Description

The Dr. John H. Skinner House (Mansfield) stands at the top of a hill one-quarter mile east of Croom Road. It is a two-story frame cross-gable house. Highlighting the main south facade is a central pedimented gable at second level, with returned crown molded cornices. Filling the central gable is a pair of 2/2 windows. Centered on the ridge behind the central gable is a tall corbelled brick chimney. The south facade is four bays wide. In the third bay is an off-center door leading into a passage between a wide west parlor and a narrow east one. A large fireplace is centered in the interior wall of the west parlor. At the apex of the east and west gable ends are remnants of jig sawn pendants. The house is on a high deteriorated brick foundation. There is a two-story two-bay one-room wing at the rear, making the house T shaped. The entire house is sheathed with German siding, unpainted. The roof is covered with asphalt single. East of the house, enclosed in an iron fence, is the family burial ground. There are six altar tombs, with full-size slabs. To the north of the house is a twentieth century gable-roofed barn with wide vertical siding and concrete foundation. There are two more barns down the hill, southeast of the house. One is a board-and-batten gable-roofed stable. East of it is an older gable-roofed barn, with a deep overhang on its north face. Its siding consists of wide split boards laid horizontally. The rafters are of hand hewn materials.

Significance

The Dr. John Skinner House is significant both for the history of its 295 acres and as part of a nineteenth century farm complex including cemetery and outbuildings. Mansfield was patented in 1663 and has belonged to descendants of the same family since the 18th century. John Henry Skinner, a physician and planter, acquired the property from his father in 1846 and owned Mansfield until his death in 1883. He willed it to his nephew; John Henry Skinner Sasscer, who died in 1892. Mansfield then went to Sasscer's brother, Reverdy Sasscer. The house was used as a tenant house and has been uninhabited for 25 years. The house appears on the 1861 Martenet Map but appears to date later than 1861. It is in such poor condition it is difficult to date it. Graves in the cemetery range from 1845 to 1905. The 1897 Tax Assessment lists a number of outbuildings. In a complex southeast of the house, a small barn or stable appears to date from the early 19th century.

The Dr. John H. Skinner House stands at the top of a hill approximately one-quarter mile east of Croom Road. It is a two-story frame cross-gable house which faces roughly south. Highlighting this main south facade is a wide central pedimented gable at second level, with returned cornices which are boxed and have a crown molding. Filling the central gable is a pair of 2/2 double hung sash windows. Centered on the ridge behind the central gable is a tall, wide corbelled brick chimney. The (main) south facade is four (irregular) bays wide. In the third bay is an off-center door (once sheltered by a porch, now destroyed); this door leads into a passage way between a wide parlor on the west and a narrow one on the east. There is a large fireplace centered in the interior wall of the west parlor. There is another (smaller) interior brick chimney at the ridge at the east gable end, which serves a stove pipe in the east parlor. At the apex of the east and west gable ends are remnants of jig sawn pendants. The house rests on a high brick foundation, seriously deteriorated. Visible in the crawl space within this foundation are massive brick piers supporting the central chimney.

There is a two-story two-bay one-room wing at the rear (north), making the house T shaped. This wing rests on a poured concrete foundation. Entrance to the wing is through a door in its second bay. The entire house is sheathed with German siding, unpainted. The roof is covered with asphalt single.

To the east of the house, enclosed within an iron spike fence, is the family burial ground. There are six low brick-lined altar tombs, with full-size inscribed slabs for members of the Skinner family.

To the north of the house is a twentieth century gable-roofed barn. Entrance is through double doors on its south side. It has wide vertical siding, a metal roof, and concrete foundation.

There are two more barns down the hill to the southeast of the house. One is a board-and-batten gable-roofed stable, built during this century. Just east of it is an older gable-roofed barn, with a deep overhang on its north face. The siding of this barn consists of wide split boards laid horizontally. The rafters are of hand hewn materials.

These two farm buildings are still in use; a third barn nearby is in totally ruinous condition.

The Dr. John Skinner House is significant both for the history of its tract of land, which presently encompasses 295 acres. The house is and as a part of a fairly well preserved nineteenth century farm complex including house, cemetery and outbuildings. The house was built and inhabited by a prominent nineteenth century Prince Georgian, Dr. John Henry Skinner.

Mansfield was patented in 1663¹ and has belonged to descendants of the same family since its sale to Gunder Erickson early in the eighteenth century.² John Henry Skinner, a wealthy physician and planter, acquired the property from his father in 1846.³

Skinner owned Mansfield from 1846 to his death in 1883, when he willed the property to his nephew, John Henry Skinner Sasscer, son of Dr. Frederick Sasscer of Upper Marlboro.⁴ The young Sasscer died in 1892 and Mansfield was passed to his brother, Reverdy Sasscer.⁵ The house has been used as a tenant house throughout the twentieth century and has been uninhabited for the past twenty-five years⁶ although the property is still farmed.

The house appears on both the 1861 Martenet Map and the 1878 Hopkins Atlas of Prince George's County. It was built in the cross-gable vernacular style and appears to date later than 1861. It is in such poor condition it is difficult to assign a date to it. Grave dates in the family cemetery range from Benjamin Skinner's in 1845 to Martha Amelia Mackall Hollyday's in 1905.

The 1897 Tax Assessment of the property lists a number of outbuildings.⁷ There are a number of outbuildings in a complex southeast of the house. One of these, a small barn or stable, appears to date from the early 19th century.
