Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*  
 The O'Bryan Fisher house is a two-story three bay, frame, side-gabled dwelling. It features a central gable with diamond shaped window, a one-story front porch with turned and chamfered porch supports, fan brackets and turned spindles. Built in 1873, this house has a two story rear wing that was added in 1908. Asbestos siding was applied to the exterior of the house as well. Although it is a good example of vernacular architecture, the O'Bryan- Fisher house is a very common type and lacks the integrity necessary to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.


The property is not known to be associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local, state or national history (criteria A). 


Description

The O'Bryan-Fisher house is a low, two story rectangular side gable frame dwelling with a south (rear) ell kitchen wing. The three bay north (main) facade has a center entrance through a door with a single, full-length glass panel, surmounted by a transom. The first story is sheltered by a three bay hipped roof entrance porch, having turned and chamfered porch posts with fan brackets with turned spindles. A centered cross gable surmounts the facade. The boxed, crown molded cornice has kicks in the gable ends. Two corbelled brick chimneys rise from the roof ridge, flanking the cross gable. The gable end is covered by a two story hipped roof semi-octagonal projecting bay, an addition to the original structure. The two story south (rear) ell projects from the southwest corner of the facade. It is one-by-one bay with a gable roof and has the same siding, cornice treatment and roof line as the main block. The southeast section of the rear facade is filled by a two story, two-by-one bay shed roof addition. Crossing both added south wings is a three bay, shed roof rear screened porch constructed during the 1930's.

Significance

The O'Bryan-Fisher house is significant for its vernacular architecture and for its association with the history of Upper Marlboro. There was a house on the site as early as 1873; it was referred to as the residence of Thomas A. O'Bryan. The property was acquired in 1904 by Mary Anne Mullikin, whose husband, Owen P. Mullikin, was a hotel keeper in Upper Marlboro. The Mullikins improved the property in 1908, probably adding the two-story west bay at that time. In 1927 the property was acquired by Guy and Katherine Burnham. The Burnhams added the two-story southeast addition, containing a dining room and a second level bedroom, as well as a rear porch and garage to the property. The house is a fine example of the modest vernacular dwellings built in the County in the late nineteenth century. It is notable for its center front cross gable with its diamond-shaped window, its entrance porch with decorative posts and brackets, and its two-story semi-octagonal bay, added to the dwelling around the turn of the century.

The O'Bryan-Fisher house is a low, two story rectangular side gable frame dwelling with a south (rear) ell kitchen wing. The house doesn't squarely face a cardinal point but is oriented to the northeast. Therefore the direction of the elevations is arbitrarily assigned, based on that point closest to the actual placement of the facade.

The three bay north (main) facade fronts closely on Marlboro Pike. Center entrance is through a door with a single, full-length glass panel and surrounded by a transom. The first story is sheltered by a three bay hipped roof entrance porch, having a wood floor set on low brick piers. The turned and chamfered porch posts have fan brackets with turned spindles, and support a crown molded, boxed cornice. Windows on the facade are 2/2 double-hung-sash with narrow, banded surrounds and wooden sills. A centered cross gable surmounting the facade has a diamond-shaped four light window.

The house is set on a brick foundation, and is covered with asbestos shingle. The boxed, crown molded cornice has kicks in the gable ends. The roof is covered with asphalt shingle. Two corbelled brick chimneys rise from the roof ridge, flanking the center front cross gable.

The three-bay gable end is covered by a two story hipped roof semi-octagonal projecting bay, an addition to the original structure. The upper gable projects above the bay addition. Both the raking cornice on the gable and the cornice on the bay are boxed and crown molded. The one bay east gable end has a 2/2 window at first and second levels.

The two story south (rear) ell projects from the southwest corner of the facade. It is one-by-one bay with a gable roof and has the same siding, cornice treatment and roof line as the main block. The window surrounds are wide plan board surrounds, differing from those on the main block. The southeast section of the rear facade is filled by a two story, two-by-one by shed roof addition, with 6/6 windows with narrow wood surrounds similar to those on the main block. This addition is set on a concrete block foundation. Crossing both added south wings is a three bay, shed roof rear screened porch constructed during the 1930's.

The interior of the Burnham-Fisher house originally had a center hall-two parlor plan. The kitchen wing may date to the construction of the house. The southeast dining room was added in 1927, making the plan two rooms to the east of the center hall and one room to the west. The stairs have a heavy turned and chamfered newel post surmounted by a knob, and turned and chamfered balusters. The door at the south end of the hall enters the kitchen wing.

The O'Bryan-Fisher house is significant for its vernacular architecture and for its association with the history of Upper Marlboro.

There was a house on the site of the Burnham-Fisher house as early as 1873, when the approximately one acre property was transferred and was referred to as the residence of Thomas A. O'Bryan.<sup>1</sup> O'Bryan, a miller, and his family resided there through 1904.<sup>2</sup> The property was acquired in 1904 by Mary Anne Mullikin, whose husband, Owen P. Mullikin, was a hotel keeper in Upper Marlboro.<sup>3</sup> The Mullikins improved the property in 1908<sup>4</sup>, probably adding the two-story west bay at that time. The Mullikins owned the property through 1927, when it was acquired by Guy and Katherine Burnham.<sup>5</sup> The Burnhams added the two-story southeast addition, containing a dining room and a second level bedroom, as well as a rear porch and garage to the property.<sup>6</sup> Katherine Burnham Fisher still resides in the house.

The house is a fine example of the modest vernacular dwellings built in the County in the late nineteenth century. It is notable for its center front cross gable with its diamond-shaped window, its entrance porch with decorative posts and brackets, and its two-story semi-octagonal bay, added to the dwelling around the turn of the century.

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The stairs have a heavy turned and chamfered newel post surmounted by a knob, and turned and chamfered balusters. The door at the south end of the hall enters the kitchen wing.

Door and window moldings on the interior are wide architrave surrounds. Doors are four panel with box locks, porcelain knobs, and hinges with floral designs. There are no hearths in the building. The chimney in the two north parlors have a stovepipe hole surrounded by a mantel.

The upper rooms have several different types of door, including a board and batten door with a box lock, leading to the bedroom over the kitchen. All the second story rooms are of slightly different floor levels, indicating that the building has been added onto more than once.

The partial basement, reached through a trap door in the rear porch floor, allows viewing of the hand-hewn sill and beams and the sawn floor joists. The house is set on a small triangular-shaped lot which follows the curve of Ritchie-Marlboro Pike. The only outbuilding is a ca. 1930's two-car garage, a gable roofed, frame structure.



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
