Description

The Wiseman House is a modest two-family house, located near the east end of Watershed Drive at the Patuxent River in the village of Nottingham. It is built on ground which slopes eastward toward the river; it rests on a high stone foundation, infilled in many places with brick. This six-bay-by-one-bay building was constructed to house two families, and consists of two attached three-bay sections. Each section has central doorway and two flanking windows on both the north and south facades. On the north facade, each of the central doorways is approached by a high stoop; on the south facade, the central door of the west dwelling unit is covered by a three-bay porch, partially enclosed. The framing of the house is covered with white asbestos shingles; windows are 2/2 double hung sash, and have plain board surrounds, painted green. The roof is covered with asphalt shingle; the eaves are overhanging, and cornices are plain and are not returned. There are two corbelled brick chimneys at the ridge, one at the west end of each dwelling unit.

Significance

The Wiseman House is a simple two-family house which stands on the south side of the old road which led to the principal warehouses and pier. It was built circa 1901 by Elizabeth Caroline Wiseman to replace a dwelling destroyed by fire. The Wisemans were members of a black family of long standing in the historic town of Nottingham. In 1885, Caroline Wiseman purchased one of the oldest houses in the village, and lived there with her daughter, working for other families in the village as seamstress and laundress. In February of 1901, a fire destroyed the Wisemans' house, as well as the hotel and the Plater house which adjoined. Within a few years the Wisemans built the present house, placing it on the remnants of the old foundation. The new structure was a double dwelling, one of very few structures of this type surviving in Prince George's County. For many years, Mrs. Wiseman's house served as a weekend hostel for hunters and fishermen. It remains to this day in the Wiseman family. The house is an unusual example of early twentieth century vernacular dwelling, a noticeable landmark in a very historic setting.

This six-bay-by-one-bay building was constructed to house two families, and consists of two attached three-bay sections. Each section has central doorway and two flanking windows on both the north and south facades. On the north facade, each of the central doorways is approached by a high stoop; on the south facade, the central door of the west dwelling unit is covered by a three-bay porch, partially enclosed. The framing of the house is covered with white asbestos shingles; windows are 2/2 double hung sash, and have plain board surrounds, painted green. The roof is covered with asphalt shingle; the eaves are overhanging, and cornices are plain and are not returned. There are two corbelled brick chimneys at the ridge, one at the west end of each dwelling unit.

The Wiseman House is a simple two-family house located near the water's edge in the village of Nottingham. It stands on the south side of the old road which led to the principal warehouses and pier. It was built circa 1901 by Elizabeth Caroline Wiseman to replace a dwelling destroyed by fire.

Nottingham was an important commercial center in eighteenth century Prince George's County. Established with Upper Marlboro and Queen Anne by the Act of 1706, it was designated a tobacco inspection station in 1747. By the late eighteenth century, Nottingham was a bustling town of stores, warehouses and inns. In August of 1814, it was the site of the encampment of British troops as they marched on Washington. By the late nineteenth century, with the Patuxent River gradually losing its prominence as an artery of transportation, Nottingham began to decline. In 1901, a disastrous fire destroyed many of the old buildings, including the house of Caroline Wiseman.<sup>1</sup> Today there is only one nineteenth century building among the small group of residences at the water's edge; the quite, idyllic community is only a faint reminder of the busy commercial center of two centuries ago.

The Wisemans were members of a black family of long standing in the Nottingham area. In 1885, Mary Jane Maccubbin, owner of the hotel in Nottingham, deeded to Elizabeth Caroline Wiseman "for \$1 and friendly feeling", a lot on the south side of the main street; it adjoined the Hotel Lot and ran from there to the Weems Steamboat Company Wharf, and was bounded on the south by the Plater house lot.<sup>2</sup> On this lot stood one of the oldest houses in the village, reported to have dated from the Revolutionary War period.<sup>3</sup> Caroline Wiseman and her daughter, Alice, made this their home, working for other families in the village as seamstress and laundress.<sup>4</sup>

In February of 1901, a disastrous fire destroyed the Wisemans' house, as well as the hotel and the Plater house which adjoined.<sup>5</sup> Within a few years the Wisemans built the present house, placing it on the remnants of the old foundation.<sup>6</sup> The new structure was a double dwelling, intended to house two families, it is one of very few structures of this type surviving in Prince George's County (cf. the Balser House, #75A-11). For many years, Mrs. Wiseman's house served as a weekend hostel for hunters and fishermen. It remains to this day in the Wiseman family; Caroline Wiseman devised the house and lot to her daughter, Alice, who in turn deeded it to the sons of her brother, John Wiseman;<sup>7</sup> their family resides there today. The house is an unusual example of early twentieth century vernacular dwelling, a noticeable landmark in a very historic setting.






