Summary Description

The two-and-one-half-story, front-gable dwelling with ell has had several additions that have impacted the original gable-front-and-wing footprint. The dwelling is located at the corner of Duke and Main Street, with the front elevation on Main Street.

Summary Statement of Significance

206 Duke Street is significant as an example of the gable-front-and-wing style of dwelling that was very popular in the late 1800's and early 1900's. The various additions to the dwelling and its current use as apartments serve an example of how older dwellings can be adapted to fit modern needs.

The dwelling at 206 Duke Street appears to have been divided into two apartments. The two-and-one-half-story, front-gable dwelling with ell has had several additions that have impacted the original gable-front-and-wing footprint.¹ The dwelling is located at the corner of Duke and Main Street, with the front elevation on Main Street. A small, one-story, gable-front porch is located on the front, or northwest, elevation of the main block. A one-story, shed-roofed addition is located inside the L-shaped space. A one-story, shed-roofed addition is also located off the northeast elevation of the main block, with a one-story, shed-roofed portion added to the rear of this addition. A one-story, shed-roofed addition to the rear elevation of the main wing is also connected to this addition. A one-story, gable-roofed addition is connected to the rear of the gable-front portion of the main block.

A corbelled chimney rises out of the middle of the main block, with a second corbelled chimney rising through the cornice of the gable peak on the northeast elevation. The dwelling and many of its additions are topped with metal seam roof, the only exception being the gable-roof addition, which is covered in asphalt shingles. The dwelling is clad in a beveled vinyl siding and contains one-over-one vinyl windows of mixed sizes. Vinyl shutters of various colors flank the windows.

The foundation is not visible, as the siding stretches to the ground. A poured concrete pad is found off the front and rear elevations.





This dwelling is located outside the Stevensville Historic District, but closely resembles the dwellings within the district. Today, 206 Duke Street is surrounded by much smaller, modern dwellings. The result, even in its altered state, is a clear record of historic style versus modern style.

The various additions to the dwelling and its current use as apartments serve an example of how older dwellings can be adapted to fit modern needs.
