Description:

The Charles and Edna Wilcox Property is a 1½-story, 3-bay vernacular residence with Bungalow influences located on the east side of Brandywine Road in the T.B. vicinity, Prince George's County. Constructed in 1929, the property consists of the residence, three sheds and a garage. The residence has a side-gable roof, an integral front porch and a shed roof rear addition with an enclosed rear porch. The structure is of wood-frame construction with a structural clay tile foundation. The exterior is covered with asbestos shingles and the windows are wood 6/1 double-hung. An interior brick chimney is located on the rear roof slope.

Significance:

Waldo Ward purchased 11.2 hectares (27.7 acres) of land from Abner Mason in 1923. In 1927, Ward sold 7.5 hectares (18.52 acres) of land to Charles and Edna Wilcox. According to tax records of Prince George's County, a house was constructed on the land in 1929. Ira and Paul Cooley purchased the house and 4 hectares (10.08 acres) of the land from Charles and Edna Wilcox in 1938. Sole ownership of the property was transferred to Paul Cooley, the current owner, in 1949. The property has since been subdivided into "Cooley Estates" and retains .5 hectares (1.33 acres).

The Charles and Edna Wilcox Property is a 1½-story, 3-bay vernacular residence with Bungalow influences located on the east side of Brandywine Road in the T.B. vicinity, Prince George's County. Constructed in 1929, the property consists of the residence, three sheds and a garage. The residence has a side-gable roof, an integral front porch and a shed roof rear addition with an enclosed rear porch. The structure is of wood-frame construction with a structural clay tile foundation. The exterior is covered with asbestos shingles and the windows are wood 6/1 double-hung. An interior brick chimney is located on the rear roof slope.

The integral porch on the front, or west elevation is supported by four brick columns with a wood railing. The central entrance within the porch is a 6-light wood door. Also on the first story are two pairs of 6/1 wood double-hung windows. The second story has a shed dormer with three 6/1 double-hung windows.

The north elevation has a 3-light awning window on the basement level and two 6/1 wood double-hung windows on the first story. The second story also has two 6/1 wood double-hung windows and the attic level has a 4-light casement window.

The first story of the rear elevation has been covered by a 1-story shed roof addition. The addition has a parged foundation and a cut-away porch at the southeast corner. The basement level has a 3-light awning window and the cut-away porch has been enclosed with a band of four 1/1 double-hung windows. The entrance to the enclosed porch is a wood panel door on the south elevation. Also on the south elevation is a pair of 1/1 double-hung windows. The remaining elevation of the addition has a 6/6 wood double-hung window. The second story of the main block has a shed roof dormer with a 4-light casement window.

The south elevation has a 3-light awning window on the basement level. The first story has a pair of 6/1 wood double-hung windows and two single 6/1 double-hung windows. The second story has two 6/1 wood double-hung windows, while the attic level has a 4-light casement window.

Access to the interior of the building was not available.

There are four outbuildings associated with this property. Shed #1, constructed in 1929, is located east of the house. The small 1-story building is supported by concrete block piers, has a corrugated metal front-gable roof and vertical wood siding. A vertical wood door is located on the south gable end.

The second outbuilding, shed #2, is located east of the house and shed #1. Constructed in 1929, the building has a shed roof and vertical wood siding. The structure is supported on concrete piers and has window and door openings on the south elevation.

Shed #3, the third outbuilding, was constructed in 1929. The building has a corrugated metal roof, vertical wood siding and a vertical wood door on the south elevation. Shed #3 is located east of the house and southeast of sheds #1 and #2.

7. Description (Continued)

The forth outbuilding is a garage. The garage is located east of the house and sheds #1 and #2, and north of shed #3. The garage is of wood-frame construction with a concrete foundation and a front-gable roof covered with corrugated metal. The building has wood siding and the gable ends are covered with hexagonal asphalt shingles. The south elevation has a set of double doors, while the north elevation has a casement window.

The Charles and Edna Wilcox Property is located on the east side of Brandywine Road. A driveway extends east from Brandywine Road along the south side of the house to the outbuildings at the rear of the property. The driveway then connects with a gravel access road located to the south and running parallel with the driveway.

8. Significance (Continued)

T.B. was in danger of decline by the end of the nineteenth century. During the 1870s and 1880s, both the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad and the Southern Maryland and Point Lookout Railroad had bypassed T.B. in favor of the village of Brandywine, located two miles to the east. Businesses and other activities favored this location, and T.B. remained a small, crossroads village serving only local farmers and travelers. William G. Becker tried to develop the "Littleworth" subdivision northwest of T.B. during the 1930s, however only a few lots were ever developed. Several dwellings were constructed around the periphery of the village between 1930 and 1950. In 1927, the Governor Crain Highway, now Route 301, was constructed along a new alignment immediately east of T.B. In 1950 Maryland Route 5, which formerly followed Brandywine Road north of T.B. and Old Brandywine Road south of T.B., was moved to a new alignment immediately east of Brandywine Road. Although Route 5 did not result in extensive demolition, T.B. failed quickly after its construction (MHT, PG:85A-33).

The house on the Charles and Edna Wilcox Property is an example of a residence influenced by the Bungalow style. The Bungalow became the dominant style of middle and working class housing in the period between 1900 and 1935. The form was inspired by Charles and Henry Green, brothers who worked together in Pasadena, California during 1893-1914. The Green brothers built intricate and detailed examples of Bungalows sometimes called "ultimate bungalows" (McAlester 1984, 454). Bungalow style spread out of California primarily by popular magazines and pattern books, rather than by architects. These pattern books offered plans for Bungalows for as little as five dollars. Some books offered pre-cut packages of lumber and detailing that could be assembled by local builders. Pattern books were advertised in popular magazines like House Beautiful, promulgating the Bungalow style. A monthly periodical called Bungalow Magazine was produced during 1909-1918. Bungalows were enormously popular in the early years of the twentieth century, in part because they were inexpensive to design and build. Their emergence coincided with the rise in the number of working and middle class Americans who could afford to purchase a house (Klein 1985, 44). The Bungalow has been defined as "one of the characteristic building types of democratic America" because of its adaptive and extensive use (Lancaster 1986, 104).

Bungalows are typically 1½-story structures, with low, horizontal lines and an integral porch on the front of the house. Gables often are bracketed and have wide projecting eaves. Roofs are gently pitched and often have either gable or shallow shed dormers. Windows are either sash or casement with many lights or single panes of glass. Bungalows are also notable for their earth-tone stains and use of natural materials such as stones, shingling, or stucco. The Bungalow form frequently features Craftsman-style detailing, such as exposed rafter tails, three-over-one double-hung windows, and wide wood frames around doors and windows. There are numerous variations to the Bungalow such as the Colonial, Swiss, and Spanish styles.

National Register Evaluation:

Constructed in 1929, the Charles and Edna Wilcox Property is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. The property is not eligible under Criterion A, as research conducted indicates no association with any historic events or trends significant in the development of national, state, or local history. Historic research indicates that the property has no association with persons who have made specific contributions to history, and therefore, it does not meet Criterion B. It is not eligible under Criterion C, as it lacks material and design integrity. The house is not a significant example of early to mid-twentieth century design since it lacks more typical Bungalow features as wide eaves, brackets, exposed rafter ends or various exterior siding treatments. In addition, the building has been covered with asbestos shingles and the rear porch has been enclosed. Finally, the structure has no known potential to yield important information, and therefore, is not eligible under Criterion D.


