DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Harrison Brothers Store is located on the southwest corner of Second Street and Broad Street in Crumpton.

This large frame commercial building consists of two principal parts: a two story square building on the corner with a pyramidal roof topped by an open cupola, and a two story rear wing with a pitched gable roof.

The front facade of the main building faces east to Broad Street. The north half of this facade is a storefront, with a recessed entrance door in the center flanked by large-pane store windows. This simple storefront is framed by paneled pilasters and a molded projecting hood. To the south of the storefront, a single door opens into separate living quarters, now serving as a rental apartment. To the left of this door there is a single 6/6 window. Five 4/4 windows are ranged across the second floor, with the same separation of the living quarters to the south and commercial storage space to the north. The foundation is brick; the siding consists of plain horizontal weatherboards with plain cornerboards suggesting

corner pilasters. The eaves are boxed in with large scrolled brackets below a deep soffit and a complex crown mold. The roof is standing seam tin, surmounted by a large, open cupola with a pyramidal roof. The cupola roof is covered with wood shingles and is supported by 8 chamfered posts, with a simple railing and a bracketed cornice.

On the north facade, facing Second Street, there are four 6/6 windows on each floor. The first floor openings have been blocked from the inside and are fitted with handsome solid paneled shutters. These shutters have flush panels trimmed with a beaded edge, similar to the exterior shutters on the original Benton Shoe Shop in Centreville (QA-417). The foundation, siding, cornerboards, bracketed cornice, and tin roof are all identical to the front facade.

On the south facade, there is a door with a two-light transom in the center bay flanked by two 6/6 windows on each side. Five 6/6 windows are ranged across the second floor. The center three bays on the first floor are covered by an open one-story porch with chamfered posts and scrolled trim below the frieze. All other details match the front facade. It is significant to note that this wall of the building is treated as the principal facade of the dwelling portion of the larger structure.

The north wall of the two story rear wing is flush with the north wall of the main building, facing Second Street. The rear wing is 5 bays long and two rooms deep, but does not extend the full width of the main building. On the north wall, there are single doors in the second and fourth bays on the first floor, with 6/6 windows in the remaining three bays of the first floor and all five bays of the second floor. The wing rests on a brick foundation and is covered with plain horizontal weatherboards and an asphalt shingle roof. The eaves are boxed in with a bracketed cornice similar to the main building but smaller in scale.

A small, one story frame addition projects from the south portion of the west gable wall of the wing. One 6/6 window remains on the first floor of this gable wall, with two 6/6 windows on the second floor. A small opening in the upper gable is fitted with a batten shutter. The eaves are trimmed with beaded and tapered rakeboards.

A one story lean-to addition covers the first floor of the south wall of the wing. There are four 6/6 windows across the second story.

The interior was not examined.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Harrison Brothers Store is the largest and among the most distinguished buildings in Crumpton. It was constructed by George E. and John T. Harrison in the mid-1860's on land purchased from Welch and Shepherd. In the 1877 Atlas, the Harrison Brothers are listed as merchants, with the following brief description of their business:

"Harrison Brothers., Dealers in Dry Goods, Notions, Hats, Boots, Shoes, etc. Also Grain, Coal, and Lumber; and a General Freighting Business done."

Their business was sufficiently successful to allow one brother to construct a large Victorian house on the east side of Broad Street circa 1883 (see QA-291). The store remained in the Harrison family until 1908, when the heirs sold the property to James R. Jefferson.


