Description:

The Buck-Rembold House was previously surveyed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission in 1974 and the Prince George's County Historic Preservation Commission in 1985. Since the time of the previous survey, the enclosed front porch on the house has been reopened and features chamfered posts. The house has also been painted. Three outbuildings located on the site were not mentioned in the previous forms. The first outbuilding is a shed with vertical board siding and a standing-seam metal, gable roof. The shed has a wood door on the south elevation and rests on concrete piers. The second outbuilding is a chicken coop with a metal, shed roof and vertical-board siding. The chicken coop has five screened openings and a wood door on the south elevation. The third is 1-story tall and has four sections. Each section is covered in vertical board and has a standing-seam metal, gable roof. Two of the sections have concrete-block foundations, and two have poured concrete foundations. The outbuilding has 2/2 awning windows and a wood panel, half-glass door.

National Register Evaluation:

The Buck-Rembold House is a contributing resource within the Woodland Historic District (PG:79-63). The Woodland Historic District was determined eligible for the National Register of Historic Places by the Maryland Historical Trust in July 1993.




Resource Sketch Map:

Description

The Buck-Rembold House is two stories, of frame with an asphalt shingle gable roof. Viewed from the south, the house can be described in three sections. Section A, the original house, has an entrance on the west facade, beneath a three-story tower with a bracketed cornice and a pyramidal roof. The entrance facade is three bays with a 4-bay entrance porch. The first story has two large 2/4 windows. The rest of Section A has 2/2 windows with plain wood surrounds. There is a plain boxed cornice throughout. Section B consists of frame, one-story additions on cement foundations. On the south facade, the first seven bays are a family room, added since 1977. Added early in the 20th century is a projecting semi-octagonal central bay and a shed roof addition. On the north facade is a semi-octagonal central bay also added in the early 20th century. Section C consists of a two-story, two-bay kitchen addition on a cement foundation, on the east facade of the house. The interior plan has a south side stairhall with a large north parlor. There are two back rooms, served by two adjacent interior chimneys on the hipped east slope of the roof. The house is on a hill three-eighths of a mile east of Old Crain Highway. There are two large 20th century gambrel roof barns on the property. There is a one-story, gable roof frame cottage with board-and-batten siding north of the house.

Significance

The Buck-Rembold house was probably built between 1896 and 1906 by John Dominick Bowling, grandson of Col. John Dominick Bowling, builder of the Villa de Sales in Aquasco. The Buck-Rembold house is built on a part of lot 3 in the division of the Bleak Hill Estate. Bleak Hill House is west of this property, across Old Crain Highway. The Buck-Rembold House originally was a small structure, with a somewhat unusual sidehall, two parlor and back room plan. The house was enlarged after 1906 by Bruce L. Buck to accommodate his 11 member family. A one-story addition was added on the north facade in 1977. The house is an exception to the typical small, late 19th century farm house because of its third story tower, original to the house, and its somewhat formal plan. It has exceptional siting on a high hill overlooking its 60 acre lot and Old Crain Highway.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Buck Rembold house is situated on a high hill approximately three-eighths of a mile east of Old Crain Highway. The house is located on a dirt drive and faces the highway. It is a two-story frame structure with an asphalt shingle roof. There is a three-story tower on the southwest corner of the building. Viewed from the south, the house can be described in three sections: (A) the two-story, German sided, gable roof main structure; (B) across the north and south facades, shed roof one-story additions; (C) to the east, a two-story kitchen addition.

Section A, the original structure, has the main entrance on the west facade. The facade is three bays, with the entrance on the third bay. It has a double, modern door surmounted by a 3-light transom. The first two bays are large 2/4 windows. There are two 2/2 windows on the first and second bays of the second story. The third bay of the second story is a double 1/1 window. The windows throughout Section A have plain wood surrounds. There is also a plain boxed cornice throughout the section. Above the third bay on the west facade is a third story tower with a bracketed cornice and pyramidal roof. Across the west facade is a four-bay hipped roof entrance porch. It is enclosed on its north end. It has plain wood posts resting on a half-wall of rusticated cement blocks. There is a bulkhead cellar entrance on the north facade of Section A. There is a corbelled brick interior chimney at the north gable ridge of the building and two corbelled brick interior chimneys on the hipped east-facing slope of the roof.

Section B consists of frame, one-story additions on cement foundations. On the south facade, the first seven bays are a family room, added since 1977. Added in the early 20th century is a projecting semi-octagonal central bay and a projecting bay with a side entrance. On the north facade is a central one-story semi-octagonal bay, also added early in the 20th century.

Section C consists of a two-story, two-bay kitchen addition to the east facade of the house. The kitchen addition is in two one-bay sections, one completed prior to 1906, and the other shortly after 1906. Both are on a high cement foundation. One has a gable roof and the other a flat roof.

Prepare both a summary paragraph of significance and a general statement of history and support.

The Buck-Rembold house was probably built between 1896 and 1906 by John Dominick Bowling, grandson of Col. John Dominick Bowling, of Aquasco.¹ The property is just south of his father's property, Bowling Heights. The property is part of lot 3 of the division of the estate of Richard S. Hill.² Hill's house, Bleak Hill, is located west of the Buck-Rembold house, across Old Crain Highway. John Dominick Bowling bought the property in 1896 from Catherine S. Hill, Richard S. Hill's daughter, who acquired it in the division of the Richard S. Hill estate.³

The house originally was a small structure with a somewhat unusual sidehall, three-room plan. The house was enlarged after 1906 when it was acquired by Bruce L. Buck.⁴ Bruce L. Buck was one of four sons of Daniel and Susan Buck from Pennsylvania, who settled in Upper Marlboro shortly before the turn of the century.⁵ His brothers Harry and George Buck were merchants in Upper Marlboro. Harry Buck bought the Wardrup-Buck House in Upper Marlboro from Richard Hill (son of Richard S. Hill) in 1907 and lived there until the house was bought by M-NCPPC in 1974.

Bruce L. Buck enlarged the Buck-Rembold house to accommodate his 11 member family. He extended the southeast room by eight feet, and enclosed the porch in the northeast parlor to enlarge that room. The kitchen wing on the east side of the building was doubled in size. He also built the two large barns presently on the property. According to his son, there are two much older barns on the property, one very large barn to the west of the house and a "well" barn to the northwest. Both older barns were removed by the present owner. The barns appeared on an 1888 plat of the Bleak Hill Estate. "Quarters" for the estate are indicated on the plat, on the site of the present Buck-Rembold house.

#7. (Continued)

The interior of the Buck-Rembold house has a south side stairhall with a large front parlor to the north. The parlor was served by the chimney at the north gable ridge of the house. There are two east rooms served by the two adjacent interior chimneys on the hipped east slope of the roof. These rooms were enlarged in the early 20th century. The east-facing kitchen wing was doubled in size at that time. The interior door and window surrounds have wide-multi-band molding with bullseye corner blocks. The third story tower has an unfinished attic room.

There are two large gambrel roof barns on the property. Both are 20th century, built by Bruce L. Buck. One is at the bottom of the hill to the south of the house. The other is to the north, close to the house. Both have standing-seam tin roofs. A one-story, gable roof frame cottage with board-and-batten siding and louvered shutters is to the north. It has cement foundation and a standing seam tin roof.

#8. Continued

The Buck-Rembold house is an exception to the typical small, late 19th century farm house because of its third story tower, original to the house, and its somewhat formal plan of three parlors. It has exceptional siting on a high hill overlooking its present 60 acre lot and Old Crain Highway to the west.



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


