DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Across Rt. 213 at its intersection with Rt. 18, just south of Centreville, stands a squarish two story Italianate ante-bellum house named Woodlawn. The house has a 3-bay facade, with one story porch extending across three quarters of the facade. Its two bay sides are quite plain and in the rear is a 20th century leanto addition. East of the house are several outbuildings, a cornhouse and barn being contemporary with the dwelling.

The west facade of Woodlawn is the most developed. Its central entrance has a bold architrave, encompassing the double doors, sidelights and transom. Between the latter are pilsters with bracket supporting a shelf at the base of the transom. The double doors have rounded upper panels. Flanking the entrance are two windows having 6/6 sash above jib doors and paneled shutters to the floor. Both have cambered arch trim. All of this work is protected and partly concealed by the contemporary porch. The porch is divided into three equal bays separated by pairs of columns. In the center are wide steps from the brick walk. The piers of the porch have pilsters corresponding to

the columns above, just as the pil^aster at the front corners of the house have a brick pier at the corner of the foundation. The porch balustrade is composed of relatively delicate sections of design. On the second story the boldness of the entry is suggested by the three-part window in the center. The two flanking windows have 6/6 sash and louvered blinds, all with cambered arch trim. There is a bold bracketed cornice, which extends around the front and two sides. In the west slope of the hip roof is a hip roof dormer with three part window, all of which is a replacement of a lower pitched, nearly flat, roof.

On the south side of the dwelling are two windows on each story, located west of the two chimneys. They also have 6/6 sash and louvered blinds. Unlike the flush siding of the facade, the side and back walls are covered with lapped weatherboard. The north side is like the south with the addition of one more window on the first floor east of the rear chimney. This extra window was located here because there were no east windows in that room, there being, and having been, a wing on the rear half of the building.

Its interior is divided into central stair hall with one long living room on the south, (originally two rooms) and a dining room and kitchen on the north. The addition contains entry pantry and utility access.

The trim throughout is quite bold and typical of the period. There is the usual bold turned mahogany newel at the base of the stairs and turned oak balusters with mahogany handrail. An unusual feature of the house is a surprisingly narrow landing. The second story retains its original plan and a bathroom in the west end of the hall.

In the attic the ends of the original rafters can be seen where they were cut off in order to build the newer high pitch hip roof.

East of the house is a concrete block storage building, chicken houses, a shed, a corn house and barn. The latter two are contemporary with the house. The corn house is a small two-bay structure with hewn posts and plates and sawn studs and rafters. The structure is covered with horizontal slats with beveled tops and bottoms. There are up-braces only on the gables. The rafters are half lapped and nailed. There is approximately 15" overhang and the board fascia is nailed to the ends of the rafters. Original strap hinges support the west door composed of vertical slats. There is a small door above in the gable for filling the house.

South of the corn house is a frame barn composed of three bays in length and two in depth, plus leanto bays on each side. It all appears to be contemporary,

with some modification. The central structure is built on brick piers and is 1 1/2 stories in height. There are six major posts and two minor posts at each end flanking the doors (one original). There are four horizontal members, i.e. sill, intermediate, joist plate, and rafter plate. The rafters are unnotched over the upper plate, and the leanto rafters are nailed onto the central rafters, higher than the plate. All posts have braces, and there are two down braces for the center posts to the girder (2nd floor). A small section of vertical slats on the exterior and a few studs inside indicate that a portion of the barn was used for a corn crib. Across the back (east) of the barn has been added a twentieth century leanto addition.


