked with that of this Church and who, at different periods shaped its affairs, were Fathers Finotti, Bixio, Vigilanti, Kroes and De Necker. their headquarters in this town. The church in question next became a mission attached to St. Dominic's Church in Washington. Father Rocheford, at one time provincial of the Dominicans and an uncle to the architect of new St. Ignatius', was pastor there, as was Father Dwyer, now the pastor of a large Dominican Church in New York City. St. Ignatius' passed next under the regime of the Josephites. The priests of this order had their house also in this town, and were celebrated for their solicitude for the colored race. Of this order Fathers Green, Walsh and Hooman made good records at St. Ignatius'. The mission next came under the control of the secular clergy and among them Father De Wulf, donor of the two cathedral glass windows in the present tower; Father Cunnane, who laid the cornerstone of the new church, and donated the east chancel window, and Father Clark who gave the west chancel window. In 1883, Rev. Thomas B. Hughes then assistant pastor of St. Peter's Church, Washington, was given charge of St. Ignatius' in connection with St. Theresa's Church, Anacostia.

"...The new structure is thirty-eight feet front and sixty feet deep, and cost about \$5,000. The architectural style is Romanesque and the tower rises to a height of eighty feet. The seating capacity of the ground floor is 350 and of the gallery that runs across the north end fifty more. The bell in the tower was cast by Henry McShane of Baltimore, is attuned to "C" and weighs in gross seven hundred and thirty pounds and is the joint donation of Nicholas Brooke, George Gray, Michel Quinn and Father Hughes.

"The church contains twenty cathedral glass windows donated by..."¹

In 1948, St. Ignatius' was made a parish in its own right, assigned to the Archdiocese of Washington. The parish house, located across Brinkley Road from the Church, was erected in 1948-49. St. Ignatius' School, located next to the Church, was erected in 1966.

#5. Location of Legal Description.

No deed has been found in the County land records showing the original conveyance of the land to the Church. However, boundaries of the Church land are found in Liber JWB #4, Folio 409; Liber 97, folio 268; Liber 138, folio 62; and Liber 3188, folio 204.

The tax map compiled by the Department of Assessments and Taxation shows the Church located on one acre marked "P.306" and the cemetery on one acre marked "P. 307". This map shows no deed numbers on these parcels as it does on the surrounding parcels.

The flat-roofed aisles are also ribbed, with the ribs supported by the piers and by square brackets along the exterior aisle walls. The interior walls are all covered with narrow boarding. On the vault, it runs longitudinally; along the aisle walls, it runs vertically to the level of the chair rail, horizontally between the windows, and vertically from the level of the springing of the window arches to the cornice. Thus, the treatment of the interior aisle walls mirror the treatment of the exterior of the walls.</p>

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The choir or gallery runs across the full width of the church at the north end and projects across the entire north or first bay. It is supported by the piers that carry the barrel vault. Like the walls, it is covered with vertical boarding.

The altar has been much altered with square wooden tiles on the walls replacing the narrow boarding. The altar rail, however, is original. It has turned ballusters supporting a heavily carved and decorated railing. The altar is as wide as the nave with small rooms on either side opening directly into it. There is also an old cemetery to the east of the church.

OTHER:

Church is threatened by plans to widen Brinkley Road. Some of the parishioners are interested in saving the structure and are preparing a National Register nomination.
