Description:

The J. Eli Hunt Residence was previously surveyed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission in February 1985. Since the time of the previous survey there have been no changes to the house and outbuildings.

National Register Evaluation:

The J. Eli Hunt Residence, constructed circa 1840, was previously surveyed by the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission in February 1985. The property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion C, as a significant example of a mid-nineteenth century vernacular house later enlarged and remodeled with Folk Victorian detailing. The house retains good integrity of form, materials, and detailing, and the alterations date to an historic period. The property is located on its original site and is screened from the surrounding major traffic routes by heavy woods. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. Finally, based upon the date of construction and the property type, there is a likelihood that an archaeological component could exist on the property. However, as no archaeological investigation has been conducted, the eligibility of the property under Criterion D cannot be assessed at this time.

Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:

The National Register boundaries of the J. Eli Hunt Residence follow the current property lines of 7500 Accokeek Road (Prince George's County Tax Map 144, Parcel 128). This 1.82 hectare (4.5 acre) parcel is bounded on the north, south, and east by roads and on the west by adjacent tax parcels. The boundary includes the house and contributing barns, kitchen, and garage. The parcel is part of the land historically associated with the property.



Description:

The J. Eli Huntt House is a frame gable-roofed house which has been built in three basic sections. It is covered with plain weatherboard siding painted white, has a new synthetic shingle roof, and rests on a high (new) cement block foundation. Windows in most locations are 4/4; shutters at the windows are panelled on the first story and louvered on the second. The principal facade now faces south. On the west is a two-and-one-half-story three-bay section, with entrance in the third-bay. Across this three-bay section is a one-story porch with turned, bracketed posts. Adjoining this section at right angles on the east is a two-and-one-half-story section with a two-story three-window projecting bay filling its south gable end; it has a boxed, bracketed cornice, and, at third level, decorative dog's-tooth shingles and a diamond-shaped window. Behind and to the north of these two sections is the oldest section of the house. In 1950, the house was moved and placed on a newly excavated cement-block basement foundation. From this basement the consecutive hand-hewn and circular sawn beams of the several construction phases can be observed. Several outbuildings, including a small kitchen structure, were also moved and relocated north and west of the house.

Significance:

The J. Eli Huntt House is a significant example of a residential building, expanded in several consecutive phases of construction. Family tradition indicates that the original (now north) section was a small frame building with catslide roof, originally built by William Townshend as a carpentry exercise for his sons. It was one of the first buildings in the Tee Bee, the village which developed at the conjunction of five major roads. J. Eli Huntt purchased the house and adjoining store building in 1862, and soon afterwards began to make additions to the house: e.g., the raising of a full second story, and removal of the original lean-to kitchen. In 1872, Huntt made a substantial addition to the house (the southwest section), resulting in an L-shaped building nearly double in size. The handsome southeast section was constructed in 1905, after Huntt's death. In 1950, the house was moved circa 300 feet to the south, and rotated 180 degrees to face south. Although its location is new, the J. Eli Huntt house is still a noticeable landmark, and represents the expansion of a home through successive generations of the family of a successful local entrepreneur.

The J. Eli Huntt House is a frame gable-roofed house which has been built in three basic sections. It is covered with plain weatherboard siding painted white, has a new synthetic shingle roof, and rests on a high (new) cement block foundation. Windows in most locations are 4/4; shutters at the windows are panelled on the first story and louvered on the second.

The principal facade now faces south. On the west is a two-and-one-half story three-bay section, with entrance in the third bay. Across this three-bay section, there is a one-story porch with turned, bracketed posts. There is one interior chimney with corbelled cap at the west gable end. Adjoining this section perpendicularly on the east is a two-and-one-half story section with a three-window projecting bay filling its south gable end at the first and second stories; this gable end has a boxed, bracketed (returned) cornice with crown molding. The apex of the gable end, at third level, is decorated with dog's-tooth shingles, and a diamond-shaped window. There is an interior chimney at the ridge at the north gable end. Behind and to the north of these two sections is the oldest section of the house; a two-story three-bay gable-roofed section, with the ridge of the roof running north and south. There is a chimney at the ridge at its north gable end. Family records indicate that this section originally had a catslide (saltbox) roof.

In 1950 this entire house was moved circa 300 feet south from its original location and rotated 180 degrees to face south; it was relocated on a cement block basement foundation newly excavated for that purpose. From this basement the floor construction of the several sections of the house can be observed. In the north section, whole logs and heavy hand-hewn beams support the random width floor boards; there is brick nogging. In the later (southeast and southwest) sections, the supporting beams are circular sawn.

Several outbuildings, including a small frame gable-roofed kitchen building, were moved and relocated a short distance north and west of the house.

The J. Eli Huntt House is a significant example of a residential building, expanded in several consecutive phases of construction. Family tradition indicates that the original (now north) section was a small frame building with catslide roof, originally built by William Townshend as a carpentry exercise for his sons. It was one of the first buildings in the Tee Bee, the village which developed at the conjunction of five major roads: to Piscataway, to the lower chapel of St. John's (Accokeek), to Charles County, to Brandywine and the District of Columbia, and to Upper Marlboro. J. Eli Huntt purchased the house and adjoining store building in 1862, and soon afterwards began to make additions to the house: e.g., the raising of a full second story, and removal of the original lean-to kitchen and construction of a small separate kitchen building to replace it. In 1872, Huntt made a substantial addition to the house (the two-story parlor and bedrooms block which is now the southwest section), resulting in an L-shaped building nearly double in size. During these years, Huntt was buying up additional property in the village of TB, providing the community with physician and blacksmith, and running general store and carpentry enterprises. He died in 1897.¹

The last major building phase of Huntt's house was in 1905 with the addition of the southeastern section by Huntt's widow. (Porch, bathroom and kitchen were added on the northwest in later years.) The third generation of Huntt's family lives in the house today. In 1950, because of the construction of Md. Route 5, the house was moved circa 300 feet to the south, and turned 180 degrees to face south on Accokeek Road. It was placed on a high concrete block basement foundation. Several outbuildings, including the frame (1860's) kitchen building, were moved and relocated close to the house, on a 4-1/2 acre parcel of land between the old Brandywine and Accokeek roads west of Route 5 and the village of T.B. Although the location of the house is new, the J. Eli Huntt house is still a noticeable landmark, and represents the expansion of a home through successive generations of the family of a successful local entrepreneur.


