Constructed circa 1840, the earliest part of the house on the Holland Farm now forms the rear wing for a late 19th century two story farmhouse. The early section consists of a story-and-a-half, 18 by 22 foot dwelling with a 12 by 18 foot story-and-loft kitchen. The story-and-a-half section is two bays wide, with a gambrel roof and a side-passage plan. The original stair and some Greek Revival detail has survived in this part of the house. The early wing has a steeply pitched gable roof. The first floor serves as a kitchen and has been completely renovated.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Holland Farm is located on the east side of Brierly Mill Road 1/4 mile north of Maryland Route 19 and approximately three miles northwest of Ingleside.

The house consists of three distinct parts. The original house is a small frame building, 1 1/2 stories high, two bays wide and one room deep, with a single flush brick chimney at the west end of the gambrel roof. An early if not original story-and-loft frame wing extends to the east of the gambrel section. This early house and wing, probably constructed in the second quarter of the 19th century, was later incorporated as the rear wing for a larger two story frame house dating to the late 19th or early 20th century.

The front facade of the early gambrel section faces north. The door is in the east bay, with one 6/6 window to the west and two 6/6 shed roof dormers on the second story. The facade wall is covered with wood shingle siding; the roof is asphalt shingle. A one story lean-to porch extends across this facade, concealing the cornice.

7.1 DESCRIPTION

A broad, flush brick chimney is centered on the west gable wall, which is now entirely concealed by the later addition.

On the rear or south facade, an original door in the east bay has been recently blocked. The fenestration pattern duplicates the front facade. The continuous foundation has been covered with a coat of stucco. The wood shingle siding and asphalt shingle roof are repeated on this facade; the eaves are enclosed with a plain box cornice.

The east gable wall is almost entirely concealed by the one story wing. This wing is only 12 feet long but extends the full 18 foot depth of the gambrel section. A single 6/6 window is centered on the front facade, while a similar window on the rear facade has been replaced with a single light kitchen window. On the east gable wall, a door in the east bay opens onto a one-story enclosed lean-to porch across that end of the wing. A flush brick stove chimney is centered on the east gable wall of the pitched roof wing.

The interior of the gambrel section consists of a side passage, single parlor plan with the passage to the east. The stair rises against the east wall of the passage. It is a straight run, open-string stair with a square chamfered newel, square balusters, and a

plain rail. The area below the carriage is paneled with plain vertical boards. Rabbetted Greek Revival trim and beaded baseboards have survived in both the passage and the parlor. The parlor fireplace has been closed off and the mantel removed. When the west addition was made, two connecting doors were cut in on either side of the chimney.

The interior of the east wing has been renovated and now serves as the kitchen.

The west addition is of frame construction, two stories high, three bays wide, and one room deep. The front facade faces west, toward Brierly Mill Road. The door is in the north bay, with two 2/2 windows to the right and three 2/2 windows ranged across the second story. On each gable wall, single 2/2 windows are centered on both the first and second floor. The majority of the rear wall is covered by the early gambrel section. A blocked door at the north end of the rear facade originally opened onto the porch of the gambrel section; this door has recently been blocked. The building rests on concrete piers and an in-fill concrete block foundation wall. It is covered with wood shingle siding, an asphalt shingle roof and oversailing boxed eaves.


