The property is located within the listed Piscataway Park which is listed in the National Register under Criterion A for its role in maintaining the vista from Mt. Vernon. Based on the available information, this property appears to independently eligible under Criterion C as an example of the neo-classical style in Prince George's County. Although the property belonged to Alice L. L. Ferguson, who had the house constructed, it does not appear to be eligible under Criterion B for association with Ferguson, as she is not known to have lived there.

Please note that the National Park Service is responsible for evaluating the eligibility of its properties in accordance with Section 110 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and has not yet done so for this property. The above eligibility opinion reflects the views of this office only.

Description

The house at Longview stands on a high bluff on the south bank of the Piscataway Creek where it flows into the Potomac River; it is sited so that it commands a spectacular view straight north along the Potomac to the Washington monument. Longview is a two-and-one-half-story side-gabled L-shaped frame house. Its main block is five bays long with principal entrance in the central bay of the main south facade. Entrance is through a door with seven-pane transom and double (ten-pane) sidelights. Sheltering the door is a porch which supports a one-bay projecting tower with gable roof and returned cornices. A two-bay wing with slightly lower roofline extends to the east; a gable-roofed dormer with returned cornice pierces the roof in the first bay. Extending north at right angles, and flush with the west gable end of the main block, is a two-and-one-half-story ell, the north gable end of which has been designed to take full advantage of the panoramic view up the Potomac River. The first story is filled by full-length tripartite windows; at second level is a neo-Palladian window. The house is sided with plain horizontal board painted yellow. Windows and doors have plain board surrounds painted white; additional trim is painted dark green. Cornices are boxed with crown molding, and are returned at all gable ends. Two small outbuildings repeat the same decorative motifs. The wooded grounds are beautifully landscaped.

Significance

The house at Longview is an excellent example of a neo-classical dwelling, in this case greatly enhanced by its unusual setting. It was built ca. 1930 by Alice Ferguson, after she had bought several farms near Mockley Point, parts of which came to comprise the Accokeek Archeological site. In 1925, Mrs. Ferguson purchased part of an ancient tract known as Calvert (or Piscataway) Manor. Within a few years, she contracted with Jack Pierce, a local builder, to construct this house. She apparently never lived at Longview, but built another dwelling for use during her years of work at the archeological site. Longview was occupied by tenants until 1943 when it was sold to the present owners. Longview is a handsome house in an unusually beautiful setting. It exhibits elements of fine neo-classical style and is particularly distinguished by the neo-Palladian and full-length windows which overlook the cove, and offer a panoramic view up the Potomac to the Washington Monument. These features make Longview an excellent example of a house designed to take full advantage of an exceptional natural setting.

The house at Longview stands on a high bluff on the south bank of the Piscataway Creek where it flows into the Potomac River. The house stands in a wooded area southeast of Mockley Point and accessible from Bryan Point Road; it is sited so that it commands a spectacular view straight north along the Potomac to the Washington monument.

Longview is a two-and-one-half-story side-gabled L-shaped frame house. Its main block is five bays long with principal entrance in the central bay of the main south facade. Entrance is through a door with seven-pane transom and double (ten-pane) sidelights. Sheltering the door is a porch supported at each of its outer corners by three panelled square columns which have frieze and molded cornice. The porch supports a one-bay two-story projecting porch tower with returned cornices, filled at second story with a 6/6 double-hung-sash window flanked by double (eight-pane) sidelights. The central bay of the north (rear) facade has a door with the same transom and double sidelights as in the south facade, while the two easterly bays of the north facade are filled with twelve-pane double doors. There are two corbelled brick chimneys at the ridge of this main block, the westerly in line with the ridge, and the easterly astride the ridge at right angles.

The length of the south facade is increased two bays to the east by an extension with a slightly lower (two-story) roof line. A gable-roofed dormer with returned cornice pierces the roof in the first bay. On the first story the second bay consists of an inset corner porch with balustrade, supported at the corner by a square panelled column identical to those supporting the main south porch.

Extending north at right angles, and flush with the west gable end of the main block, is a two-and-one-half-story ell, the north gable end of which has been designed to take full advantage of the panoramic view up the Potomac River. The first story is filled by full-length tripartite windows, 9/9, 12/12, and 9/9, with crown molding forming a lintel above them. In the second story is a neo-Palladian window which consists of three windows, 6/6, 12/8 and 6/6, surmounted by a crown molding; over the central 12/8 window and framed by the returned cornices is a six-segment lunette window.

The house at Longview is an excellent example of a neo-classical dwelling, in this case greatly enhanced by its unusual setting. It was built ca. 1930 by Alice Ferguson, after she had bought several farms near Mockley Point, parts of which came to comprise the Accokeek Archeological site.

In 1925, Mrs. Ferguson purchased an 82-1/2 acre farm, part of an ancient tract known as Calvert (or Piscataway) Manor,¹ which had been the nineteenth century homestead of the Underwood family. Within a few years, she contracted with Jack Pierce, a local builder, to construct this house. She apparently never lived at Longview, although she did farm the land; she built another dwelling farther east, for use during her years of work at the archeological site. The house at Longview was occupied by tenants until 1943 when Mrs. Ferguson sold it to William and Nora Breese, who have resided there since that time.²

Longview is a handsome house in an unusually beautiful setting. It exhibits elements of fine neo-classical style in the porch tower and multiple window treatment. This house is particularly distinguished by the neo-Palladian and full-length windows on the north, which overlook the cove and the archeological site, and offer a clear panoramic view up the Potomac to the Washington Monument. These features make Longview an excellent example of a house designed to take full advantage of an exceptional natural setting.

Filling the interior (northeast) corner of the ell is a screened one-story porch. The entire house is sided with plain horizontal board painted yellow. Windows and doors have plain board surrounds painted white, as are the porch features; additional trim is painted dark green. There are no shutters. Cornices are boxed with crown molding, and are returned at all gable ends; the east and west gable ends have lunette windows between the returned cornices at loft level. The roof is covered with gray asphalt shingle, and the foundations are concrete.

East of the house is a small gable-roofed shed which exhibits some of the same features (boxed returned cornices with crown molding) as the house. A garage to the southeast repeats the same decorative features. Both are painted yellow, with white trim. The wooded grounds are beautifully landscaped.


