The Stevenson house is a modest, side hall/parlor frame farmhouse originally sheathed with beaded weatherboards. Exterior as well as interior remodelings have removed much of the period fabric. The nearby family cemetery is partially surrounded by a Victorian iron lattice fence. The house is named for Benjamin F. Stevenson (1809-1886) who is buried with his wife, Harriet, in the cemetery plot. Benjamin F. Stevenson is designated on the 1877 county atlas patron list as a mariner who owned forty acres.

The Stevenson house, a two-story c. 1840-1850 side hall/parlor frame dwelling, stands on the east side of the Old Crisfield/Marion Road near Hopewell, Somerset County, Maryland. The house faces northwest with the main gable running on a northeast/southwest axis. A Stevenson family cemetery accompanies the house.

The two-story three-bay side hall/parlor house rests on a minimal brick foundation and is uniformly sheathed with asbestos shingles over beaded weatherboards. The steeply pitched roof has flush gable ends and a boxed cornice with bed molding. Extending to the northeast is a contemporary story-and-a-half frame wing, and to the southeast a story-and-a-half wing which appears to have been added more recently.

The northwest (main) elevation of the main block is three bays across with an entrance in the left bay. The front door is a replacement, and a Colonial pedimented surround has been added as decoration. The two adjacent bays are filled with six over six sash windows, while the second floor is lighted by three evenly spaced windows. The former interior end brick chimney has been leveled off at roof height.

The northeast gable end is largely covered by the story-and-a-half wing which is lighted on the first floor by two 6/6 sash windows. The second floor knee wall is pierced by small single-pane replacement windows. An interior end brick chimney rises from the gable end. A pair of windows flank the chimney on the north end.

The rear story-and-a-half wing is similarly built three-bay by one room addition with 6/6 sash windows on the first floor and smaller windows that light the loft. A shed addition stretches across the south side, and a brick stove stack rises from the gable end.

The interior was not seen, but it was described as being thoroughly remodeled.

The Stevenson family cemetery is located to the west of the house and is distinguished by several old boxwood. A decorative iron fence with iron lattice panels and corner posts with molded finials surrounds a pair of markers. The others are just scattered around the immediate area.

History and Support


