DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Little Wye is located on Wye Plantation, and lies to the east of the main house and the associated outbuildings. It faces south across open fields toward a branch of the East Wye River. The house was fully restored in 1938 under the direction of the architectural firm of Perry, Shaw, and Heburn. A series of 24 black-and-white photographs taken during the winter of 1937-1938 are the only known surviving documentation of the building prior to and during restoration. Based on these photographs and an examination of the restored house, it is possible to establish the general appearance of the exterior. Unfortunately, no documentation can be found of the interior previous to restoration, and little if any early interior fabric has survived.

The original house is of brick construction, laid in Flemish bond above an English bond foundation without a watertable. It is one-and-one-half stories high, three bays wide, and one room deep, with flush brick chimneys centered at each end of a steeply pitched gable roof.

The principal facade faces north, with the

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Little Wye is typical of the small brick dwelling houses built throughout the 18th century in Tidewater Maryland. Perry, Shaw, and Hepburn proposed a date of circa 1690 for the house, but such an early date seems highly unlikely. No clearly dateable fabric has survived, but both the general form of the house, the flush chimneys, and the absence of a watertable all suggest a date considerably later, probably after the middle of the 18th century. The complete lack of early fabric and insufficient documentation make it impossible to suggest a more precise time-frame.

Architecturally, the house is of interest both as an example of 18th century brick architecture, and as an example of the work of the prominent architectural firm of Perry, Shaw, and Hepburn, best known for their work at Williamsburg.

door located in the center bay flanked by a single nine-over-six window on each side. Six-over-six pitched roof dormers are located above each first floor window, but not above the door. On the west gable there are two small window openings flanking the chimney on the second floor. The south facade is identical to the north facade, with a central door flanked by nine-over-six windows on the first floor and two six-over-six dormers on the second floor. The east gable is now partially covered by a hyphen added in 1938. Several photographs illustrate this portion of the house before the renovation and addition. These show that there is only one original opening in this wall, an exterior door in the south corner on the first floor.


Other details visible in the photographs, but replaced during the restoration, are the early beaded and tapered rakeboards and an early box cornice with crown mold and bed mold.

The restoration, as executed by Perry, Shaw, and Hepburn, appears to be less than faithful to the original building. Interior woodwork and details all tend to be exceptionally bold and heavy, and

appear far too elaborate for this building. It is possible that these design decisions were made based on some architectural evidence, but lacking documentation to substantiate this, it seems unlikely. In addition to restoring the house, a brick hyphen and two stall garage were added to the east gable.
