Description:

There are two tobacco barns on the Bean farm at Westphalia. The easternmost (bank) barn is the larger of the two (ca. 65' by 50'), and is situated at the top of a high knoll. The ridge of its tin gable-roof runs roughly north and south; the roof slopes to shallower wings on the east and west sides. The east wing rests on a high concrete block foundation; four windows light the lower level enclosed by this foundation. The framing of the barn consists generally of wide vertical siding; corrugated metal siding has been added on the west elevation. Entrance is through a hanging, sliding door on the south facade. The smaller (older) barn (ca. 40' by 44') is located about 800 feet to the west on another lower knoll. The ridge of its (corrugated tin) gable-roof runs roughly east and west, sloping to lower wings on north and south. The framing consists of wide (ca. 12") vertical boards. The main entrance is through a wide door on the east. There are several places in this barn which give evidence of repairs and reuse of old materials. In many sections of the exterior, the weatherworn hand-hewn boards have been replaced by circular-sawn boards; the east elevation, for example, is constructed of mostly new materials. On the interior some of the support posts are hand-hewn, while others are circular-sawn. On one of the hand-hewn posts, "J. Talburt" is clearly incised.

Significance

The two tobacco barns on the Bean farm at Westphalia represent two different eras of tobacco farming in this still-rural area; both are still used for hanging tobacco. The westernmost barn was part of the Talburtt/ Osbourn farmstead, known as "Alexandria", in the nineteenth century. Although it has undergone repairs and rebuilding, most of its original material has survived, and it retains the lines and shape of a typical nineteenth-century Prince George's County tobacco barn. Situated in an open field in rolling farmland, it is a noticeable landmark in this rural area. After the death in 1850 of Jesse Talburtt, whose name appears on one of the posts in his barn, his 330-acre farm passed to two more generations of his family. In 1925, the entire farm was sold to Arcenius Bean, whose heirs operate the farm today. Bean constructed the easternmost barn in the 1930's, and extended the concrete block foundation in the 1940's. Like the earlier barn to the west, this twentieth-century tobacco barn is a prominent and noticeable landmark in this rural area.

There are two tobacco barns on the Bean farm at Westphalia.

The easternmost (bank) barn is the larger of the two (ca. 65' by 50'), and is situated at the top of a high knoll. The ridge of its gable-roof runs roughly north and south; the roof slopes to shallower wings on the east and west sides. The east wing rests on a high concrete block foundation; four windows light the lower level enclosed by this foundation. The framing of the barn consists generally of wide vertical siding; corrugated metal siding has been added on the west elevation. Entrance is through a hanging, sliding door on the south facade. Foundations are of concrete block throughout, and the roof is of tin.

The smaller (older) barn (ca. 40' by 44') is located about 800 feet to the west on another lower knoll. The ridge of its gable-roof runs roughly east and west, sloping to lower wings on north and south. The framing consists of wide (ca. 12") vertical boards. The main entrance is through a wide door on the east. There are several places in this barn which give evidence of repairs and reuse of old materials. In many sections of the exterior, the weatherworn hand-hewn boards have been replaced by circular-sawn boards; the east elevation, for example, is constructed of mostly new materials. On the interior some of the support posts are hand-hewn, while others are circular-sawn. (On one of the hand-hewn posts, "J. Talburt" is clearly incised.) At the southwest corner of the barn, there is a square gain cut into the outer surface of the adze-hewn corner post, indicating reuse. The sill posts rest directly on the ground, and the corners of the barn rest on large chunks of conglomerate rock. The roof is of corrugated tin.

The two tobacco barns on the Bean farm at Westphalia represent two different eras of tobacco farming in this still-rural area; both are still used for hanging tobacco. The westernmost barn was part of the Talburtt/Osborn farmstead, known as "Alexandria", in the nineteenth century.¹ Although it has undergone repairs and rebuilding, most of its original material has survived, and it retains the lines and shape of a typical nineteenth-century Prince George's County tobacco barn. Situated in an open field in rolling farmland, it is a noticeable landmark in this rural area.

Jesse Talburtt (whose name appears on one of the posts in this barn) died in 1850, leaving his 330 acre farm to his five unmarried daughters. Of these five daughters, Sarah Ann was named executrix, and it was she who maintained the farm until her death in 1868. The farm was then conveyed to her niece (and namesake), Sarah Ann Osborn.¹

At the turn of this century, the ca. 330-acre farm was sold by Sarah Ann Osborn to her cousins, members of the Berry family; in 1925 the entire farm was sold to Arcenious Bean, whose heirs retain the farm today. Bean constructed the easternmost barn in the 1930's, and extended the concrete block foundation in the 1940's.² Like the earlier barn to the west, this twentieth-century tobacco barn is a prominent and noticeable landmark in this rural area.

There are two old tobacco barns here, on the north side of the road. They sit on small knolls of the rolling, cleared farmland. The oldest appears to be the one to the west, which has its doors in the (south) gable facade. The "A" roof slopes into wing-shaped, shed-roof sides on the east and west. Like most area tobacco barns, it is of weathered pine and unpainted.


