Description

The Kuehn House at Ellerbrook Farm is a two-part frame house which is set back at the end of a long lane east of Old Marshall Hall Road. The main block is a roughly square two-and-one-half-story dwelling house with pyramidal roof. Entrance is in the central bay of the five-bay (main) west facade. Above the door is a small canopy, and above both is a massive two-story columned portico covering the central bay. This portico is supported by two pairs of tall Tuscan-style columns, and has a full pediment with frieze and crown molding. Two symmetrical interior brick chimneys rise from the north and south planes of the roof; a third chimney, exterior with weathering, stands at the south facade. Siding is plain horizontal board painted white; foundations are of brick reinforced with concrete. Attached to the north facade is a small one-story one-bay-by-one-bay wing, probably older than the main house. It is reported to be built of log. The uneven juncture of this wing with the north facade of the main block suggests that the main block was built onto the smaller wing. The north wing is sided with plain horizontal board, and foundations are brick and concrete.

Significance

The Kuehn House at Ellerbrook Farm is a two-part building, consisting of a small one-story log dwelling attached to an imposing neoclassical house with full height entry porch; it is an impressive landmark on the Old Marshall Hall Road. The property on which this house stands was known as Poplar Hill. In the mid-nineteenth century, this farm was the family home of Dr. William G. Hardy, and it is possible that the small gable-roofed log section was his dwelling. After the Civil War, Poplar Hill was one of many properties bought up by the prominent Fendall Marbury of Mattaponi. The 459-acre farm passed in 1880 to Henry Ellerbrook, and since that time has been known as Ellerbrook Farm. In this century, Henry Ellerbrook's farm was divided among his children; a 296-acre parcel on which the old house stood was conveyed by deed of partition in 1911 to his daughter, who constructed a large neoclassical dwelling on one end of the older house. This new dwelling followed the basic square pyramidal-roofed form which was very popular at the time, but it was distinguished by the monumental two-story pedimented entry porch. Edward Thomas sold the farm in 1920 to Walter Kuehn, whose family remains there to the present day. Their house is a rare example in Prince George's county of this type of early twentieth century neoclassical dwelling.

The Kuehn House at Ellerbrook Farm is a two-part frame house which is set back at the end of a long lane east of Old Marshall Hall Road. The main block is a roughly square two-and-one-half-story dwelling house with pyramidal roof. Entrance is in the central bay of the five-bay (main) west facade. Above the door is a small canopy, and above both is a massive two-story columned portico covering the central bay. This portico is supported by two pairs of tall Tuscan-style columns, and has a full pediment with frieze and crown molding. There is a crown molding at the eaves on all four elevations. There are only three windows across the rear (east) facade of the building; a small dormer (with 1/1 window) pierces the (rear) east plane of the roof. A one-story hip-roofed porch supported by Tuscan columns shelters the central entrance on this rear facade. Two symmetrical interior brick chimneys rise from the north and south planes of the roof (toward the west front); a third chimney, exterior with weathering, stands at the south facade, closer to the rear (east) of the building. Siding is plain horizontal board painted white; windows (6/6 double hung sash) have plain board surrounds and, in some locations, green louvered shutters. The roof is covered with green asphalt shingle. Foundations are of brick reinforced with concrete.

Attached to the north facade is a small one-story one-bay-by-one-bay wing, probably older than the main house. It is reported to be built of log, although this is not apparent from the exterior. The uneven juncture of this wing with the north facade of the main block suggests that the main block was built onto the smaller wing. Like the main block, this small north wing is sided with plain horizontal board, windows are 6/6, foundations are brick and concrete, and the roof is covered with green asphalt shingle.

There are two outbuildings. Northeast of the house stands a small frame stable with a porch. Farther from the house and to the southeast is another stable, one-and-one-half-stories, with standing seam tin (gable) roof, and board-and-batten siding on its north side.

The Kuehn House at Ellerbrooke Farm is a two part building, consisting of a small one-story (log) dwelling attached to an imposing neoclassical house with full height entry porch. Standing on a knoll at the end of a long lane, it is an impressive landmark on the Old Marshall Hall Road.

The property on which this house stands consisted of parts of several adjoining tracts, and was generally known as Poplar Hill. In the mid-nineteenth century, this farm was the family home of Dr. William G. Hardy, and it is possible that the small gable-roofed log section was his dwelling. After the Civil War, Dr. Hardy and his wife borrowed money on their 500-acre Poplar Hill plantation, and lost the property when they defaulted in payments.<sup>1</sup> Poplar Hill was one of many properties bought up in that post war period by the prominent Fendall Marbury of Mattaponi.<sup>2</sup> The 459-acre farm passed in 1880 to Henry Ellerbrook, and since that time has been known as Poplar Hill or Ellerbrook Farm.<sup>3</sup>

In this century, Henry Ellerbrook's farm was divided among his children; a 296-acre parcel on which the old house stood was conveyed by deed of partition to his daughter, Minnie Ellerbrook Thomas, in 1911. Within a few years, Minnie and Edward Thomas had constructed a large neoclassical dwelling on one end of the older house. This new dwelling followed the basic square pyramidal-roofed form which was very popular at the time, but it was distinguished by the monumental two-story pedimented entry porch. Edward Thomas sold the farm in 1920 to Walter Kuehn, whose family remains there to the present day.<sup>4</sup> Their house is a rare example in Prince George's county of this type of early twentieth century neoclassical dwelling.




