Description

The Wood House is a one-and-one-half story gable roof frame dwelling of three-by-two bays, with a low frame two-by-two bay north kitchen wing. The house has two gable dormers and a facade-wide porch on the west (main) facade. It stands on a 1.67 acre corner lot at the intersection of Chalk Point and Aquasco Roads. The west (main) facade has central entrance. A six-over-six double-hung sash window flanks the entrance door on each side. The door and window surrounds are wide flat boards. The lintels have a very small raised crown molding. The facade is sheltered by a shed roof porch that is incorporated into the roofline of the main block. The boxed frieze and overhanging eaves are supported by square hollow wood posts. The House is covered with old horizontal lapped wood siding, painted white. Its hand-hewn sills rest on concrete blocks. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with synthetic shingle. The House has a two-room plan. Entry is into the larger south room. Door and window surrounds throughout the first story are flat boards with a central band of two grooves, surmounted by a wide crown-molded lintel. The House is set close to Aquasco Road but has a large rear field along the north side of Chalk Point Road. In the east field is a dilapidated gable roof frame outbuilding which has a corn crib at the center, flanked by stalls on the east and west. A large ruinous board-and-batten tobacco barn with a wood shingle roof stands south of the corn crib.

Significance

The Wood House in Aquasco is significant for its late-18th/early-19th century vernacular architecture. Its construction date is not known. The dual-slope gable roof encompassing a facade-wide entrance porch, one-and-one-half story height and gable dormers indicate an earlier construction date than its earliest documented existence, in the 1830's. The house is also significant for its association with the Selby and Naylor families. Samuel Selby resided in the house from 1867-1882 and ran a general store just across the public road. The house was owned and resided in by Selby's heirs, the Naylor family, through 1967. Ernest Naylor is responsible for many renovations to the house in the 1950's, resulting in the loss of most original features on the interior.

The Wood House is a one-and-one-half story gable roof frame dwelling of three-by-two bays, with a low frame two-by-two bay north kitchen wing. The house has two gable dormers and a facade-wide porch on the west (main) facade. It stands on a 1.67 acre corner lot at the intersection of Chalk Point and Aquasco Roads.

The three bay west (main) facade has central entrance through a door with four lower wood panels and an upper six-light glazed panel. A six-over-six double-hung sash window flanks the entrance door on each side. The door and window surrounds are wide flat boards. The lintel has a very small raised crown molding.

The facade is sheltered by a shed roof porch that is incorporated into the roofline of the main block. The boxed frieze and overhanging eaves are supported by square hollow wood posts with base and crown molding. The wood flooring of the porch has been recently replaced.

There are two gable-roof dormers sided with horizontal lapped siding at second story level. The dormer windows are 6/6 sash. The boxed cornice has kicks in the gable ends.

The Wood House is covered with old horizontal lapped wood siding, painted white. Its hand-hewn sills rest on concrete blocks. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with synthetic shingle. The roof has a shallower pitch over front and rear porches than over the steeply pitched main block. There is a crown-molded, boxed cornice.

The two-bay south gable end has a centered exterior brick chimney with first story weathering. The chimney has been rebuilt in the past thirty years. It is flanked by two windows at first and second story levels.

The five-bay east elevation has a shed roof dormer across the second story. The south three bays of the first story are sheltered by a shed roof porch on a concrete slab base. The south two bays, enclosed by screening, include a window and a rear entry door. The middle bay, sheltered by the porch roof overhang includes a small square window which lights the interior stairway, and concrete stairs down to a cellar door. The north section of the facade has a first story semi-octagonal bay with a shallow pyramidal roof. The bay has a large central 8/8 sash window flanked by a 4/4 sash window on each side.

The north gable end also has a centered exterior brick chimney. The facade is unfenestrated and dominated by the one-story gable roof two-by-two bay kitchen wing. The east (rear) elevation is sheltered by a shed roofed screened porch with concrete slab flooring. It shelters an entry to the kitchen. The west elevation has two 6/6 sash windows facing Aquasco Road. The north gable end also has two 6/6 sash windows. The kitchen stands on a cement block base but has a hand-hewn sill. The roof is finished with very simple boxed overhanging eaves.

The interior of the Wood House has a two-room plan. Entry is into the larger south room. There is a hearth in the south wall, surrounded by a modern brick mantel. The open-string stair is in the northeast corner of the room. The stair and vertical board-covered spandrel are of unpainted stained wood that appears to be modern material. The stair rises for three steps, turns 90 degrees at a landing lighted by a small low square window, turns 90 degrees again and rises along the north wall of the room. There are two rectangular balusters to a step, and simple stair-end brackets. A closet beneath the stair has a door of the same vertical boards as those paneling the spandrel. The door also has strap hinges.

Door and window surrounds throughout the first story are flat boards with a central band of two grooves, surmounted by a wide crown-molded lintel. The capped baseboards have a lower kick-molding. The flooring is of uniform width narrow boards. Directly in front of the entrance door is a rectangular patch in the floor which was a trap door to the cellar. This opening has now been nailed closed. A beam across the ceiling, running from the entry door to the stairway makes it appear that there might have once been a wall separating the entryway and stair from the south room.

A door at the center of the north wall leads to the dining room, which has the semi-octagonal bay in the east end. The bay appears to be a later addition to the house. Baseboards and wood moldings in the dining room are the same as those in the south living room. A door in the north wall of the dining room leads to the kitchen, located in the low north addition.

The second story of the Wood House has a small north-south hallway with a small bedroom at each end. The bedrooms are lighted by the west dormer windows. The bedroom and bathroom doors are of vertical boards with strap hinges as was the closet door beneath the stair. The flooring on the second story is of very old wide boards, measuring 10-13 inches in width.

The basement is reached from the south side of the house, on the outside. It is entered through an old beaded vertical board door with three horizontal battens on the back. The cellar is beneath the entry hall and dining room. It is lined with cement block and has a concrete floor. The joists for the floor above appear to have been cut with a circular saw.

The Wood House is set close to Aquasco Road but has a large rear field along the north side of Chalk Point Road. There is a frame garage southeast of the house on a concrete block base, with board and batten siding and a corrugated metal roof. There is a capped well just south of the garage and an adjoining concrete foundation measuring approximately 5 x 5 feet and approximately two feet deep. Another concrete foundation approximately 6 x 18 feet is in the east field. Also in the east field is a dilapidated gable roof frame outbuilding which has a corn crib at the center, flanked by stalls on the east and west. A large runious board-and-batten tobacco barn with a wood shingle roof stands south of the corn crib. A store used to stand at the corner of Aquasco and Chalk Point Roads. There is some concrete slab remaining from this structure, visible at the southwest corner of the lot.

The Wood House in Aquasco is significant for its late-18th/early-19th century vernacular architecture. Its construction date is not known. The dual-slope gable roof encompassing a facade-wide entrance porch, one-and-one-half story height and gable dormers indicate an earlier construction date than its earliest documented existence, in the 1830's. The house is also significant for its association with the Selby and Naylor families. Samuel Selby resided in the house from 1867-1882 and ran a general store just across Aquasco road from his residence. The house was owned and resided in by Selby's heirs, the Naylor family, through 1967. Ernest Naylor is responsible for many renovations to the building in the 1950's, resulting in the loss of most original interior features.

The Wood House was a small, four room structure (two on each floor) in the Tidewater vernacular style that had several additions and alterations in the 19th and 20th centuries. The one story north kitchen and rear semi-octagonal bay are 19th century additions. The second story hallway and bath are early 20th century alterations. The house still displays exterior features characteristic of 18th and early 19th century southern Maryland dwellings, but alterations such as the rebuilding of the south chimney, unsympathetic roofing material, new sashes in the windows, loss of shutters and renovation of the cornice detail gives the building an anonymous "modern" appearance.

The lot on which the dwelling stands was purchased by Thomas Blake Hall from George Morton in 1835. Hall died in 1841 and had resided in a house on the property by that date. The dwelling was conveyed by the will of Thomas Blake Hall to his wife Rachel.¹ After 1841 the house and three acre lot was owned by a succession of Aquasco residents until it was purchased by Samuel Selby in 1867.² Selby owned approximately 500 acres of land in the Aquasco area, including parts of the tracts Doves Nest, Doves Perch and Lu ford's Hope. He ran a general store located across Aquasco Road from his residence.³ Upon his death in 1882 he left the

house to his wife and daughter with instructions in his will to repair the house.⁴

The house and lot, reduced to two acres, remained with heirs of Samuel Selby, the Naylor family, until 1967.⁵ The house is located at what was traditionally a well-traveled intersection, Aquasco Road and the road to the Trueman Point landing (Chalk Point Road). During the early 20th century there was a store on the lot, located at the southwest corner, immediately at the road intersection. All that remains of this structure is a foundation. The ruins of a 19th century tobacco barn east of the house, and a dilapidated structure containing a corn crib flanked by stalls, indicates that owners of the property farmed as well as ran a store.

This facade is three bays wide, with entrance through the central bay. There are two dormers on the west slope of the roof. At each gable end is a (rebuilt) freestanding chimney.

The Wood House is considered by natives of Aquasco (Woodville) to be the oldest house in the village. Early records are scanty, however, and this local tradition cannot be substantiated. The house was built in the early part of the nineteenth century and was for many years the home of Elizabeth Adams, whose heirs sold it in 1855 to Peter Wood, Jr., a member of the family for whom the village of Woodville (now Aquasco) was named. He resided there until 1867 when he sold it to Samuel Selby. Selby left clear instructions in his will, probated in 1882, that certain money was to be used for repairing the house. His descendants lived in the house until 1937.

There was no house on the property at the time of the tax assessment of 1798. During the first half of the nineteenth century it was the home of Elizabeth Adams, whose heirs sold it in 1855 to Peter Wood Jr., a member of the family for whom the village of Woodville (now Aquasco) was named. Wood sold the house and lot in 1855 to Samuel Selby, who lived there until his death in 1882. In his will, Selby left clear instructions that certain money was to be used for repairing the house. His descendants lived in the house until 1967.


