Description:

The Old Bank of Brandywine was previously surveyed by the Prince George's County Historic Preservation Commission in 1986. The property was included in the Brandywine Historic District survey completed in 1996 by P.A.C. Spero & Company for the U.S. 301 South Corridor Transportation Study, but no individual Addendum Sheet was prepared at that time. Since the time of the previous survey, the property is unchanged.

National Register Evaluation:

The Old Bank of Brandywine is a contributing element of the Brandywine Historic District (PG:85A-32). It is not individually eligible for the National Register. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. It is not eligible under Criterion C, as it has been altered for use as a residence. The building no longer retains integrity of feeling, association, or design.





Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Old Bank of Brandywine is a one-story hip-roof stucco-covered bank building which has been converted into a residence. It stands on one of the lots on the main road of the Village of Brandywine.

The building has a small rectangular footprint, and measures 32'6" by 20'3". It is an irregular three bays by three bays, and faces south toward Brandywine Road. Entrance is in the central bay of the south facade through a modern glazed door with plain board surround. Sheltering this door is a gable-roof entry porch which has a returned cornice with crown molding; it is supported by slim Tuscan columns.

The bank building was constructed of molded concrete block, as shown in an old photograph; the block has been covered with a thick coat of stucco, beige in color. In some locations where the stucco surface is broken, its metal mesh base can be observed. It is not known exactly when this stucco coat was applied, but at the time of application, new window surrounds were installed, approximately 3 1/2 inches outside the original exterior surface. Windows are 1/1 double-hung-sash with plain board surrounds painted dark brown, as is all of the trim. The three bays are irregularly spaced on all facades except the main south one. There is only one window in the north (rear) facade, in the westernmost bay; in the third bay of the east facade is a multi-panelled door which leads into a rear vestibule.

The hip roof is covered with green asphalt shingle, and there is a corbelled brick chimney at the north end of the ridge. The cornices are boxed, and there is a plain board frieze under the deeply over-hanging eaves. The foundation of the building is of poured concrete; the floors are supported by joists which are in reasonably good condition, and the "crawl space" beneath them is very shallow (circa 8 inches in depth).

Interior of the building consists of two principal spaces: a large room in the front (south) which was the bank lobby, and a smaller room in the rear (northwest) which probably served as the bank manager's office. The side entrance (in the third bay of the east elevation) led into a small corridor which gave rear access to the office.

Doors and windows on the interior feature multi-band molding with bull's-eye cornerblocks throughout, typical of the period of construction. In the larger front space there is beaded vertical wainscoting below a molded chair-rail, and, until a few years ago, there was evidence that a handrail had divided the room; a modern door has been installed in the principal south entrance. Also in the larger

front room, a modern dropped ceiling has been installed. The original high ceiling, complete with molded cornice, is intact in the rear office space. In the wall which divides the front lobby from the rear office, can be observed the flue which originally served the two stoves for heating the two spaces.

After the 1960s, when bank operations ceased at this location, the building was converted to domestic use. The dropped ceiling was installed in the large front room, and a bathroom was constructed in its northeast corner. The building served as a rental dwelling until 1992, and since that time has served as a storage facility for the mechanical contracting business that currently owns the property.

Directly north of the bank building is a shed-roof storage shed, currently containing bales of straw. There is a door in the east elevation, as well as a larger entrance in the north shed end. The roof, covered with standing-seam metal, slopes down toward the west. This storage shed is sided with lapped horizontal boards over flush horizontal board, both circular sawn, and unpainted. New replacement board is being installed in the north shed end. The building has a shallow boxed cornice. Farther to the northwest, in an overgrown thicket, are the ruins of another storage outbuilding, constructed of channelled terra cotta blocks. North of this ruinous building is a deteriorating tractor, with plow attached.

The small bank building fronts on Brandywine Road (Maryland 381); there is an unpaved semi-circle drive in front of its south entrance. East of this entrance drive is a large mature pin oak which dominates the front yard; behind the building, just north of the storage shed is a mature white oak.

The Old Bank of Brandywine is a small hip-roof stucco-covered building, constructed to serve as the Bank of Brandywine. It is probably the only building of its type (i.e., a small bank structure built to serve a rural community) surviving in Prince George's County. It stands on the main road through the village of Brandywine.

Much of the land now constituting the village of Brandywine was owned in the nineteenth century by William H. Early, a successful and prosperous merchant who built the general store (#85A-32-11) just west of the railroad tracks. Brandywine became a busy commercial center at the junction of the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad with the Southern Maryland Railroad. By the time of his death in 1890, William H. Early owned approximately 3000 acres of land in the Brandywine area, including most of the village itself. His land was surveyed and divided among his heirs; his son, Charles S. Early, received several parcels of land along the north side of the Brandywine Road, including the subject property. Part of this land was divided into building lots, including one acre which was sold to Joanna Canter; it is the easterly portion of this one-acre lot which later became the property of the Bank of Brandywine.¹

By the turn of the twentieth century, there was in rural southern Prince George's County a substantial German population, whose land purchases and farm operations were supported by the German-American Colonization and Land Company of Maryland. Early in the twentieth century, this Land Company began buying up land in the Brandywine area, including Mrs. Canter's one-acre lot.² In 1912, members of that company incorporated to form the Southern Maryland German American Bank; three of the directors of the new bank were residents of Brandywine: Charles S. Early, Jr. (son of the above mentioned Charles S. Early), Frederick Bieberbach, and Herman Badenhoop, who was instrumental in bringing electricity to the village of Brandywine. The capital stock of the new bank was \$10,000. At the same time, the Land Company sold the one-acre parcel of land to the newly formed Bank company. It was at

this time that the small bank building was constructed on the easterly third of the one-acre lot, and opened for business.

Soon after the bank opened, the Bank Company reconveyed the westerly 2/3 of the lot to the German-American Colonization and Land Company, which in turn sold it (in 1917) to the Badenhop family; the earliest part of the house which stands today on the westerly 2/3 of the original Bank property (at 14108 Brandywine Road) was constructed by the Badenhop family circa 1920.

In 1913, the Southern Maryland German American Bank reincorporated as the Bank of Brandywine, with Paul Johansson as president and Herman Badenhop as cashier. The Bank of Brandywine continued as an important center in the Brandywine area.

This small bank building continued to be used for approximately fifty years. At some point (not yet known) during this time, the concrete block exterior surface of the building was covered with stucco, and new and compatible window and door surrounds were installed to fit the deeper openings. After being taken over by Citizens Bank and Trust Company, the old building was replaced by a larger modern bank building a short distance to the east (14118 Brandywine Road). The old bank building was renovated and converted into a residence, and served as a tenant dwelling for nearly 30 years. In recent years, it has been converted again into a storage facility for the mechanical contracting company which owns the property.

The renovations of the last 30 years did little to change the appearance of the building. The Old Bank of Brandywine building is still a significant landmark and major contributor to the streetscape of Brandywine, for it reflects the commercial element of an early twentieth-century rural village. It is perhaps the only structure of its kind surviving in Prince George's County.







Description

The hip-roof is covered with green asphalt shingle, and there is a corbelled brick chimney at the north end of the ridge. The cornices are boxed, and there is a plain board frieze under the deeply overhanging eaves. The building exterior is beige stucco; the foundation is of poured concrete. Directly north of the bank building is a shed-roof shed with an opening in its east elevation; its roof is covered with standing seam tin. It is sided with lapped horizontal unpainted boards over flush horizontal boards and has a boxed cornice.

Early in the twentieth century, the German American Colonization and Land Company of Maryland began buying up land in Brandywine, including a one-acre lot belonging to a Mrs. Joanna Canter. In 1912, members of that company incorporated to form the Southern Maryland German American Bank; three of the directors of the new bank were residents of Brandywine. At the same time, the Land Company sold the one-acre parcel of land to the newly formed Bank Company. It was probably at this time that the subject bank building was constructed, adjoining Mrs. Canter's house on the east. In 1913, the Southern Maryland German American Bank reincorporated as the Bank of Brandywine and continued as an important banking center in the Brandywine area. After being taken over by Citizens Bank and Trust Company in 1963, the old building was replaced by a larger, more modern bank building a short distance to the east; the old bank building was converted into a small residence. It is still a significant landmark and major contributor to the streetscape of Brandywine, where it reflects the early twentieth century atmosphere of a busy south-county village.



This small bank building continued to be used for approximately fifty years. After being taken over by Citizens Bank and Trust Compny, the old building was replaced by a larger modern bank building a short distance to the east; the old bank building was converted into a small residence. It is still a significant landmark and major contributor to the streetscape of Brandywine, for it reflects the early twentieth century atmosphere of a busy south county village. It is perhaps the only structure of its kind surviving in Prince George's County.

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


