**Description of Property and Eligibility Determination:** *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

This property consists of an early-twentieth century frame dwelling (ca. 1910-1915 as per owner), a late-twentieth century ranch style house constructed in 1991, a two-bay frame shed or garage, a collapsed barn, and a one-bay concrete block shed. The frame dwelling is a two-story, three by one bay, side gabled structure with a single bay ell rear addition. The house has a central front porch and a small porch within the ell of the rear side. The house is clad with asbestos shingles over German siding, having an asphalt shingle roof and 2/2 double-hung windows. It is typical of the Maryland I-house plan in use at the beginning of the twentieth-century. The house has deteriorated significantly since being vacated in 1991 after the owner moved into his new house that lies to the southwest. The front and rear porches are both collapsing from water damage caused by roof leaks. Damage can also be seen within the interior of the house from neglect.

Directly west of the house lies a two-bay garage or shed having vertical board siding and resting on concrete foundation walls set on stone. This appears to date to the same age of the house and is still in stable, but deteriorated condition. About 200 feet southeast of the houses and garage/shed is a large barn that collapsed on Christmas Day of 2002, according to the owner. This barn consisted of a timber frame main structure with gable roof having shed roofed wings. Some of the wood within the barn was trimmed with a broad axe, other members are newer circular saw cut beams. A date inscribed in one of the concrete piers that supported the barn carries a date of 1955, but this is probably the date of major repair work or renovation, as the barn appears to date to the late-nineteenth or early-twentieth century. The concrete block, one-bay gable roofed shed behind the barn has a date of 1956 inscribed into one of the concrete blocks.

The property came into the possession of Charles Moore in 1920. Previously, it was owned by members of the Mackall and Mackenzie families. The C. M. Hopkins map of Prince George's County from 1878 shows the property in the ownership of J. Alfred Clagett. Martenet's 1861 Map shows the property in the ownership of Mrs. Clagett. It appears that the present house, constructed about 1910-1915, was constructed on nearly the same site as previous dwellings depicted on these maps, as no other house sites or foundations can be found within this 46-acre property.

The Moore Farm property is not a significant example of local architecture and is not associated with any historically significant persons or events in local, state, or national history. It does not appear to meet National Register Criteria for inclusion in the National Register. The main dwelling is a common early-twentieth century vernacular building in an advanced state of disrepair and suffers from loss of integrity of design, workmanship, and materials. Although such alterations as the addition of asbestos siding are reversible, it is unlikely that such work would be undertaken given its advanced state of deterioration. Additionally, the intrusion of the new ranch style house constructed adjacent to the historic house, as well as the collapse of the farm's major outbuilding – the barn, diminishes the property's integrity of feeling and association.



Description

The Moore farmhouse is a two-story frame gable roofed house, three-bays by one bay, with a rear wing in the shape of an ell. Entrance is in the central bay of the three-bay main north facade, through a door with a single-pane transom. Above the door at the second story is a central cross gable. The cornice is boxed with crown molding; at the lower corners of the gable ends are remnants of curved bargeboards. The interior plan of the main block is that of a standard I-house: central stairhall with a parlor on each side. Extending to the south at right angles to the main block and flush with the east gable end is a two-story rear kitchen wing. The house is covered with white asbestos shingle. The windows are 2/2 with plain board surrounds; trim is painted green, and the foundations are concrete.

Significance

The Moore Farmhouse is typical of the plain extended I-houses which were being built in Prince George's County early in the twentieth century. It stands on part of a tract known as Charles Branch, named for the stream which runs through the property, which was farmed late in the nineteenth century by members of the Mackall and Mackenzie families. The Mackalls removed to Baltimore near the turn of the century, and in 1920 sold 46 acres of the farm to Charles Moore; it was probably at approximately this time that the house was built. It follows the simple I-house plan, but has a rear kitchen ell. Its only ornament is the shallow cross-gable above the central doorway. This dwelling and small farm remain in the Moore family to the present day. It is an example of plain vernacular dwelling, and a noticeable landmark in this still fairly rural area.

The Moore farmhouse is a two-story frame gable roofed house, three-bays by one bay, with a rear wing in the shape of an ell. Entrance is in the central bay of the three-bay main north facade, through a door with a single-pane transom. Above the door at the second story is a central cross gable. The cornice is boxed with crown molding; at the lower corners of the gable ends are remnants of curved bargeboards. Sheltering the main entrance is a small one-story, one-bay porch which rests on concrete piers; it has a shallow central peak, and a boxed cornice with crown molding. The interior plan of the main block is that of a standard I-house: central stairhall with a parlor on each side. There is an interior corbelled brick chimney at the ridge between second and third bays.

Extending to the south at right angles to the main block and flush with the east gable end is a rear kitchen wing. It is two stories high and one-bay wide, and has an interior chimney at its south gable end. There is a small one-story enclosed porch built into the inside (southwest) corner of the ell.

The house is covered with white asbestos shingle. The windows are 2/2 with plain board surrounds; trim is painted green. The roof is of standing seam metal, and the foundations are concrete.

Just west of the drive is a very large maple tree, and two gable-roofed sheds. At a distance to the south is a tobacco barn with one side aisle, vertical board siding and a tin roof. The open land immediately south of the house is in use as gardens and orchard.

The large Charles Branch tract was farmed late in the nineteenth century by members of the Mackall and Mackenzie families<sup>1</sup> The Mackalls removed to Baltimore near the turn of the century, and in 1920 sold 46 acres of the farm to Charles Moore; it was probably at approximately this time that the house was built.<sup>2</sup> It follows the simple I-house plan, but has a rear kitchen ell. Its only ornament is the shallow cross-gable above the central doorway.

This dwelling and small farm remain in the Moore family to the present day. It stands close to the old road between Mellwood and the Woodyard, an example of plain vernacular dwelling and a noticeable landmark in this still fairly rural area.

The house sits close to the road, facing west. It is a two-story, L-shaped structure of frame construction. The main (west) facade has three bays, with a central door and a center gable in the roof. The door has a transom-light, and is covered by a one-bay porch. A two-story ell extends to the NE. There are stove-chimneys in each section. Present siding is asbestos shingle. There are several frame outbuildings on the property.
