Description

The Jeremiah Ryon house is a two-part frame gable-roof house set on a high knoll surrounded by gently rolling farmland west of Nottingham. The main block is two stories high and side-gabled; it is three bays by two bays, with entrance in the first bay of the three-bay south facade. It is sided with plain horizontal board, covered with deteriorating asphalt shingle in yellow brick pattern. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash, with plain board surrounds and no shutters. The cornice is boxed and plain; the roof is of standing-seam metal. The structure rests on brick piers infilled with concrete. One of the beams which forms the sill is visible at the southwest corner, and appears to be hewn log. Attached to the east gable end of the main block and flush with its south facade is a two-story gable-roof kitchen wing, two-bays-by-one-bay. Its ridge runs parallel with that of the main block, offset slightly to the south. The wing has German siding, now covered with deteriorating asphalt shingle in yellow brick pattern. A one-story screened porch spans the south facade of both the main block and the wing. Interior of the main block consists of side stairhall and adjoining parlors; the staircase is typical of the mid-nineteenth century, and interior wood trim is very plain.

Significance

The Jeremiah Ryon House is an example of a modest mid-nineteenth century dwelling of rural Prince George's County; it has been expanded by the addition of a wing. The house stands in a commanding position on one of the highest points in the area west of Nottingham, overlooking farmland in all directions. The main block of this house was constructed circa 1860 by John Grimes on property known as Connicks; it was a typical vernacular dwelling of the period, with side stairhall and adjoining parlors. Grimes died before the end of the Civil War, and the farm passed to his daughter Annie, wife of Jeremiah Ryon. During the remainder of the nineteenth century, the Ryons raised their family in this house, probably adding the east wing during this period; Ryon farmed the land, and operated a small general store located on the Nottingham Road. At the turn of the twentieth century, Ryon sold the farm; for much of this century, it has been a tenant farm. The house is a prominent local landmark, but it has been significantly altered during this century, and is in seriously deteriorating condition.

The Jeremiah Ryon house is a two-part frame gable-roof house which stands on a high knoll surrounded by gently rolling farmland west of Nottingham. The house is set back approximately 1,500 feet north of the old road to Nottingham; it is in seriously deteriorating condition. The main block consists of a three-bay by one-bay two-story section with entrance in the first bay of the three bay south facade; the four-panel door has a plain board surround and a three-pane transom. There is a rear entrance to the side hall in the third bay of the north facade. A concrete block stove chimney rises from the south plane of the roof. The main block is sided with plain horizontal board, covered with deteriorating asphalt shingles in yellow brick pattern. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash, with plain board surrounds and no shutters. The cornice is boxed and plain. The roof is of standing seam metal. The structure rests on brick piers infilled with concrete; there is no basement. One of the massive beams which forms the sill is visible at the southwest corner, and appears to be hand-hewn log.

Interior of the main block consists of a side stairhall on the west and adjoining parlors on the east. The two-run stair rises along the west wall of the stairhall, turns at a landing and continues to the second story; the stair has a handsome heavy turned newel with mitred cap, and tapered balusters (painted white). The stair ends are undecorated, as is the spandrel, and the space under the stair is used as a closet. The two parlors to the east of the stairhall are not equal in size, the front (south) parlor being larger than the room to the north. Considerable alteration has taken place in all of the spaces. Wall board has been applied in the two parlors, and the fireplaces have been replaced by stove flues; there are no mantels. Floor boards, of random width, are probably original; base boards are wide and plain. Door and window surrounds are of plain board.

Attached to the east gable end of the main block and flush with its south facade is a two-story gable-roof kitchen wing, two bays by one bay. Its ridge runs parallel with that of the main block, offset slightly to the south, and its roofline is slightly lower than that of the main block. The wing consists of a single kitchen space with bedroom above. Entrance is in the second (eastmost) bay of the south facade. The wing is approximately two-thirds the depth of the main block, and the space thus formed in the northeast corner is filled with a one-story shed-roof screen-enclosed porch which rests on concrete piers. The wing has German siding, now covered with deteriorating asphalt shingle in yellow brick pattern. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash with plain board surrounds and no shutters. The cornice is boxed and plain. The roof is covered with

standing seam metal. The wing rests on a brick foundation which encloses a shallow crawl space. From this space are visible the whole logs which support the floor boards. A beam which forms the sill is visible at the southeast corner; it appears old and worn, but machine sawn.

A one-story screened porch spans the south facade of both the main block and the wing, tying the two sections together into a single unit. Its shed roof is covered with metal, and it rests on concrete piers. Northeast of the house is a square gable-roof outbuilding with vertical (sawn) board siding. It has a corrugated metal roof, and its heavy deteriorating sill beams rest partially on reinforcing concrete. There are several twentieth-century tobacco barns to the north on lower ground, and a long low gable-roof shed below the knoll to the east. Another twentieth-century tobacco barn, with side aisle, stands on a lower knoll approximately 1,000 feet to the southeast.

tobacco barn all in good condition.⁶ For nearly 50 years (1919-1967), the Connicks property was owned by the Baden family, and operated as a tenant farm. During this period, several large barns were constructed but the dwelling and its immediate outbuildings fell into decay.⁷

There have been several significant changes in the property during this century. The long entrance drive up to the house has been graded, thus eliminating the deep banks which marked its line in the nineteenth century, and the old trees which shaded the knoll have been removed.⁸ The general store which stood on the side of the Nottingham road had been demolished before 1914. The Victorian porch which sheltered the principal south entrance of the house has been replaced by a shed-roof (now screened) porch across the entire south facade, and brick-pattern asphalt shingle has been applied over the plain board and German siding of both sections of the building. The interior has been altered by the closing of fireplaces, the removal of mantels, and the installation of wallboard in some of the rooms. The house has suffered steady deterioration from weather and termites, and probably cannot be saved. Because of its location on the knoll, highly visible from the Nottingham Road, it is, however, a prominent local landmark.

The house faces south toward the old road to Nottingham; it is in deteriorating condition, in need of major repair. The main block consists of a three-bay by one-bay two-story section with entrance in the first bay of the three-bay south facade. Interior consists of side hall on the west with stair-case to the second story rooms, and parlors on the east. There is a rear entrance to the side hall in the third bay of the north facade. A concrete block stove chimney rises from the south plane of the roof. The main block is sided with plain horizontal board, covered with deteriorating asphalt shingles in yellow brick pattern. Windows are 6/6 double hung sash, with plain board surrounds and no shutters. The cornice is boxed and plain. The roof is of standing seam metal. The structure rests on brick piers infilled with concrete. One of the massive beams which forms the sill is visible at the southwest corner, and appears to be hewn (trimmed) log.

The Jeremiah Ryon House is an example of a modest mid-nineteenth century dwelling of rural Prince George's County; it has been expanded by the addition of a wing. The house stands in a commanding position on one of the highest points in the area west of Nottingham, overlooking farmland in all directions.

The main block of this house was constructed shortly before 1860 by John Grimes, on the 173-acre farm (known as Connicks) which he had purchased out of the estate of Robert W. Bowie.¹ The house was a typical vernacular dwelling of the period, with side stairhall and double parlor. Grimes died before the end of the Civil War, and his widow deeded the farm to their daughter Annie, wife of Jeremiah Ryon.² During the remainder of the nineteenth century, Ryon raised his family in this house, adding the east wing for increased living space; he continued to farm the surrounding acres. At the turn of the twentieth century, Ryon sold the farm; for the major part of this century, the farm has been the property of the Baden family, and has for a long period of time been a rental property.³ The house is now in seriously deteriorating condition, but is a prominent local landmark.
