Description:

The House at Hills Landing is a one-and-one-half-story frame gable-roofed tenant house built in two sections. It stands on a gently sloping hill above the Patuxent River, and faces roughly east towards the river. The earlier and larger section of the house is three bays by one bay, with entrance in the central (but off-center) bay. Windows are 2/2 double sash on the first story, and have shutters on the east facade; there are small single-sash, four-pane windows at second level directly under the eaves. All have plain board surrounds. The house rests on deteriorating brick foundations. There is no basement, and the floorboards rest on split log joists which are nailed into the plate with square nails. Sections of the plate are joined by mortise and tenon. The interior of the main section is one room deep: two parlors flanking an enclosed staircase. The door and window surrounds are of plain beaded board throughout. The interior doors are of board-and-batten type, made up of four, five, or six vertical beaded boards. There was an exterior brick chimney at the ridge at the south gable end of this structure. A one-bay addition has been constructed on this south gable end; the exterior hand-cut siding of the original building is clearly visible on the south interior wall of the kitchen and of the bedroom above it. The entire house is covered with gray asphalt shingle; the roof is of corrugated metal.

Significance:

The house at Hill's Landing is one of only a few early nineteenth century tenant dwellings still standing in Prince George's County. It was constructed on part of Woodland, the ancestral home plantation of the Hill family, located along the Patuxent River east of Upper Marlborough. By the mid-nineteenth century, it stood amidst a cluster of buildings at Hill's Landing on the Patuxent; the buildings included a store and several tenant dwellings, grouped around William B. Hill's fishing and boat landing. All of the other buildings are now gone; but the subject building has remained to this day in the possession of Hill's descendants. Early in its history, the building was increased in size by a south addition, and has been used continuously as a tenant dwelling. It is a modest building in only fair condition, but it exhibits evidence of early building techniques and materials, now only rarely surviving in buildings of its type.

The House at Hills Landing is a one-and-one-half-story frame gable-roofed tenant house built in two sections. It stands on a gently sloping hill above the Patuxent River, and faces roughly east towards the river. The earlier and larger section of the house is ca. 16' by 23', three bays by one bay, with entrance in the central (but off-center) bay. A one-story shed roofed porch, supported by slim tree trunks, shelters all three bays. Windows are 2/2 double sash on the first story, and have shutters on the east facade; there are small single-sash, four-pane windows at second level directly under the eaves. All have plain board surrounds.

The house rests on deteriorating brick foundations. There is no basement, and the floorboards rest on split log joists which are nailed into the plate with square nails. Sections of the plate are joined by mortise and tenon.

The interior of the main section is one room deep: two parlors (ca. 8 x 16 on the north, and ca. 12 by 16 on the south) flanking an enclosed staircase. The door and window surrounds are of plain beaded board throughout. The interior doors are of board-and-batten type, made up of four, five, or six vertical beaded boards.

There was an exterior brick chimney at the ridge at the south gable end of this structure. A one-bay addition has been constructed on this south gable end, enclosing the exterior chimney with a kitchen, and increasing the length of the building by ca. 15 feet. The exterior siding of the original building is clearly visible on the south interior wall of the kitchen and of the bedroom above it. It consists of hand-cut random-width weatherboards, most of them ca. 12" in width. In the southwest (rear) corner of the kitchen addition is a tiny boxed staircase (ascending to the east); the boxing consists of wide (ca. 10") vertical boards. Other walls of the kitchen are panelled on the interior with horizontal beaded wainscoting. Although the present floorboards of the room over the kitchen appear to be circular-sawn, they are supported by hand-hewn joists, ca. 3 inches in width. There is no basement under this south addition; it is supported by brick piers with brick infill in some locations. Windows are similar to those in the main section.

The entire house is covered with gray asphalt shingle, so that the only visible siding is that which is enclosed by the south addition, cf. supra. The roof is of corrugated metal.

The building stands in a small level area on gently sloping ground above the river. On the same level, and a short distance to the south, is a small frame shed.

 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This was probably a tenant house, that was used in connection with the old river crossing and landing here. The original part appears to have been a low, two-story frame structure, with a three-bay main (east) facade and a fireplace chimney on the exterior south wall. The chimney was later enclosed by a one-bay addition of similar style. The attic windows are small "eyebrow" openings, tucked under the eaves. The building is covered with asphalt siding.


