Description:

The Plater house is a large multi-section frame house located on high ground overlooking the Patuxent River at Nottingham. The main block is the southmost section; two-and-one-half stories high, and five-bays long, with gable roof. Entrance is in the central bay of the main east facade through a door with a three-pane transom. This entrance is sheltered by a one-bay, two-story columned pedimented portico. Balancing the portico on the west (rear) facade is a central cross-gable. Windows in the main block are generally 6/6 double hung sash, and have applied lintels with a narrow crown molding. Most windows have black louvered shutters. The building is framed with German siding, painted white; the roof is covered with asphalt shingle. At each of the north and south gable ends is an exterior corbelled brick chimney. At the south end is a one-story open breezeway/porch. The north chimney is fully enclosed by a two-story gable-roofed wing. Attached to the north gable end of the wing is a three-story one-bay square water tower with a hipped pyramidal roof.

Significance:

The Plater House is a multi-section frame house, built in 1901 on the site of an earlier Plater House which had been destroyed by fire. Nottingham was an important commercial center in eighteenth century Prince George's County. Today the quiet, idyllic community is only a faint reminder of the busy commercial center of two centuries ago. Judge Edward Plater purchased his large frame house in 1866; after his death in 1878, the house and property passed to his daughter. It was during Miss Plater's residence, in February 1901, that a fire destroyed the hotel and four other houses in Nottingham. Miss Plater's house was totally destroyed and within the year she constructed the present house on the same site. The new house had a large main block, with central hall and flanking parlors, a spacious kitchen wing, and a three-story water tower attached. The house overlooked several of the old warehouses at the water's edge, and was situated to take full advantage of its panoramic riverfront location. Miss Plater died in 1923, and the house has changed hands several times since then; in 1962 it was purchased by Captain Richardson who constructed the two-story columned portico on the east, and the breezeway/porch on the south. The house is a handsome and conspicuous landmark in a very historic setting.

Description

This entrance is sheltered by a one-bay, two-story pedimented portico supported by square panelled columns. The building is sheathed with German siding, painted white; at each gable end is an exterior corbelled brick chimney. The north chimney is fully enclosed by a two-story gable-roof kitchen wing; attached to the north gable end of the wing is a three-story one-bay square water tower with a hipped pyramidal roof. The Plater house is a large multi-section frame house located on high ground overlooking the Patuxent River just south of and adjoining the village of Nottingham. It consists of a two-and-one-half story side-gabled main block with lower gable-roof kitchen wing extending to the north, and a pyramidal-roof water tower attached on the north. The main block is two-and-one-half stories high, and five-bays long, with gable roof. Entrance is in the central bay of the main east facade through a door with a three-pane transom. This entrance is sheltered by a one-bay, two-story pedimented portico supported by square panelled columns. Balancing the portico on the west (rear) facade is a central cross-gable with a small square window at loft level. There is a one-story enclosed porch across this west facade, and a small pedimented one-story porch shelters the double door. This enclosed porch spans the entire west facade of both main block and north wing; the eaves of its hip roof are punctuated by exposed rafter ends. Windows in the main block are generally 6/6 double hung sash, and have applied lintels with a narrow crown molding. Most windows have black louvered shutters. The boxed cornice is not returned at the gable ends.

The building is sheathed with German siding, painted white; the roof is covered with asphalt shingle. At each of the north and south gable ends is an exterior corbelled brick chimney. At the south end is a one-story open breezeway/porch which partially encloses the south chimney. The north chimney is fully enclosed by a two-story gable-roofed kitchen wing, three bays long; it has an interior chimney at its north gable end. Both the main block and the wing rest on brick foundations. There is no basement.

Attached to the north gable end of the wing is a three-story one-bay square water tower with a hipped pyramidal roof. This tower has an entrance in its east facade, through a door with a two-pane transom. The tower rests on a concrete foundation. Its overhanging eaves are punctuated by exposed rafter ends.

Interior of the house reflects several periods of construction. Originally the main block consisted of a central stairhall with one parlor with one parlor on each side; each parlor was warmed by a fireplace in its exterior wall. The south parlor has been renovated and extended in depth by the enclosing of the west porch. The wooden mantel has applied floral relief of the early twentieth century Colonial Revival style, and door and window surrounds are of multi-band molding with plain corner blocks. The north parlor retains its original exterior west wall as a partition between it and the additional west room; one of the windows in this wall has been converted into a door into this west space. Door and window surrounds in

this north parlor (and also in the central stairhall) are of multi-band molding with bullseye corner blocks. A door in the north wall leads into a secondary stairhall (in which the exterior north chimney is fully visible) and from thence into the kitchen. In the central stairhall, a two-run closed-string staircase rises along the north wall, turns 90° at a landing, and turns again to the second story. It has a turned globe-capped newel, and turned balusters.

There are several other buildings on the property. Immediately northwest of the house is a brick two-car garage, to which is attached (on the east) a concrete block work shop. To the south of the house is a one-story guest house, built in the 1930's. This small side-gabled bungalow is sided with plain horizontal board painted white, and has entrance in the central bay of its main east facade. A shed porch with plain railing shelters this east facade.

There is a second small residence next to the entrance to the property. Immediately east of the gate to the drive is a one-story side-gabled gate house, covered with German siding painted white.

Just inside the western boundary of the property is a twentieth century gable-roof tobacco barn. It is sided with vertical boards, and has entrance in its north gable end.

The Plater House is a multi-section frame house beautifully situated on the west bank of the Patuxent at Nottingham. It was built in 1901 on the site of an earlier Plater House which had been destroyed by fire.

Nottingham was an important commercial center in eighteenth century Prince George's County. Established with Upper Marlboro and Queen Anne by the Act of 1706, it was designated a tobacco inspection station in 1747. By the late eighteenth century, Nottingham was a bustling town of stores, warehouses and inns. In August of 1814, it was the site of the encampment of British troops as they marched on Washington. By the late nineteenth century, with the Patuxent River gradually losing its prominence as an artery of transportation, Nottingham began to decline. In 1901, a disastrous fire destroyed many of the old buildings, including the house of Judge Edward Plater.¹ Today there is only one nineteenth century building (#82B-17) among the small group of residences at the water's edge; the quiet, idyllic community is only a faint reminder of the busy commercial center of two centuries ago.

Judge Plater had purchased his large frame house from Thomas and Barbara Beall in 1866; after his death in 1878, the house and property passed to his daughter, Elizabeth R. Plater.² It was during Miss Plater's residence, in February 1901, that a fire destroyed the hotel and four other houses in Nottingham. Miss Plater's house was totally destroyed and within the year she constructed the present house on the same site.³ The new house had central hall and two flanking parlors, a kitchen wing, and a three-story water tower attached. The house overlooked several of the old warehouses (now gone) at the water's edge, and was situated to take full advantage of its panoramic riverfront location.

Miss Plater died in 1923, and devised her property to her niece Caroline Plater Berry.⁴ It has changed hands several times since then. In 1929 it was purchased by Agnes Duvall, who built the guest house and the gate house. In 1962 it was purchased by Eri Horner Richardson who constructed the two-story columned portico on the east, and the breezeway/porch on the south. The house today has an almost modern appearance, but it is a handsome and conspicuous landmark in a very historic setting.


